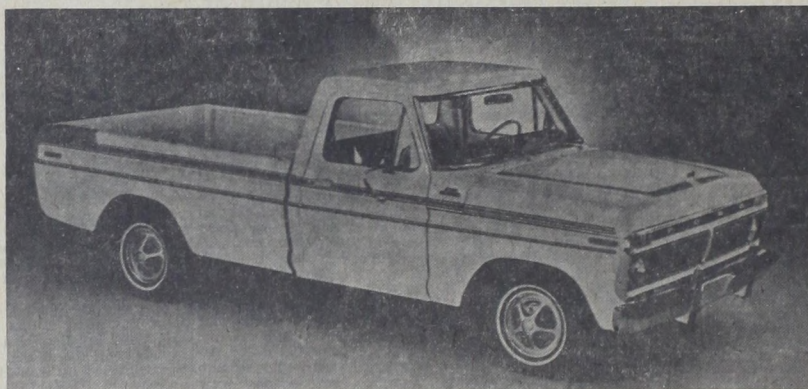

March 17-19 at Twin Pines Jaycees Sponsor Bull Ride

Rodeo contestants from at least three states will gather here Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 17-19, for the Red River Bull Ride in the indoor arena of Twin Pines Farm.

The show sponsored by Muenster Jaycees and produced by Adrian Parker, will begin nightly at 8 p.m. and continue for some two hours while about fifty riders take their turns in the contest. The total number of entries for the three performances is expected to be more than 150, and one third of them will be on the program for each night. Records of the three nights will be considered in selecting six winners for a purse of \$3000. Clowns will add color and excitement to the show.

An added attraction each night is a drawing for a pair of Nocona boots. Spectators will be given numbers as they arrive and the drawing will decide who receives the free boots.

While all that is under way, spectators will have ample opportunity to refresh themselves. Concessions will have coffee and cold drinks, barbecue, sausage sticks, popcorn, peanuts and candies. Seating will be available for about 850 persons and parking accommodations are more than adequate.

Admission prices will be \$2.00 for an adult and \$1.00 for a child under 12. However the opening night is an exception. A child attending then will be admitted free if accompanied by a parent.

The bull ride is a Jaycee benefit event to raise money for the park pavilion fund.

Chutes and other rodeo equipment are furnished through Courtesy of the Jenkins Rodeo of Fort Worth, which will resume its spring and summer rodeo schedule at the arena beginning this weekend.

YOU CAN BANK ON IT!

An invisible factor, but one the economic experts agree exists in today's unemployment picture is the result of what is called transfer payments.

Transfer payments are the funds paid to people who are essentially unemployed when they receive the compensations . . . social security checks, unemployment money and welfare payments.

The growth of these transfer payments, from less than 45-billion dollars ten years ago to over 196-billion dollars last year, is the consideration economists have in identifying it as a real factor in current unemployment figures.

Fact is, a lot of unemployed people are being paid a lot more money now than they were ten years ago. Money most of them are receiving in part because they are unemployed. Obviously, arguments about merits of the programs aside, there is much less incentive for these people to really seek employment.

Therefore many people are probably on the unemployment rolls who really are not looking for a job. This is the factor in determining true unemployment that no one has been able to measure.

president of the American Chemical Society of GCC. She will join Lois in Corpus Christi and they will return together on March 17.

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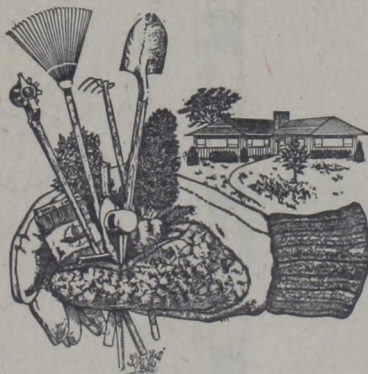
