Heller resigns from Muenster Hospital administrative seat

Members of the Muenster Memorial Hospital Board of Directors received a shock during the executive session of the Dec. 21 regular Board meeting. Administrator Lynn Heller tendered his resignation to retire effective immediately.

Chief Operating Officer (COO) in training Michael Kent was authorized to serve as interim COO. Kent served MMH as the director of Radiology. He is also their Information Technology specialist and is the driving force in bringing the Hospital into Electronic Health Record (EHR) usage.

Following the executive session, the Board awarded Heller a bonus regarding performance and goals attained in 2010.

Net revenues for the month of November totaling \$570,768 with operating expenses totaling \$670,739 for a net operating revenue in November of negative \$99,971. Revenues of \$35,711 from ad valorem taxes brought the excess of revenues over expenses to a negative \$64,260 for Novem-

In November, there were 79 ER visits, 334 outpatients, 533 visits to the Family Health Clinic, and 766 Home Health visits. Percent aged 30.86 days.

Letter to the Editor

To the Editor:

First, I want to make it clear that I am not a personal friend of either Judge Roane or Steve Gaylord and that my comments are Intended as strictly impartial. I consider both Judge Roane and Mr. Gaylord to be political friends in spite of any differences in our opinions or support of political candidates. I met Judge (then Justice of the Peace) Roane several years ago when we both served on the Cooke County Home Hospice Advisory Committee. I learned to admire and respect then J.P. Roane for his genuine concern and interest in this community and its residents. I met Steve Gaylord a few years later when we had strong differences over a certain political issue. After discussing our differences, we recognized our individual right to support or protest against political issues, shook hands, and agreed to respect those differences over any future issues.

I agree with Mr. Terry Wyatt that personal attacks against a protestor – if those attacks are not germane to the issue - do not justify labeling the protestor with a derogatory connotation. Further, such "labeling" detracts from the real issue and weakens the attacker's' attempt to discredit the protestor's differences. It can also leave the impression that the attacker is unable to present valid contradictions

to the opinions offered by the protestor.

I voted for and have supported John Roane as our County Judge. I believe that Judge Roane and our Commissioners should respect the right of Cooke County individuals to agree or disagree with the political issues on which our Commissioners must make their decisions. I believe that these individuals should have the respect of the Commissioners' Court as long as the respect is mutual. Neither our political office holders nor the citizens of this county should forget that we should all want what is best for this county and its residents. Our country was not built upon a foundation of "follow the leader" or "political correctness." It was built upon our ancestors' freedom to protest against political issues with which they disagreed.

Kelly will be performing one of her most memorable characters for the COOKeIE event- Marie Dubois Empananda - a Medium- but the size of an extra large.








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Educator Spotlight

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New law brings relief to taxpayers

The country waited on pins and needles, hoping the lame duck Congress would give the gift of tax relief to taxpayers in 2011. On Dec. 17. Americans found hundreds of billions of dollars in tax savings in their stockings.

The Tax Relief, Unemployment Insurance Reauthorization and Job Creation Act of 2010 will cost the Treasury Department \$858 billion, with the intent of spurring the economy and putting money back into taxpayers' wallets.

Following are a few of the tax provisions that will provide some financial relief to America's farmers and ranchers in the near term.

• Estate taxes: Of utmost importance to the agriculture industry, the legislation set reasonable estate tax levels for the next two years, which will protect farmers and ranchers from estate tax levels that threatened the continuation of many family businesses at the death of a primary landowner. The revised estate tax level was set at a \$5 million exemption and 35% top rate through 2012.

• Small Business Expensing—Section 179: Under the Section 179 Small Business Expensing provisions, farmers and ranchers are able to deduct up to \$500,000 in equipment and capital at 100% depreciation through 2011. The latest tax bill upholds the \$500,000 level through next year. However, the total amount of approved deduction reduces to \$125,000 in 2012.

Although the level of exemption will decrease in 2012, producers still receive a tax benefit from the provision. For example, under the current level, a producer could use profits to purchase a new tractor or combine. The cost of the equipment—up to \$500,000 through 2011 and up to \$125,000 thereafter reduces the operation's total taxable income.

• Payroll Deductions: Americans will see their Social Security taxes reduced next year, thanks to the new tax law. Employees will pay

2% less in Social Security 31, 2011. The industry be-(FICA) taxes next year, decreasing the current rate of 6.2% to 4.2% per worker.

• Capital Gains Taxes: American investors will continue to pay a 15% tax on capital gains and dividends through 2012, according to the new tax law.

• Biofuel Exemptions: Corn and soybean farmers lauded the inclusion of continued biofuel tax incentives in the new tax legislation.

TDA market recap

For the week ending Jan. 8, feeder cattle auction prices were higher to sharply higher compared to pre-holiday markets. Demand remained strong for the available cattle as buyers attempted to rebuild inventories while the weather was still relatively mild. Fed cattle prices declined, but remain at historically high levels well above a year ago.

Grain prices decreased thanks to a stronger dollar, beneficial rains in South America, and weaker demand at the higher prices seen over the past few weeks.

As for futures markets, lumber was higher while feeder cattle, fed cattle, cotton, wheat, and corn were lower.

Most of the state south and east of a line from Wichita Falls to Pecos recorded precipitation during the week with amounts ranging from a trace to more than two inches in

The state's winter wheat crop was rated in mostly fair to poor condition with 93% of the acreage emerged. Wheat in the Blacklands and Cross Timbers regions benefited from recent rains while dry conditions continued to stress wheat on the High Plains. Pastures were rated in mostly very poor to fair condition and livestock across the state were fed supplemental hay and protein.

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County Agent's Report

Building a better hog trap

Feral hogs continue to grow in numbers in Texas. Because of their destructive feeding habits and potential to spread disease, feral hogs are a substantial liability to agriculture and native wildlife in Texas.

However, these animals are also sought for recreational hunting and commercial harvest. Dr. Billy Higginbotham, professor and Extension Wildlife and Fisheries specialist has been advocating a better way to harvest these animals - use a larger trap! Larger traps represent a

better opportunity to catch the most hogs at one time as compared to the smaller box traps that can only hold a few hogs or may be avoided altogether by some "trapwise" hogs. Do not re-release hogs that are trapped as this just causes problems for other landowners. In fact, it is illegal to capture and re-release hogs without having them screened by a veterinarian for brucellosis and pseudorabies. Texas Animal Health Commission has published a list of feral swine holding

facilities, where you may be brush or grass inside the trap able to sell feral swine. The list is available at: http:// www.tahc.state.tx.us/, then click on "feral swine holding facilities.'

Information available at feralhogs.tamu.edu tells us the best way to design a trap: Use sheep and goat panels (4" x 4" squares 5' high) or similar materials, and setup the trap in the area where damage is occurring. The trap should be supported at regular intervals (every 4 feet) by t-posts or other similar material and should not have gaps along the bottom where hogs might escape. This design is still portable as the entire trap can be dis-assembled and moved to another area on a flatbed trailer if no hog

activity is detected. Set the trap in a "tear drop" shape where the gate is located in the narrow or funnel area. This will help funnel the hogs towards a trailer backed up to the gate for loading. Avoid having "hard" corners in the trap design, as hogs will tend to pile into that corner and may go over the top. The area inside the trap does not have to be all short grass. It's okay to have some

and may help camouflage the trap itself and make the hogs less wary. It is important that the hogs have enough room to move away from you as you approach the trap to prevent

them from panicking. Further information on the trap door, baiting hogs, strategies for catching more hogs, and much more is also available at Texas AgriLife Extension Service's feral hog


