City slices street repair list

Muenster City Council held a special meeting on Wednesday, May 16. They canvassed votes from the May 12 local option liquor election. There were 96 votes approving the option of liquor sales in newly annexed areas of Muenster and 43 votes against.

Proposed street repairs took up the majority of the short meeting. A decision on what to do with needed street repairs was tabled at the regular May meeting until the City had an idea of what the May sales tax rebates would be. The Council felt it would indicate if more money could be expected. The amount was not favorable according to City Administrator Stan Endres. He noted, "This affects not only what we do now, but realistically, what we are going to be able to do in the coming years also."

Primary elections set for Tuesday, May 29

The much delayed Texas Republican and Democratic Primary elections take place on Tuesday, May 29. Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.
Although the Presidential election may be anticlimactic for voters since the nominees for both parties are already selected, there are many other races that should draw interest. In Cooke County, there are four Republican candidates seeking election as Sheriff, two running for the County Attorney position, two for Commissioner

of Precinct #3 and two for Precinct #1, and two each for Constable Precincts 1 and 4. There are a number of contested State positions on the ballot including that of State Representative, District 68. Muenster resident Drew Springer hopes to be nominate on the Republican ballot for that office as do Dave Isbell also of Cooke County, Paul Braswell of Forestburg, and Trent McKnight of Throckmorton. The winner of that race will face Democrat Lanhon Odom of Montague County this fall.

Woman achieves success in daily life

Although Patsy (not her real name) is sitting in a chair calmly while having a conversation with a complete stranger about her history, her fidgeting indicates she is uncomfortable. Last year at this time, she would not have been conversing with anyone much less a stranger. In fact, she would have been at home afraid to venture out in the world or have contact with anyone. Patsy is on probation after serving some time in jail. She was placed in the Texas Correctional Office on Offenders with Medical and Mental Impairments (TCOOMMI) program. TCOOMMI offers appropriate and cost effective alternatives to incarceration for offenders with special needs. The support of TCOOMMI helps her maintain the provisions of her probation. Before she entered the program, she had trouble complying completely with the terms of her probation. The diagnosis of major depression makes her eligible for the TCOOMMI program. Patsy has suffered from major depression since childhood. Patsy's parents divorced when she was about two years old, but she alleges

that her father began sexually, physically, and emotionally abusing her and her sisters in their early years, and the abuse continued until she was 12. Patsy did not have a happy childhood, so she began cutting and developed an eating disorder to ease the pain. At age 13, she was admitted into a state mental facility after committing a crime. She spent her teen years in this facility. At age 18, she was a single mother and began co-habituating with a man who was not the father of her child. She saw him as a family man who was stable, hard-working, and could take care of her and her child. She thought she had achieved the perfect picture of what a family should look like. But she soon discovered the marriage was not picture perfect. Patsy appeared to function well in the outside world. She taught pre-kindergarten classes and held the director's position in a daycare and was a church youth director. Her family seemed to be a normal family to everyone who knew them. Not many people knew about her abuse of prescription drugs, binge drinking, cutting, or eating disorder. She could control all of it for long periods of time, and then there would be an episode that sent her crashing to the bottom. She stated that she was "pretty sick" when they married. During the marriage, she was hospitalized a dozen or more times for binge drinking and suicide attempts. Then one day she discovered her husband was having an affair. She attacked his girlfriend and was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. She was convicted of the crime and put on probation. Although she had been treated for mental illness for years, she had never stayed with a treatment program for long. The probation forced her to get treatment for her mental illness. The probation department and Texoma Community Center (formerly Mental Health Mental Retardation Services of Texoma) work together to provide services for Patsy. "For the first time in my life, I feel like I have hope for the future. Depression is not totally controlling my life. I don't think that I am a bad person, but I have made some bad choices. Now I see that I can have a better life if I use the resources available to me and get the help

I need. When I first came to Texoma Community Center, I realized the psychiatrist who saw that I had been abusing prescription drugs. She would not allow me to do that any longer," states Patsy. "Leanne Thompson, Adult Probation, and the two Texoma Community Center employees, Kristi Gourd and Whitney Redden, have helped me change my life. This last year, I have been in therapy and have gone to group meetings. In the past, depression kept me in bed and my anxiety prevented me from being around other people. Therapy has made me deal with my issues. I believe that my life has been saved through these three women's work. I would not have found all this help if I had not been in trouble with the law. I know it sounds strange, but I know it is true. I would have continued to crash. I am now functioning in daily life and that is a huge thing for me," ends Patsy. Help is available in Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson counties through Texoma Community Center. Services include: 24 hour emergency services, assertive community treatment (ACT) team, case management, cognitive behavioral therapy, community-based assessments, crisis intervention, Medicaid eligibility, medication-related services, respite services, skills training, small groups, supported employment, supported housing, and transportation. Mental health centers are located in each county including Cooke Mental Health Center, 319 West Dixon, Gainesville, 940-665-3962.

