MMH develops organization for **Volunteer Services**

pital launched a search for people-friendly volunteers who are willing to donate several hours of their time as a volunteer at the Hospital. The Hospital's goal is to have patients and visitors greeted with a warm reception when they enter the fa-

Volunteers will definitely man a desk in the front lobby to assist with information and directions. As the number of volunteers increases, they may also be asked to do an assortment of other tasks.

On Tuesday, March 22, a core group of enthusiastic potential volunteers met with MMH employees Debbie Neu and Jerry Pickett, CFO. Neu will spearhead the Volunteer Services orga-

The group chose red lab coats as their uniform. They learned that those benefits such as CareFlite membership for \$10 per year and FIT Center membership at the employee cost of \$10 per month will be available to those who volunteer on a regular basis. That mini-

mum was voted by those present to be three shifts per month. Other benefits include a free lunch for those working over the lunch hour and recognition such as on birthdays, etc.


Although it may change as the program develops, shifts for the present were divided into three per day. The first is from 7:30 to 10:30 a.m., the second from 10:30 to 1:30, and the third from 1:30 to 5 p.m. It is hoped that there will be sufficient volunteers to have at least two per shift. They will serve Mondays through Fridays.

It was stressed that those who want to be a part of the Volunteer Services, but who have other obligations that preclude them from volunteering for the hours required for minimum benefits, are still welcome to serve as a volunteer for the time that they can commit to the organization.

Also welcome are high school volunteers. They might especially wish to volunteer time over the summer. This could count toward their required volunteer service hours.

Bayer granted Life-Saving Award

As a part of its annual Loss Control Conference, the Texas Electric Cooperatives (TEC) bestowed a life-saving award to Cooke County Electric Cooperative employee Ryan Bayer for going out of his way and alerting a man to get out of his home because, unbeknownst to him, it was on fire.

On this particular day, while performing work on service orders in his territory, Ryan noticed flames coming from a nearby house. His volunteer firefighter intuition kicked in and he immediately

went to survey the scene. He noticed a car seat on the front porch which further committed his efforts.

General Manager Neil Hesse stated. "This is who Ryan Bayer is. He is totally committed to his job and to mankind. I am very thankful and proud of his efforts."

Ryan, who also is a volunteer fireman in Muenster, called 911 to alert emergency personnel of the situation. Because of Ryan's quick action, no one was injured and the fire was contained before any major damage was done to the home.

CX Debaters medal at State

The Muenster High School **Cross-Examination** Debate team consisting of Brooke Walterscheid and Hannah Weger took 3rd place in the State CX Debate Tournament in Austin on March 14 and 15. Hannah also brought home a Bronze Gavel, awarded her for her outstanding individual speaker abilities.

The Conference 1A State Tournament included 57 teams from districts all over Texas.

On Monday, the young women debated in four rounds for approximately eight hours of debate, allowing them to break into finals on Tuesday. On Tuesday the Walterscheid and Weger team debated in the Octafinals, Quarterfinals, and Semifinals for approximately another six hours.

the Board voted unanimous- year manufacturer's warly to cancel the May 14 election. They also certified that Walterscheid and Reed were unopposed.

Remodeling of the nurses' station must be done in preparation for the installation of the EHR (Electronic Health Records) equipment. This includes moving a 30" monitor out of radiology to the nurs-es' station so the doctors can read x-rays there.

Two bids were received on the remodeling project. Bidding were Simmons Construction and C & W Cabinets. The C & W bid did not include removal of the existing wall and removal of old cabinets. This would be done by MMH maintenance staff. C & W's bid of \$9,803 was approved. Flooring for the area is estimated at \$7,000. The Board approved a budget of \$18,000 for the total

project. Discussion took place at the February meeting on how to make the front office more patient friendly. Kent showed a proposed floor plan with a new counter and the new glass wall removed. A hallway would be opened from the ER through the business office for patient check in.

Also, Kent reported that the Hospital Auxiliary had met and was very excited about a proposed volunteer service similar to North Texas Medical Center's Pink Ladies. A desk would be set up in the front lobby to accommodate them.

