Candidates still sought by entities' in May elections

With only a week remaining to file as a candidate on the MISD School Board, City Council, and Hospital Board, all still need candidates. The deadline to file is at the close of business on Monday, March 14.

MISD positions up for election are Place 3 held by Ben Bindel and Place 4 held by Bert Walterscheid. As of Tuesday afternoon, only Doug Hermes had filed and he filed for Place 4. Anyone wishing to pick up an application to file as a MISD Board trustee may do so at the Administration office during regular business hours.

Muenster City Council will have a new mayor since John Pagel's term ends in May and he announced at the February meeting that he will not seek re-election.

Two aldermen, Jack Flusche and Joey Anderson, have terms expiring. Only Flusche had filed as of Tuesday afternoon. Anyone wishing to serve on the City Council may file at City Hall during regular business hours.

Muenster Hospital District has three Board positions up for election. They are currently held by Paul Becker, Mary Dangelmayr, and Danny Walterscheid. The sole candidates to file for those at-large positions is Jon Reed. Application packets are available at the MMH Administration office during business hours.

County considers adding vehicle for IT

To efficiently get its work done, the Cooke County IT department requires reliable transportation to the various County offices and precinct barns. The vehicle must be such that it can transport computers and ladders. Currently, IT Director Dana Sons has access to an Explorer that is shared with the maintenance department. She said she can't depend on it because it is often in use when she needs it. She uses her personal vehicle, but can't carry ladders in it. She is reimbursed for mileage.

A possible solution would be to transfer a Trailblazer from the Sheriff's department to the IT department. The vehicle is slated to be auctioned.

Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith felt they needed to know more because it would be like increasing the budget for the year to add another vehicle to the motor pool. Just since he's been in office, they have added four vehicles in support of facilities. Precinct #4 Commissioner Leon Klement wondered if it would be cheaper to pay mileage or to add another vehicle.

County Judge John Roane noted that the problem is that she can't haul equipment with her vehicle. Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell felt that the Explorer should be dedicated to the IT department.

It was also noted that one of the maintenance vehicles has major motor problems.

Following discussion, it was decided to take no action on the matter until the next meeting. Judge Roane appointed Commissioners Smith and Hollowell to study it and bring a recommendation to the March meeting.

Following an executive session, the Court voted unanimously to approve a temporary position for the District Attorney's office effective immediately until March 30. This will provide sufficient office help while an employee is on leave and several trials are scheduled.

Cooke County Fire Marshal Ray Fletcher spoke against the need to institute a burn ban. The KBDI (Keetch-Byram Drought Index) indicates that 230 is the average and the low 106 with a high of 384. This did not include Sunday night's rain which Fletcher noted was more along Hwy. 82 and north so the numbers would drop.

"KBDI does not take into account the state of vegetation and we do still have some dormant grasses out there," observed Fletcher. "Although, in my travels I've

seen quite a bit more green than we had through the winter. I think we are starting to enter that time."

According to Fletcher, fire activity over the past several weeks has been low. "The few we've had have been the result of careless burning," he said. "People who light brush piles in the morning when it is nice and damp and calm and by afternoon the humidity goes down and the wind picks up and so we end up out there putting out their pastures. Those we've had have been easy to control. They've been able to get a handle on it pretty quick."

At this point Fletcher did not recommend a burn ban. "I think it is an action that we use only when the conditions really do dictate or warrant and we have the opportunity for that disastrous fire. Right now, most yards are starting to get some green in them and any place that has been grazed is starting to get some green in them. There is still some high, old growth out there and some native stuff, but I think the potential is certainly manageable right now....People are paying attention and hopefully being smart for the most part. Right now, people are being relatively responsible and taking care of their business."

Most people are calling when they plan to burn brush piles, etc. On high fire danger days, they are encouraged not to burn.

Fletcher accepted another appointment by the Court for a two-year term as Cooke County Fire Marshal. He said he has fulfilled all of the qualifications necessary for the position.