Don't settle for another season of belly flops

Trying to lose that beer belly for the summer? Start with an obvious less-is-more approach. "To lose a beer belly, you have to stop drinking beer, eat less food, and exercise more," said Dr. Robert Dimeff, who leads primary care sports medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center. "It's where most men store their fat, especially as they age." Abdominal- and back-

targeting exercises such as trunk curls using kettlebells or medicine balls are effective, said Dr. Dimeff. "The right balance of trunk exercise is important," he says. "Most of the abdominal muscles start in the front and wrap around to the front, and so you have to do a variety of strengthening exercises."

have to find a method to get the rock delivered. Delivery cost is unknown, but the estimated cost of the oil is \$16,000 and \$5,000 for the rock. That is the cost for one layer. The City Budget has \$175,000 remaining for street repairs. Street Commissioner Greg Bohl suggested accepting the County's offer of assistance on Ash Street while it is on the table. That cost is about \$25,000 which would leave about \$150,000 to do other repairs. "We could do Oak Street and just not do the others." The cost of hot mix for proposed areas of Oak and Third streets is \$131,119.50 and for repairs on various areas throughout town is \$11,556.89. Bohl said, "That gives us about a \$7,000 play in there for hauling this rock. The down side is we just can't do as many streets. That is a reality that we have to face this year. Possibly next year,

we can increase our street budget." After more discussion, the Council voted to accept Bohl's proposal to pave North Ash Street and the noted areas of Oak and Third streets with hot mix and do various spot repairs on other streets. They accepted Bohl's proposal which totaled \$142,676.39. Mayor Anderson conducted a swearing in ceremony for the three Council members who will be serving another two-year term. Taking the oath of office were Jewel Otto, Pat Stelzer, and Greg Bohl.

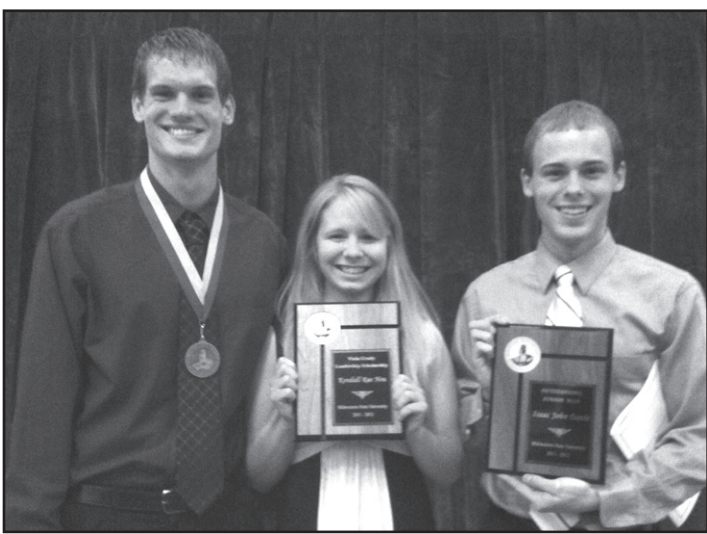

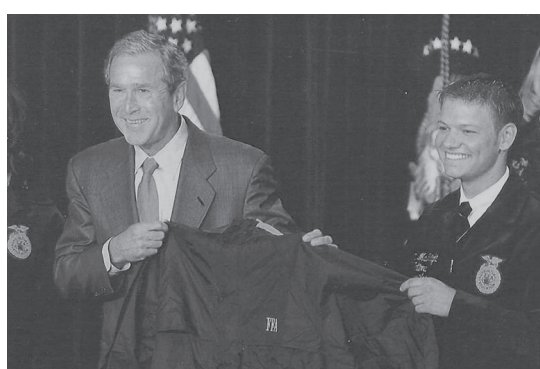

Texas Forest Service urges caution over holiday weekend

Texans are urged to use caution while celebrating the upcoming Memorial Day holiday weekend - and when doing any outdoor activity that can cause a spark.