John Aytes reported on what he'd learned about NTMC's Pink Ladies. He said that they hope to start with at least 10 or 11 people to begin within weeks. It will be headed by a Hospital em-

No action will be taken until the success of the volunteer group is taken into the equation.

Repairs are necessary to the roof of the MMH Family Health Clinic. Two bids were reviewed, one from Cooke County Roofing for \$3,578.76 and one from Jimco Roofing Co. for \$7,500. The Board voted to take the Cooke County Roofing bid, but did not want to put in the drains they recommended.

The Hospital's 1998 Olympus scope used for colonoscopies is damaged. It was sent off for repairs. Estimated cost to repair was \$9,715. The manufacturer offered a newer model scope that will fit with the current monitors and light source which is a pre-owned demo. With a one ranty, that scope would cost \$10,763.45 including the old one as a trade-in. The Board approved the purchase.

CFO Jerry Pickett introduced Glenda Mendoza. She is performing an independent opinion of the MMH Swing Bed Program. As chief nursing officer at a hospital in Pittsburgh, Texas, she set up a successful Swing Bed Program. They had searched for a PhD physical therapist with familiarity of Swing Bed Programs, but found

Mendoza remarked, "This is a great little hospital and has all of the potential in the world. The Swing Bed is very, very important. It's your building foundation." She said the facility that Jerry told them about had gotten them into a brand new facility, a \$60 million hospital.

In other business, the MMH Board:

Heart disease is a ladykiller best to be avoided

Heart disease is the No.1 least 30 minutes a day. killer of women in the U.S., claiming nearly twice as many lives as all forms of cancer combined.

"There are many theories as to why women have a higher mortality rate from heart disease," said interventional cardiologist Dr. Elizabeth Holper of UT Southwestern Medical Center. "Research has demonstrated that patients who know the status of their risk factors – including cholesterol levels and blood pressure – and who control these risks – do better in the long term."

Other steps women can take to reduce their risk of heart disease include quitting smoking, lowering the amount of saturated fat in their diets, and exercising at

"Most of all, talk with your doctor about your risk," says Dr. Holper. "It should be a top priority.

Fannie loved the Muenster community and all the people who were her friends and helpers. She felt that Muenster was her extended



A Cattle Queen ahead of her time

During the month of March, we celebrate Women's History Month and the many contributions generations of women have made to the fabric and culture of this great country. Texas has been home to scores of influential, intelligent, colorful, and unforgettable females. From Emily West, the Yellow Rose of Texas, to Bessie Coleman, the nation's first African American female aviator, and down the line to political trailblazers like U.S. Representative Barbara Jordan, U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison, and Texas' 45th Governor, Ann Richards—Texas is no stranger to powerful and strong women. One of these was Elizabeth

"Lizzie" Ellen Johnson, a young woman from Hays County, Texas, who did not let social norms of the day stop her from pursuing her dreams. Born on May 9, 1840, in Cole County, Missouri, Johnson and her family relocated to Hays County in the mid-1840s, where Mr. and Mrs. Johnson established the Johnson Institute, a private secondary school. After attending the Johnson Institute, Lizzie Johnson began teaching there and at several other schools in Central Texas. Though she continued teaching, she also took on bookkeeping duties for several well known cattlemen, such as George W. Littlefield and William H. Day. On top of these responsibilities, she found yet another way to earn extra money-by moonlighting as a freelance writer. Using a pen name, she wrote articles of short fiction for magazines and newspapers, such as Illustrated Weekly. Over time, she earned and saved enough money to invest in something she had observed and determined lucrative—cattle. Johnson first invested in a Chicago cattle company, and after three years, she had made significant profits that she in turn used to buy

Johnson registered her cattle brand on June 1, 1871, under the name of Elizabeth Johnson. She then purchased 10 acres in Austin – paying \$3,000 in gold dollars. According to some historical accounts, Johnson was able to grow her herd during the Civil War by overseeing a process called "brushpopping." With so many men away at war, and with few fences to keep cattle corralled, the population of unbranded cattle in the brush

cattle and land.