Sheriff Mike Compton gave the monthly population

- Approved contracts with Woodbine Water Supply for the installation of a fresh water line on CR 263 and CR 262, and for installation of a fresh water line at the intersection of CR 123 and CR 194, and for the installation of a fresh water line on CR 281.

Census reveals facts on County

Statistics from the U.S. Government's 2010 Census count has recently been released. A QuickFacts report on Cooke County revealed that the County's population rose 6.3% from 36,365 in 2000 to 38,650 in 2009. Of that number, 7.5% were under the age of five, 25.7% were under age 18, and 14.9% were 65 years old or older. Females were 50.4% of the population.

In 2009, the census shows that 93.5% of the County's population was white with white persons not Hispanic at 78.9%. Others races show the County to have 3.3% blacks, 1.3% American Indian and Alaskan native, 0.7%

Asian, no native Hawaiians or other Pacific Islanders, 1.3% reported being two or more races, and 15.2% Hispanic or Latino origin.

In 2008, 11.9% of Cooke County's population was below the poverty line compared to 15.8% across Texas. The median household income in 2008 was reported at \$49,705 and across Texas \$50,049. Per capita money income in 1999 was \$17,889 in Cooke County and \$19,617 across Texas.

Private nonfarm establishments in 2008 showed to be 896 and private nonfarm employment that year was 13,039. The percent of change from 2000 to 2008 in private nonfarm employment was 9.7%.

Abigail's Arms gets \$190,000 from grant

In order to close gaps in services to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, Abigail's Arms - Cooke County Family Crisis Center applied for funding to the U.S. Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women under the OVW Fiscal Year 2010 Rural Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence and Stalking Assistance Program grant in order to establish, credential, and provide the services of a Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) and a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) programs in and for Cooke County.

Abigail's Arms - Cooke County Family Crisis Center made this application with 11 collaborative community partners. These partners include: City of Gainesville Police Department, City of

Lindsay Police Department, City of Muenster Police Department, City of Oak Ridge Police Department, City of Valley View Police Department, Cooke County Sheriff's Office, Cooke County District Attorney's Office, Cooke County Attorney's Office, North Central Texas College - School of Health Sciences, the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services - Cooke County Regional Office, and North Texas Medical Center.

This was a competitive application process beginning in February of 2010 and continued through the late fall of last year. Nationwide, there were 226 applications filed, with only 24 program applications funded. This grant has been awarded to Abigail's Arms for service in and to Cooke County and providing services to surrounding counties as needed and requested. Abigail's Arms is one of only three applications funded in the State of Texas under this process.

The specifics of this grant are as follows:

- Total grant award of \$190,000 over two years;
- Provides funding for the purchase of all needed equipment for the SANE program and the forensic interview program - \$107,000 of the total budget;
- Provides for training expenses related to the collaborative partners, nurses, and other stakeholders;
- Provides salary support for a program coordinator;
- Provides for supplemental payments to nurses while they undergo training;
- Provides for the planning and credentialing of both the SART and SANE programs;
- Permanently establishes these programs as part of the victim services available in Cooke County.

Currently, all victims of sexual assault from Cooke County are transported out of county for SANE exams and

DPS discourages Spring Break travel to Mexico

The Texas Department of Public Safety is urging Spring Breakers to avoid traveling to Mexico because of continued violence - and reminding boaters to stay on the U.S. side of Falcon Lake.

Falcon Lake has been the scene of several robberies and a U.S. citizen's murder, and DPS is again warning boaters to steer clear of the Mexican side of the lake. Cartel activity remains high in that area.

"While drug cartel violence is most severe in northern Mexico, it is prominent in other parts of the country as well," said DPS Director Steven C. McCraw. "Various crime problems also exist in many popular resort areas, such as Acapulco and Cancun, and crimes against U.S. citizens often go unpunished."

So far this year, an ICE agent was killed and another injured in a suspected ambush near San Luis Potosi Feb. 15. Two El Paso teens were gunned down Feb. 5 in Ciudad Juarez. In January, a Texas missionary was shot in the head when she and her husband ran an illegal road block in Nuevo Leon.