Although many areas have received significant rainfall, much of the state is experiencing some level of drought, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor.

On Memorial Day weekend last year, local fire departments and Texas Forest Service responded to 363 fires that burned almost 18,000 acres. Almost half of those fires were determined to have been started by preventable causes such as campfires or debris burning. Eighteen homes and 35 other structures were destroyed over the holiday weekend.

It doesn't take much to ignite a potentially devastating wildfire. Always check with local government or fire department officials to make sure outdoor cooking and campfires are allowed in

Mark Bartush. Mark shared many stories of his experiences at Sacred Heart and with his class, beginning with his first day at Preschool when he smacked another student on the head for taking the tractor that he was playing with. 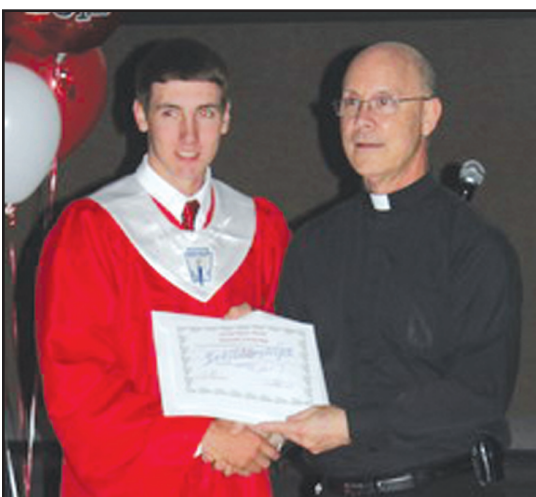

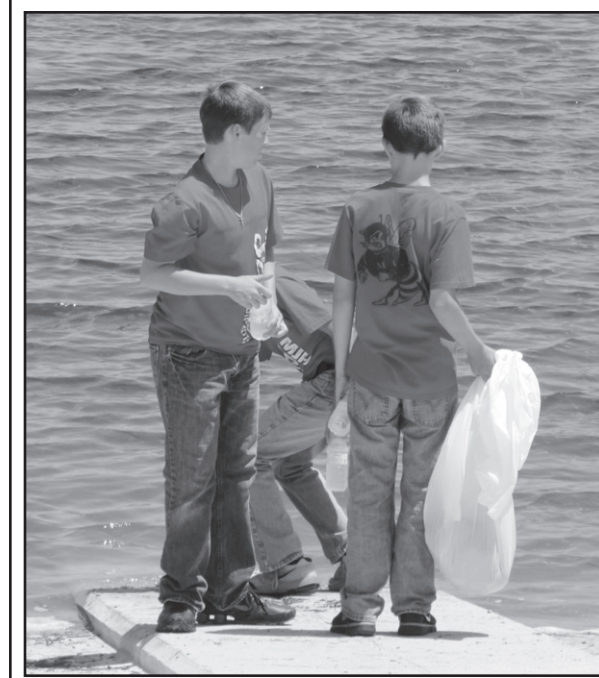

Weather Whys - Allergies and weather

Q: This spring, it seems like everyone's allergies are a big problem. Is the weather contributing to this?

A: Very much so, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. Springtime in Texas means allergy season is here, but that is especially the case this year. "Pollen counts have been very high, higher than usual," he notes. "The high amounts of winter rain have allowed flowers and trees to develop large amounts of pollen, and

this has been enhanced by the fact that much of Texas was coming out of a severe drought. The much wetter than normal weather has been a boom for all kinds of flowers and plants, and this means an explosion in the pollen count. As a result, many people - even pets - are suffering right now."

Q: What pollens are out there?
A: McRoberts says there are several, and any one of them can give allergy sufferers a very bad time.

"The most noticeable pollen is oak, which gives automobiles a yellow coating when its pollen count is high," he adds. "Others include ash, elm, pine, pecan, hickory, poplar, and walnut trees. Perhaps the most common allergen in this part of the country is mold, which occurs in humid areas of Texas and can be a concern year-round. In late summer and early fall, ragweed, shrubs, and grasses fill the air in Texas with pollen."