of South Texas began to flourish. During those times, unbranded cattle were "finders' keepers" for those willing to round them up and transport them. Johnson employed hands to do her "brushpopping" for her – or combing the thicket for cattle. In 1879, Johnson, tall and

striking, married preacher and widower Hezekiah "Hez" G. Williams. While it is reported that Johnson cared deeply for Williams, she did not let her heart rule her business decisions and convinced him to sign a prenuptial agreement. During the course of their marriage, Williams would often make poor business decisions, and Johnson would agree to bail him out of his financial binds. But once he earned his money back, she expected him to repay her. A woman who marched to the

beat of her own drum, Johnson is perhaps best remembered for the literal trail she blazed when she became the first woman in Texas to drive her own herd of cattle up the Chisholm Trail. It is said that Williams accompanied her but drove his own, separate herd. It was in this way that they would lead the rest of their married life – together but separate. Successful in business—due mostly to Johnson's acumen—the couple enjoyed traveling and Johnson had a love for fine clothes and the newest fashion trends. When Williams passed away in El Paso in 1914, it is said that Johnson purchased a \$600, top-of-the-line coffin for him, and when she signed the bill of payment, she wrote across it, "I loved this old buzzard this much."

In her final years, Johnson became somewhat of a recluse. She often dressed as if she were impoverished and survived on a meager diet of soup and crackers. For these reasons, when Johnson passed away on October 9, 1924, it came as quite a surprise to Austinites to learn she left behind a fortune of nearly \$250,000. Family members found thousands of dollars in diamonds locked away in her basement and other colorful items like exotic parrot feathers around her house.

Lizzie Johnson was a successful businesswoman, investor, cattle dealer, and landowner long before it was considered acceptable for a woman to enter these arenas. Her feisty determination, confidence, and selfrespect drove her to excel in a

Antilley, the Center coordinator and parent to a 16 year old with autism, said the website not only provides clarity but conveys a sense of urgency that prompt action is crucial. "Research is showing that intensive intervention at a very early age can make a big difference in outcomes. We're talking about significant improvements in IQ and less support needed in school and life.

Antilley, whose own son has progressed well with the help of therapies and assistance in the classroom, recommends that parents use the website's wealth of information as a foundation of knowledge for working with doctors, teachers, and thera-

According to Antilley, "One of the most troubling things about autism is that it often shows up in a child who's developed pretty normally for one or two years, then begins to regress.

Classic autism symptoms such as lack of eye contact, loner tendencies, tantrums, obsessive behaviors, and language difficulties may not be recognized for what they are in a very young child. "And when regression is involved, some parents have to reach the point of admitting to themselves, 'I no longer recognize my own child before they seek professional help," Antilley said.

with autism spectrum disorder, treatments such as applied behavior analysis, speech and occupational therapy, combined with special education services, often lead to positive outcomes.

Individual circumstances and realism are important too, Antilley cautioned. "Unfortunately, even the best therapy and services don't always make a significant difference if the condition is very severe. Many people with autism spectrum disorder are able to live independently, have jobs, get married, and enjoy pretty normal lives as adults. Others will be cared for all their lives and struggle to develop relationships with people."

Despite the uncertainties that still surround autism, Antilley stressed that families affected by the condition owe it to themselves to take advantage of the knowledge and services that do exist. And the Texas Autism Research & Resource Center website is a great place to start.

The depth and credibility of resources on the website are backed by a statewide consortium of experts from more than 30 colleges, universities, medical centers, non profit organizations, and state agencies.

The agency partners include DADS, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, the Department of State Health Services, the Department of Family and Protective Services, and the Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services.

"The empowering resources available through this website are a great first step to understanding autism and dealing with the challenges it creates," Antilley said.

Let's go Fishing

How to use a fishing rod

Rods are basically made from carbon. Plastic, composite carbon combined with Kevlar, which is a kind of material that is bullet proof, or just high carbon. The carbon's force and strength in connection to its mass is light, making it strong material that can allow thinner fabrication but still is able to keep the span and length. A rod that is lighter evidently handling will be easier, controlling it would be less tiring on one's arms and reduces resistance to air giving one an easier time accurately casting it, particularly on windy days.