In addition to U.S. citizens killed so far this year, preliminary figures show as many as 65 Americans were killed in Mexico in 2010. Kidnapping, sexual assault, robbery, and carjacking also are threats in parts of Mexico. Suspects have not been prosecuted in many of the cases.

Meanwhile, more than 30,000 Mexican citizens have died in drug-related violence since 2006, and the violence shows no signs of abating.

"Drug violence has not discriminated - innocent bystanders and people who may have been in the wrong place at the wrong time are among the casualties. Underestimating the violence in Mexico would be a mistake for parents and students," said McCraw. "Our safety message is simple: avoid traveling to Mexico during Spring Break and stay alive."

DPS acknowledges that many travel to Mexico without incident, but the risks cannot be ignored. Travelers are encouraged to carefully research any planned trips.

Free online training for 'healthy' watersheds

The Texas Watershed Steward program recently made its popular watershed steward training course available online, according to program coordinators.

"If you are unable to attend one of our many watershed steward workshops across the state, you can still benefit from all of the information simply by viewing our materials online," said Nikki Dictson, Texas Agriculture Extension Service program specialist and Texas Watershed Steward program coordinator.

Dictson said the online course can be found at <http://tws.tamu.edu/online-course>. The course consists of five modules, a glossary of terms and acronyms, and additional information on water quality agencies and information sources.

Those wishing to take the course can register on the

site. There is no cost for the online training and no time limit for completing the course materials.

"Visitors can view the materials as a guest user or may enroll in the course to receive a certificate of completion, which requires completing all the course modules and a quick pre- and post-test," she said. "They'll also have access to all of the same information supplied in the face-to-face workshops we hold around the state."

Dictson said the training gives participants the basic knowledge and tools they need to form a watershed action group, participate in watershed protection activities, and become more involved in protecting and enhancing their community water resources.

She added that all watersheds in Texas are threatened by nonpoint sources of

pollution and that federal and state water-resource management agencies have adopted a watershed-scale approach for managing water quality.

"One vital component of this approach involves engaging local stakeholders to become actively involved in planning and implementing water resource management and protection programs in their watershed," Dictson said. "The Texas Watershed Steward program was initiated to provide science-based, watershed education to help citizens identify and take action to address local water quality impairments."

She said the online watershed steward course currently may be viewed in Internet Explorer or Mozilla Firefox, and that course module sections can be viewed by clicking on the individual links found below each module.

Many parents and students hesitate to even apply because they do not think they will qualify for financial aid. The problem with that is, even if you do not qualify for a PELL Grant, you must have the FAFSA form sent in to qualify for other student assistance, such as state-aided grants, work-study programs, student loans, scholarships, and other opportunities for attending college. Many times there are special circumstances in a family that do not show up on a financial aid report that colleges will honor; such as changes in the family income during the year, illness, disability, job displacement, and other issues. The FAFSA is now simpler to fill out due to the on-line version and is well worth the time and effort.

What can take hours to complete on your own can be completed in a very short amount of time with the assistance of the NCTC staff! 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DPS discourages Spring Break travel to Mexico

The Texas Department of Public Safety is urging Spring Breakers to avoid traveling to Mexico because of continued violence - and reminding boaters to stay on the U.S. side of Falcon Lake.

Falcon Lake has been the scene of several robberies and a U.S. citizen's murder, and DPS is again warning boaters to steer clear of the Mexican side of the lake. Cartel activity remains high in that area.

"While drug cartel violence is most severe in northern Mexico, it is prominent in other parts of the country as well," said DPS Director Steven C. McCraw. "Various crime problems also exist in many popular resort areas, such as Acapulco and Cancun, and crimes against U.S. citizens often go unpunished."

So far this year, an ICE agent was killed and another injured in a suspected ambush near San Luis Potosi Feb. 15. Two El Paso teens were gunned down Feb. 5 in Ciudad Juarez. In January, a Texas missionary was shot in the head when she and her husband ran an illegal road block in Nuevo Leon.