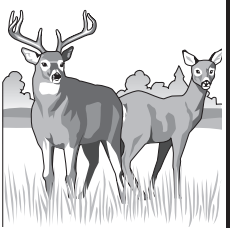

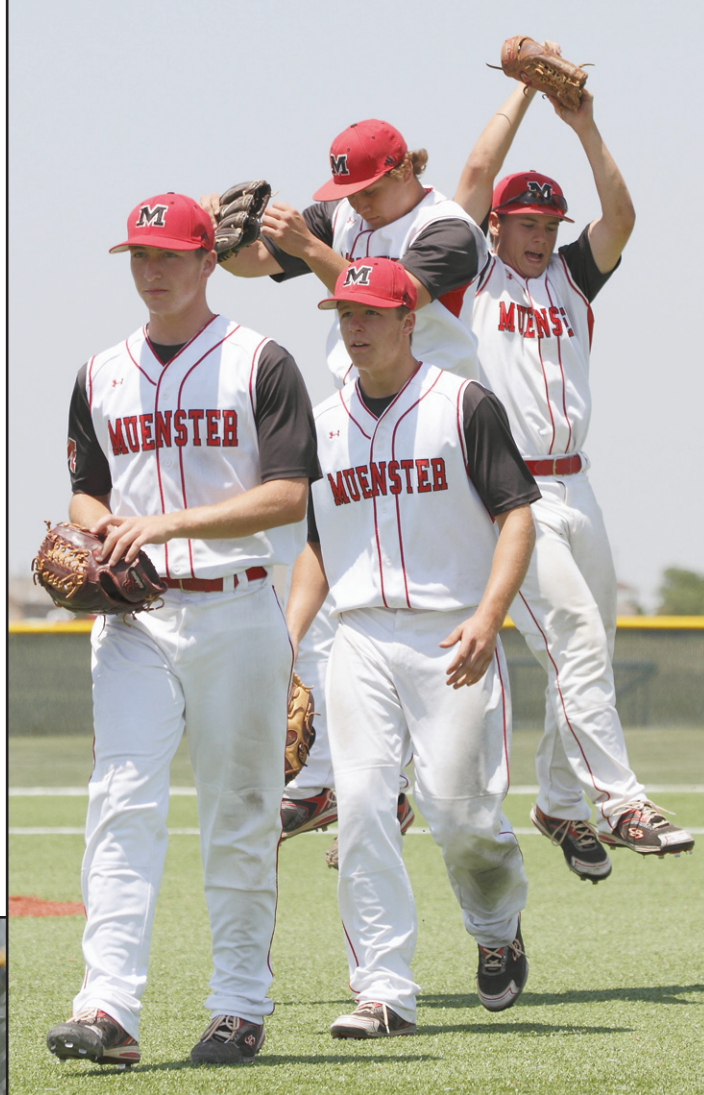

## Farmers should prepare for weed resistance

Agronomists with the Texas AgriLife Extension Service are suggesting that farmers who use glyphosate-resistant crops start expanding weed control strategies.

"We have a critical issue arising, in that common water hemp in Central and Southeast Texas, and Palmer amaranth pigweed in the High Plains have started showing signs of resistance to glyphosate herbicides," said Paul Baumann, Texas

AgriLife Extension Service state weed specialist. Weeds developing resistance to common herbicides require new tactics, according to Baumann.

"If all else is killed out but that one plant is different, that is the start of the problem," he said. "One common water hemp plant could shed 400,000 to 500,000 seeds. So if that one weed is not killed, then later that year or the following year, there may be a

whole patch of this resistant biotype of the weed."

His recommendation is for farmers to return to using soil-residual herbicides along with the glyphosate products. Trifluralin (Treflan) and pendamethalin (Prowl) are two of the available products that could be used in cotton programs. Some other approved products that also are soil-active herbicides are Staple, Cotran, Dual, and Warrant.