Rods come in silicon carbide, hard chrome, or ceramic rings having a function of letting the line pass through. These are precisely used because of their smoothness having the function to minimize friction when passing through the line and keep the maximum strength. Silicon materials are in fact costly. so an alternative is to bring into play ceramic rings like Zircon which when taken into account, are not as tough or as light, but are much more cost effective. Rings made of chrome are better, although every season they require replacement, they do deliver an excellent job of line running. At least 13 rings are needed from the handle all through the tip, lesser near the handle, needing more close to the tip. The line can fasten itself to the rod, if you don't have enough rings.

When determining length of the rod, you want to take into account exactly what kind of fishing you want. If you want far out fishing, in that case choose a larger rod as this will offer you better control when you are playing the fish. If you are planning

to go fishing in an area that your technique. The rod is enclosed, you will need a should match the way you shorter rod. Normally, the safe rod size to choose is fish with lures, then you 13' (3.9m). This is lengthy should look for a rod that is enough for a waggler but does not cast out too far.

Handles

Handles are made from either cork or foam. Whichever you choose, this is a matter of preference. Just try handling both materials so you can have a good "feel" before buying it.

Action

Action is the term used in describing how the rod will bend when it is placed under the lot of strain and effort of a fighting fish.

There are two types of tips on a rod, the hollow and spliced tips. Hollow tips are good in catching carp, tench, and chub which have a progressive or developing action making it sharp for quick bites, yet proficient enough to manage long distance strikes. Spliced tips are normally spliced to the end with two feet solid carbon. This rod is sharper, so it is a good pick for fast acting fish.

When choosing a rod, these questions will help you pick

the right one: 1. How frequently and where do you fish? Are you a beginner, a weekend warrior, or a tournament pro? If you are just starting out, you may need to budget and spend less money on your first rod. Once you learn the techniques and once you have decided that fishing is for you, that is the time to spend on more specific

2. Freshwater or saltwater fish? While there are a few rods that can be used for both fresh and saltwater fish, most rods are made for a specific purpose and application.

3. Spinning or casting? The species that you choose to chase will determine it.

4. Power, sensitivity, and

enjoy fishing. If you like to comfortable enough to cast frequently all day long.



The best lures for fishing

The evolution of fishing gear and accessories along with the development of the bass fishing industry brought about the development of various lures specifically used for different fish species.

There are many types or classes of lures and they all depend on what type of fish works for them. Many only work for specific types, but some cover a wide range of species of

Below are some of the typical lures used for fishing. Light standard casting lures

For standard casting lures, they are mostly able to attract a wide range of fish varieties from albacore, bluefish, Bonita, oho, and crappies. These lures are also excellent for certain species of bass fish and work best when retrieved from water at low to medium speed. They pass through water with undetectably synthetic material.

Their sizes are excellent for lightweight fish and a host of freshwater species. They range from 1/16 oz. to 3 oz.

The hand-painted eye is enticing enough to allow schooling of fish. This feature allows for more chances of trapping one of the target fish in the water. Heavy standard casting lures

Heavy standard casting lures are excellent for quite heavy fish specifically, walleye and bass. While the lightweight lures are used in most circumstances, it was shown that heavy counterparts provide more reliable fishing output.

Moreover, the heavy standard lures are able to catch fish than diamond and light standard casting lures.

Long casting/jigging lures

Perhaps the most popular among the fishing lures are the long, tapered jigging lures. They are perhaps the most commonly used fishing lures among the fishermen in Florida, Mississippi, and Louisiana. Just recently, it was found out that the long casting lures

work best for catching trout and pike. They were also found to effectively catch stripers and bluefish. They can catch tuna and walleve in a breeze! Unlike heavy standard lures, this gear won't produce good

fish-catch output up to 180-200 feet under water, but be sure to effectively match your lure color, bait, and related accessories to maximize performance. **Deadly diamond lures**

These lures are one of the smallest, with sizes ranging from 1/8 to 1 oz. They can seamlessly attract attention among fish and could form a school of fish in a minute! The reason is, it lies on its structural surface formation

and cut. The top handle is cut like a diamond and causes the reflection of light striking on its surface. The diamond lures are best for catching bass fish varieties, crappie, and stripers, although they work on a small range of fish species.