In addition to U.S. citizens killed so far this year, preliminary figures show as many as 65 Americans were killed in Mexico in 2010. Kidnapping, sexual assault, robbery, and carjacking also are threats in parts of Mexico. Suspects have not been prosecuted in many of the cases.

Meanwhile, more than 30,000 Mexican citizens have died in drug-related violence since 2006, and the violence shows no signs of abating.

"Drug violence has not discriminated - innocent bystanders and people who may have been in the wrong place at the wrong time are among the casualties. Underestimating the violence in Mexico would be a mistake for parents and students," said McCraw. "Our safety message is simple: avoid traveling to Mexico during Spring Break and stay alive."

DPS acknowledges that many travel to Mexico without incident, but the risks cannot be ignored. Travelers are encouraged to carefully research any planned trips.

Free online training for 'healthy' watersheds

The Texas Watershed Steward program recently made its popular watershed steward training course available online, according to program coordinators.

"If you are unable to attend one of our many watershed steward workshops across the state, you can still benefit from all of the information simply by viewing our materials online," said Nikki Dictson, Texas Agriculture Extension Service program specialist and Texas Watershed Steward program coordinator.

Dictson said the online course can be found at <http://tws.tamu.edu/online-course>. The course consists of five modules, a glossary of terms and acronyms, and additional information on water quality agencies and information sources.

Those wishing to take the course can register on the

site. There is no cost for the online training and no time limit for completing the course materials.

"Visitors can view the materials as a guest user or may enroll in the course to receive a certificate of completion, which requires completing all the course modules and a quick pre- and post-test," she said. "They'll also have access to all of the same information supplied in the face-to-face workshops we hold around the state."

Dictson said the training gives participants the basic knowledge and tools they need to form a watershed action group, participate in watershed protection activities, and become more involved in protecting and enhancing their community water resources.

She added that all watersheds in Texas are threatened by nonpoint sources of

pollution and that federal and state water-resource management agencies have adopted a watershed-scale approach for managing water quality.

"One vital component of this approach involves engaging local stakeholders to become actively involved in planning and implementing water resource management and protection programs in their watershed," Dictson said. "The Texas Watershed Steward program was initiated to provide science-based, watershed education to help citizens identify and take action to address local water quality impairments."

She said the online watershed steward course currently may be viewed in Internet Explorer or Mozilla Firefox, and that course module sections can be viewed by clicking on the individual links found below each module.

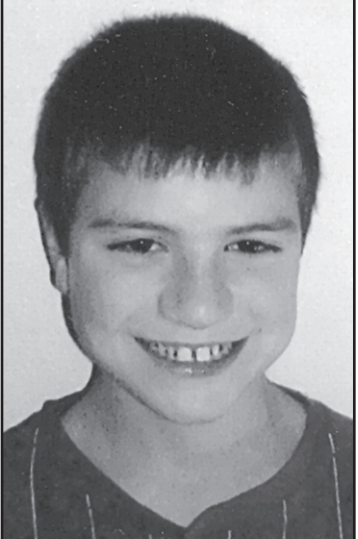

Many parents and students hesitate to even apply because they do not think they will qualify for financial aid. The problem with that is, even if you do not qualify for a PELL Grant, you must have the FAFSA form sent in to qualify for other student assistance, such as state-aided grants, work-study programs, student loans, scholarships, and other opportunities for attending college. Many times there are special circumstances in a family that do not show up on a financial aid report that colleges will honor; such as changes in the family income during the year, illness, disability, job displacement, and other issues. The FAFSA is now simpler to fill out due to the on-line version and is well worth the time and effort.

Morrison faced 21 batters, allowed 5 hits, struck out 6, walked 5, and had 1 unearned run.