## Good area harvest in full swing



Area farmers harvest golden fields of ripe wheat and find the yield pleasing. Ronnie Felderhoff, owner of Muenster Mill, confirmed a good wheat crop with good weather for the harvest. "Most people say they are getting better than they expected," said Felderhoff. "The farmers are very happy." He noted that the low is 30 bushels an acre and the high is 97 bushels an acre. The price of wheat jumped up more than \$1 a bushel in the past week. According to Felderhoff, as of Tuesday afternoon, soft wheat was bringing \$6.30 a bushel and hard wheat \$6.40. ## County Agent's Report

Many native trees dying as a result of last year's drought. We are experiencing a very significant decline in the native tree population in Cooke County. Especially noticeable is the loss of Blackjack and Post Oak trees. Often the first sign of problems that landowners notice is the loss of bark. This is generally caused by a fungus, known as hypoxylon canker. Hypoxylon causes cankers and death of oak and other hardwood trees. The disease is com-

mon in Texas and all across the southern United States. Relatively healthy trees are not invaded by the fungus, but the hypoxylon fungus will readily infect the sapwood of a tree that has been damaged, stressed, or weakened. The drought of last summer is certainly a stress that may have promoted this disease. According to the Texas Forest Service, hypoxylon canker activity usually increases when prolonged drought occurs. It is difficult for hypoxylon canker to develop in wood that has normal moisture content. When stress occurs, the fungus can become active in the tree and invade and decay the sapwood causing the tree to die. Once hypoxylon actively infects a tree, the tree will likely die.

on structures, roads, fences, powerlines, etc., should be removed as soon as possible. All oak trees are susceptible to hypoxylon canker, as are elm, pecan, hickory, sycamore, maple, beech, and more. The fungus spreads by airborne spores that apparently infect trees of any age by colonizing the inner bark. The fungus is known to be present in many healthy trees and can survive for long periods of time in the inner bark without invading the sapwood. As mentioned earlier, when a tree is weakened or stressed, the fungus may then invade the sapwood and become one of several factors that ultimately cause the tree to die.

Noticeable thinning of the crown or branch dieback, may be some of the first signs of the disease. As the fungus develops, small sections of bark will slough from the trunk and branches and collect at the base of the tree. Where the bark has sloughed off, tan, olive green, or reddish-brown, powdery spores can be seen. By the time the spores become visible, the tree is dead. In four to eight weeks, these tan areas will turn dark brown to black and become hard. They have the appearance of solidified tar. After several months, the areas will become a silver-gray color.

According to Joe Pase III, of the Texas Forest Service, there is no known control for hypoxylon canker other than maintaining tree vigor. Apparently the spores of this fungus are so common in most areas that removing trees infected with hypoxylon canker is of little value in controlling the spread of the disease. Also, infected firewood is not considered to be a source of inoculation. The fungus does not kill groups of trees by spreading from tree to tree. There is usually little that can be done to avoid naturally occurring stress factors, but many man-caused stress factors can be avoided. During drought periods, supplemental watering is recommended, if the tree is near a water source. Also, avoid compacting root systems during construction. Damage to tree roots predisposes a tree to infection by hypoxylon canker.

## Texas Department of Ag market recap

For the week ending May 19, feeder cattle prices at the Texas auctions covered by USDA Market News were mostly steady to \$2 higher per hundredweight (cwt), with a few to \$5 higher. The Texas direct feeder cattle

trade was mostly steady to \$4 higher, with the largest increases noted on cattle weighing 800 pounds or more. The Oklahoma City auction was steady to \$2 higher. Fed cattle cash prices were almost \$3 higher per cwt following increases in beef prices and supportive futures markets. Corn and grain sorghum prices were higher on news of large Chinese purchases and concerns about dry weather

in parts of the Corn Belt. Wheat prices were higher as strong export sales and reports of dry conditions in Kansas and the Black Sea region in Europe offset large current world supplies.

Winter wheat was rated in mostly fair to good condition with 99% of the acreage headed and 11% harvested for grain, both ahead of normal. Rains once again delayed harvest in parts of

Central Texas. Corn was 95% planted, slightly behind the 96% average, and 82% was emerged. The crop was rated in mostly good to fair condition. Grain sorghum planting was ahead of normal at 89% complete and 26% of the crop was headed. Pastures were rated in mostly fair to good condition, but still need rain in some areas.

## Farm wages up

The USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service released its annual farm labor report that shows farm wages are higher than last year.

During the reference week of Jan. 8-14, 2012, there were 575,000 workers hired directly by farm operators on the nation's farms and ranches. That number is down 5% from last year.

However, farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$11.52 per hour, up nearly 2% from 2011. Livestock workers averaged \$10.95 an hour, compared with \$10.52 a year ago.