The Labor Department said that the Producer Price Index rose a seasonally adjusted 1.6% in February -- double the 0.8% rise in the previous month. Outside of food and energy costs, the core index ticked up 0.2%, less than January's 0.5% rise.

Food prices soared 3.9% last month, the biggest gain since November 1974. Most of that increase was due to a sharp rise in vegetable costs, which increased nearly 50%. That was the most in almost a year. Meat and dairy products also rose.

Energy prices rose 3.3% last month, led by a 3.7% increase in gasoline costs.

Aflatoxin remedy Texas corn

Aflatoxin is a major concern for Texas corn producers, but a new atoxigenic tool has been approved to protect Texas corn crops from devastating contamination. Effective immediately, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has approved the product AF 36 for use in Texas and Arizona.

AF 36 has been tested in Texas corn fields since 2006 as part of U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) research trials by Peter Cotty, Ph.D. and with support from the Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB). In field trials, the product reduced aflatoxin to 20 parts per billion, while neighboring untreated fields registered at 300 parts per billion. AF 36 joins Afla-Guard® from Syngenta® as another option for fighting

My oh my, I need a chicken fry

I love a good chicken fried steak (CFS). It's a uniquely Texas experience and I must admit. I've never had a good one outside of the Lone Star State. Sadly, I think, the heyday of the good chicken fry is over. I'm itchin' to have a good CFS experience.

guess I was just spoiled growing up. Mom made chicken fried steak at least once a week and it was one of my favorite meals. I improved on mom's recipe and as far as I'm concerned, I'm a legend in my own mind when it comes to

But making a good CFS is a messy proposition and to tell you the truth, I don't want to clean it up. So I don't cook it

Way back longer than I like to remember, a good chicken fry was as common as an old shoe. Walk into any small town café and you knew you were in for a good eating experience.

Unfortunately, today, most CFS taste like an old shoe. I think the decline started with flash frozen hamburger patties masquerading as chicken fried steak back in the '60s or

The trend for mouthwatering CFS has decelerated from

Today, you know you're in for a bad CFS experience

The steak comes out swimming in gravy.

• The enormous cut on your plate turns out to be two-thirds crust and one-third meat.

• The crust shatters into a million pieces when you put


the fork to it. • The meat has the consistency of a rubber band.

A good chicken fried steak is made of top round steak. Prepared properly, it is fork tender or close to it. The breading should complement the meat, molding and flexing with the cut, instead of shielding it in a hard case. CFS should not be cooked immersed in oil in a deep fryer. It should be pan fried. It should be served with real cream gravy, made with drippings, on the side.

I experienced an especially memorable CFS during my first newspaper job at Nocona. I was traveling back from Muenster one night with one of my buddies and he suggested we stop at this hole-in-the wall between Saint Jo and **Nocona** on Highway 82. Can't remember the name of the place, but it was just off the highway, perched on top of a hill. You parked alongside the road and walked up. At the top of the hill was a one-room shanty, maybe two or three tables. You could look into the kitchen as the two elderly women hand-breaded the steak, plopped it in a big cast iron skillet, and fried it to perfection.

They don't make places like that anymore. At least I can't

Court rules against EPA livestock regulations

The Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals has ruled that federal livestock regulations, set by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in 2003, could not require producers to hold Clean Water Act permits unless their farms actually discharged livestock manure into U.S. waters. American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF), the National Pork Producers Council, and a host of other agriculture organizations applauded the Court's decision. 'For the second time, a

U.S. Court of Appeals has ruled that EPA's authority is limited by the Clean Water Act to jurisdiction over only actual discharges to navigable waters, not potential discharges," said AFBF President Bob Stallman. "We are pleased that the federal courts have again reined in EPA's unlawful regulation of livestock operations under the Clean Water Act. The Court has affirmed that EPA, like other federal agencies, can only regulate where it has been authorized by Congress to do so." Under the ruling, con-

centrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs) that do not release manure into federal waters do not need permit coverage. However, CAFOs without the appropriate permits that do unlawfully discharge should be held liable under the EPA's Clean Water Act.

The Fifth Circuit ruling stated, "The CWA provides a comprehensive liability scheme and the EPA's attempt to supplement this scheme is in excess of its statutory authority.'