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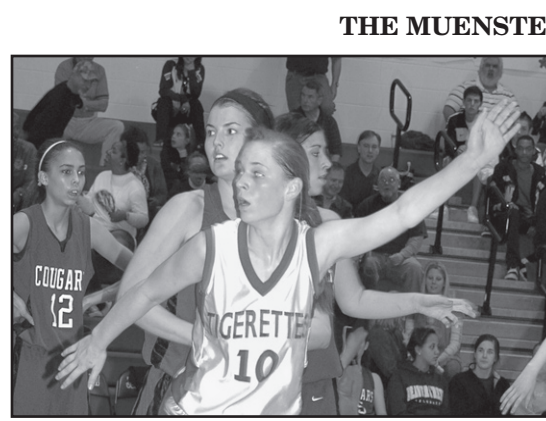
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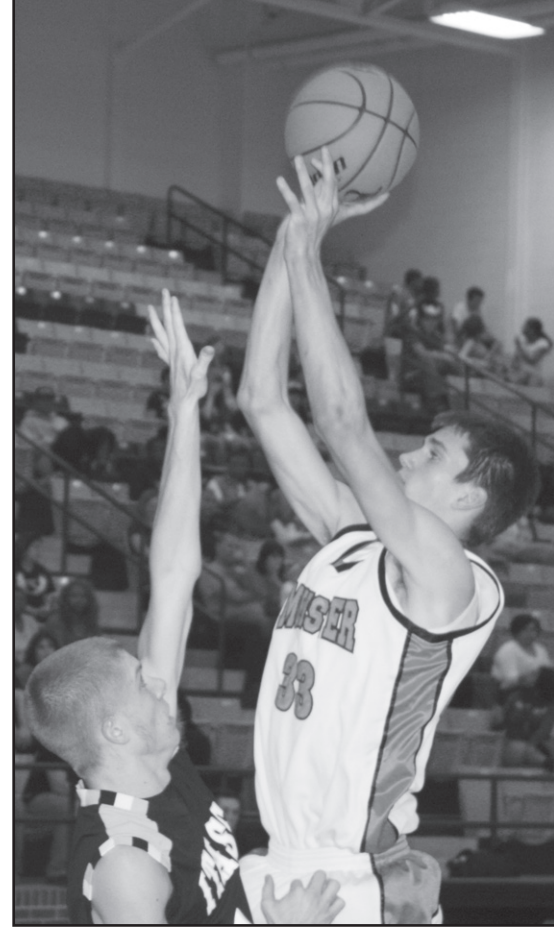
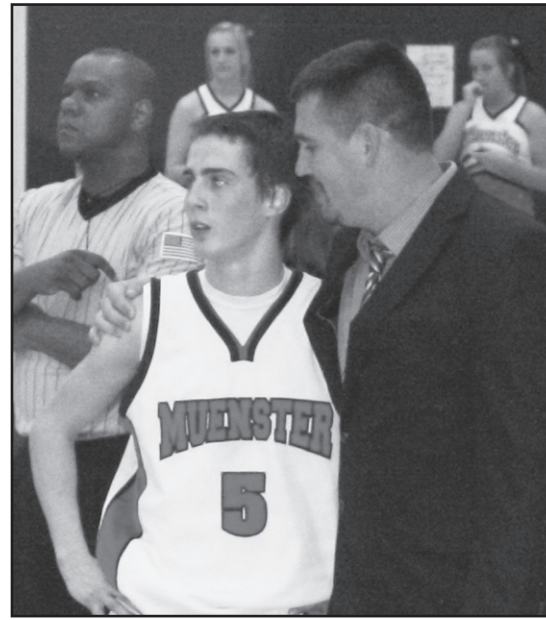
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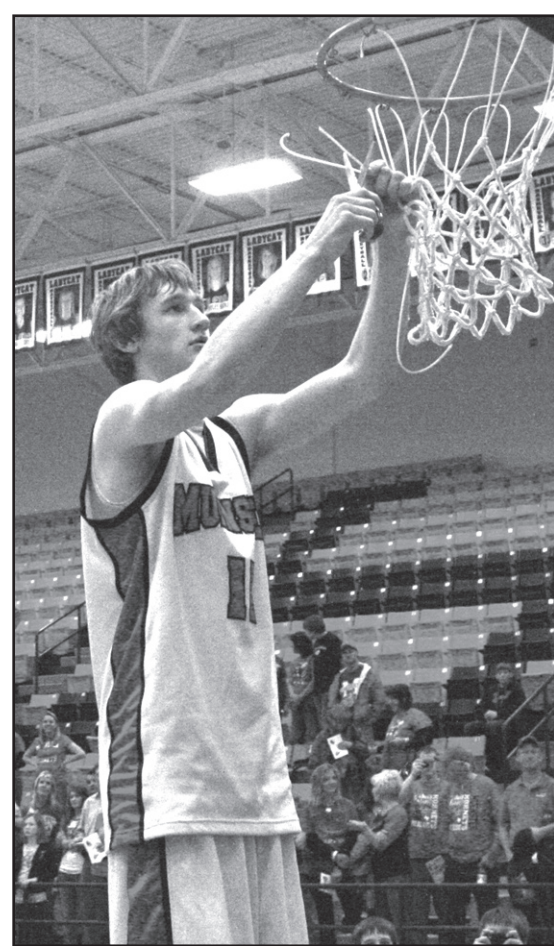

