Fire blackens 70 acres of grass



Muenster VFD responded to a grass fire at 621 Coyote Way north of Muenster about 2:15 Tuesday afternoon. It is on property owned by Gary Knabe. The cause of the blaze is still under investigation. Assisting Muenster's six trucks and firemen were Lindsay VFD with four trucks and Myra VFD with two trucks. It required two hours and 10,950 gallons of water to douse the fire to the point where there was no more smoke. MVFD Chief Herbie Knabe noted that the winds were 15-20 mph, the humidity was 50-60%, and pastures were muddy causing two trucks to get stuck. The fire spread swiftly despite the higher humidity. Knabe advises caution with any type of outdoor burning this winter and spring, even when conditions are wet.

County appoints Jury of View panel for possible Road Map

By Janet Felderhoff With strict instructions that nobody should contact any of its members regarding evidence, Cooke County Commissioners Court appointed a panel of individuals to serve on a Jury of View for the County Road

Map. "These people should be considered a jury," noted County Judge John Roane. "There really should be no contact relating to the Road Map Program with any of these 10 people in any way trying to influence them one way or another. That should be our guidance as well as the public's guidance."

Each commissioner and the County Judge submitted the names of two potential members. The 10 names were read and all approved at the Monday, Feb. 14 regular meeting of Commission-ers Court. Only five of the 10 will actually serve on the

Appointed were: Precinct #1 Vernon Dozier and Gary Lewis; Precinct #2 Wilbur Smith and Ralph Craddock; Precinct #3 David Miller and Rudy Schumacher; Precinct and Paula Roberts.

The public hearing for the Jury of View to convene and hear evidence to determine the validity of the County's claim of existence of a public interest in one or more roads depicted in the proposed County Road Map will be on Monday, March 14 at 10 a.m. in the Board Room, 2nd floor of the Prosperity Bank building, Suite 214.

County Clerk Rebecca Lawson requested that \$25,000 in additional funding be added to her election line. She had requested \$65,000 during the budget hearing, but received only \$30,000. Commissioner Gary Hollowell reminded the County Clerk that she did not present numbers during the Budget Hearing to justify her need for the greater amount.

There are currently outstanding bills totaling \$22,000 that will be turned over to a collection agency if not paid soon. There is only \$4,627 remaining in the budget for election expenses. 
The Court voted unanimously to approve an additional \$25,000 to the election budget with the money coming from the Contingency

County Clerk Lawson also requested approval of a cell phone for the vital records clerk in her office. Comptroller reports on monthly local sales tax

The State's sales tax revenue in January was \$1.83 billion, an increase of 10.4% compared to January 2010.

'Sales tax revenues have now improved for the last 10 months, reflecting increased activity in almost all major economic sectors," Comptroller Susan Combs said. "The strongest growth was from sectors fueled by business spending, such as oil and gas activity. Tax collections from retail trade were also up.

Combs will send \$654.8 million in local sales tax to Texas cities, counties, transit systems, and special purpose taxing districts, up 5.9% compared to sales tax distributions to local governments in February 2010.

January State sales tax collections and February's local sales tax allocations represent sales made in December, and also include earlier sales by businesses that report sales tax to the Comptroller on a quarterly or annual basis.

The Comptroller will send \$440.3 million in sales tax to Texas cities, up 5.4% compared to February 2010 payments. Texas counties will receive February sales tax payments of \$39.7 million, up 13.1% compared to last February.



TDA market recap


For the week ending Feb. 12, feeder cattle auction prices were mostly steady with a few to \$5 lower per hundredweight and some to \$5 higher as another round of wintry weather reduced receipts at some locations and closed others. Fed cattle prices were near unchanged in spite of lower beef values.

Corn prices increased after USDA released projections for lower than expected end-

As for futures markets, feeder cattle, cotton, wheat, corn, and lumber were higher while fed cattle were lower. Cotton futures topped the all-time record high price ever reported for U.S. cotton of \$1.89 per pound during the

Civil War.

The winter wheat crop was rated in mostly fair to very poor condition as dry soils and last week's freezing temperatures continued to impact the crop. Field preparations are underway for spring planting, though moisture is needed in many areas. Pastures were reported in mostly fair to poor condition and livestock in many areas required supplemental feed. Spring calving, lambing, and kidding remained active with newborns at risk from last week's extremely cold



County Agent's Report

Controlling brush - a

good winter activity Controlling brush in your pasture and fence rows will increase the useful area of your pasture without the need to purchase more land.

Woody plants are a common component of many pastures in Texas. Some woody species provide food for livestock or wildlife, warmth and escape cover for deer, roost sites for turkeys, or resting cover for quail. Therefore, you may be very interested in keeping some areas of brush around.

However, if an area is too dense with woody plants, the plants compete with the more desirable vegetation for water, sunlight, and nutrients.

They also can reduce forage production for livestock and wildlife and can interfere with the handling and movement of livestock and wildlife harvests. Here in Cooke County, fence rows tend to be one area that is especially prone to excessive woody plant growth.

Most woody plants will not readily die after they are cut off. They tend to re-sprout from the roots. A high percentage of these plants can be killed, however, if you spray the stump with a specific herbicide treatment immediately after cutting it.

Brush Busters refers to cooperative program of the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Service to expedite the adoption of Tactical Brush Management Systems. Visiting the brush buster website at: http://texnat.tamu.edu about-2/brush-busters/ will give you the knowledge necessary to control many species of woody plants. Methods include basal treatments and using cut stump spray treatments that are easy, effective and environmentally responsible. These Brush Busters methods involve spraying a small but potent concentration of herbicide directly onto the cut stumps.

Keep in mind that controlling woody plants is not a one-time job.

Because livestock, wildlife, wind, and water can spread the seeds far, you will need to go over your land periodically to eliminate unwanted seedlings.

The Tri-County Farmer and Rancher Symposium will be held on Wednesday, Feb. 23. This is the 8th year Texas AgriLife Extension Service in Cooke, Montague, and Grayson counties will team up to offer five CEUs for those needing continuing education for their Texas Department of Agriculture Pesticide licenses. The program will provide useful information for anyone managing rural property; you do not need to have a pesticide license to attend. If you are interested in CEUs, the program will provide five hours. This represents 1/3 of the hours private applicators need for a five year period, and all of the hours a Commercial or Non-Commercial Applicator would need for a year. Categories for the CĚUs will include 1 "Laws and Regulations," 1 "IPM." and 3 "General."

We have an excellent group of speakers this year. Dr. Ron Gill, Extension beef specialist, will begin the day with "Preventing Chemical Residues in Beef"; Mike Porter, Noble Foundation Wildlife Specialist, will discuss 'Pros and Cons for Prescribed

Burning"; Bob Lusk, Wildlife and Fisheries consultant will talk about "Pond Management"; Henry Krusekopf, TDA field inspector will give us an update on pesticide "Laws and Regulations"; and finally, Dr. Twain Butler, Noble Foundation agronomy research leader, will talk about "Grazing Systems for Improved Grass Pastures."

Note that the program will be held at North Central Texas College's Field House, not the Little Theater this year. The Field House is the gymnasium which is located immediately to the South of tennis courts, near the back end of campus. Participants are encouraged to use the parking lot on the south side of the road after they pass the residence hall. The program times are 8:15 until 3:15. There is a \$10 fee; lunch will be provided.

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
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