NCBA opposes dust regulations

Unreasonable regulation of dust by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) could cripple farmers and ranchers, as well as rural communities, according to the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA). The organization released a statement indicating the EPA regulations would be twice as stringent as the current standard and could push several areas into noncompliance or nonattainment.

NCBA commissioned John Richards, Ph.D., P.E., of Air Quality Control Techniques, to evaluate the potential impact the added EPA regulations would have on farmers and ranchers and rural communities.

"Regulating dust at levels twice as stringent will wreak havoc in rural agricultural

areas in the country that would have to purchase new, expensive technologies to control dust," Tamara Thies, NCBA chief environmental counsel, said of Dr. Richards' findings. "If EPA moves forward with a proposed rule as we anticipate, farmers and ranchers could be fined for driving down a dirt road, moving cattle from one pasture to the next, or tilling a field."

Rural communities across the country that currently have attainment status will move to nonattainment status, including areas of Texas.

"In our industry, dust is inevitable, but if EPA moves forward, entire states could be thrown into nonattainment or be on the brink of nonattainment where slight changes in dust emissions

or weather conditions could throw them into nonattainment," Thies added. "The bureaucrats at EPA may not understand our industry, but this study is further proof that regulating dust at such unprecedented levels will be financially devastating for production agriculture."

USDA calls for record corn yield

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is projecting record output for the 2011-12 U.S. corn harvest. Economists speculate that strong commodity market prices and ethanol production are two reasons for the corn acreage increase, reaching more than 90 million. Corn production for ethanol use is projected at five billion bushels.

USDA projects the U.S. soybean crop to yield more than three billion bushels while wheat projections are estimated at 2.08 billion bushels. Total U.S. agricultural exports are estimated at a record \$135.5 billion, compared to \$88 billion in imports.

Overall, economists see supplies remaining tight this year, due to biofuels and demand. Some industry experts contend that the USDA's estimates are high and output could fall short of the acreage projections.

TDA market recap

For the week ending Feb. 26, feeder cattle auction prices were mostly steady to \$7 higher per hundredweight, though a few lower prices were noted later in the week. Tight supplies and higher fed cattle continue to support the market. Fed cattle prices followed wholesale beef values higher.

As for futures markets, fed cattle and corn were higher while feeder cattle, cotton, wheat, and lumber were lower.

Soil moisture supplies were reported adequate to short in most of East Texas and mostly short to very short in West Texas. Warmer weather during the week boosted wheat growth, though much of the crop remains stressed by dry conditions and earlier freezes.

Statewide, the crop was rated in mostly fair to very poor condition. Preparations for spring planting are underway in many areas with some corn and grain sorghum planted in South and Central Texas. Pastures were rated in mostly fair to poor condition and need moisture in many areas. The extremely dry conditions and very high winds contributed to wildfires in the Cross Timbers region and on the High Plains.

County Agent's Report

Calculating lawn area

If you don't already know, calculating the area of your lawn needs to be the first lawn task for the growing season. Knowing how many square feet you have in your landscape is extremely important. Without this information, you will only be guessing at the correct amount of fertilizer or pesticide to apply to your lawn. Failing to know this information often leads to over application of product which will cost you money and cause run-off into the streets and then the nearby streams. Therefore, calculating the size of your lawn is the first step to take toward good environmental stewardship.

Examples of times when you need this information include: applying a fertilizer, pesticide, topdressing material, irrigation water, and when purchasing seed, sod, sprigs, or plugs during establishment of turfgrass.

If every lawn was a rectangle, this would be an easy process. However, very few of us have that scenario, therefore the calculation can be done one of several ways: calculate the entire lot and subtract non-lawn areas, or break the lawn down into sections and calculate the area of each, then add them together. I believe the second suggestion may be the most straightforward. Simply decide what geometric shape each section of lawn is and use the formula for that shape to determine area. Examples of this are: squares and rectangles = length x width; triangles = (length of base x height)/2; circles = 3.14 x (1/2 distance across circle x 1/2 distance across circle).

In order to apply products in an appropriate manner with an environmentally friendly approach, one must take the time to measure and calculate the surface area of their site. It is an easy task to perform, it doesn't take a lot of time, and the calculations are relatively easy. In addition, you will normally only need to measure the site once. Record the information and save it. So, do the right thing and measure the surface area of your landscape. More importantly, use this value when applying products to your lawn.

Groundwater Awareness Week, March 6-12

Groundwater is a precious resource for America's rural communities—bringing livelihood to crops, as well as providing a basic need to residents. American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF) will join the National Ground Water Association (NGWA) to promote responsible groundwater management during National Groundwater Awareness Week, March 6-12.

"Although groundwater is critically important everywhere, nowhere is it more important than in rural America," said AFBF President Bob Stallman. "Groundwater is the lifeblood of our rural families and our agricultural economy."

Stallman added that 96% of rural Americans depend on groundwater for their water supply and crop irrigation. However, he also noted that responsible groundwater

management is critical for urban residents, as well.

"This is not just a rural issue. Urban areas can consume large amounts of groundwater through public water systems, and heavily populated areas can do much to harm groundwater quality," Stallman said. "It is to everyone's benefit to adjust their habits to protect groundwater."

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U.S. cattle inventory experiencing record lows

Increased demand and higher input costs are causes for concern about the nation's shrinking cattle herd size. According to a *San Angelo Standard Times* article, the herd is down to about 92 million head, the lowest number in more than 50 years.

Higher beef prices are slowing demand as the first quarter of 2011 is over halfway done. Live cattle futures are trading near the record high set last month at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. A recent Reuters report said consumers are grappling with

higher food prices and turning to normally economical choices, including select beef cuts such as the chuck or round commonly ground into hamburger meat.

According to a USDA forecast, beef production is projected at 25.66 billion pounds in 2011. Select beef last week averaged \$168.22 per hundredweight or 55 cents more than the choice beef priced at \$167.67.

"The decline in the national cattle herd has been ongoing since the mid-1970s," said James Hunt, with Amarillo-based Texas Cattle Feeders Association, in the article. "There are many factors involved in this contraction. Availability of affordable land is an issue. Prolonged droughts in various regions of the country have been a problem. High prices for calves and feeder cattle have given cow-calf operators an incentive to not hold back heifers for breeding purposes. And bad government policies, such as excessive estate taxes and burdensome environmental regulations that are not founded on sound science, have helped to drive some cattlemen and cattlemen out of the business."

Market experts say that while this year is predicted to be good for ranchers, they need to start building herds and keeping replacement breeding stock for years ahead.
