A ban on outdoor burning became effective for all unincorporated areas of Cooke County on Monday morning, June 27. Commissioners Court took a unanimous stand to enact the burn ban despite County Fire Marshal Ray Fletcher recommending that it not be enacted at this

Fletcher gave statistics that showed Cooke County had a Keetch Byram Drought Index (KBDI) overall of 453. KBDI ranges from 0 to 800, where a drought index of 0 represents no moisture depletion, and an index of 800 represents absolutely dry

B.C. Lemons, Precinct #2 commissioner, said he'd ranchers who favored a burn ban. The wind blows all night and it is really dry, he added.

An audience member commented that he knew of people who had been working for months to create large stacks of wood for bon fires.

County Judge John Roane observed that burn bans are not for sensible people. They are for people who intentionally set large fires in unsafe conditions. The burn ban does not prohibit fireworks or welding. Welders are asked to keep a water source handy and to use a spotter to prevent starting out-ofcontrol fires. It does include outdoor cooking that might cause a fire, campfires, brush fires, and burning of trash. Those who do use fireworks are encouraged to not use rockets or fins as they pose even more fire danger.

The Sheriff's Office will ticket those who are caught disobeying the burn ban. City of Gainesville Pub-

from Siemens Healthcare Diagnostics. A new one would cost \$110,000. Earlier, the Board had approved \$20,000 to purchase a machine to test thyroids and prostates. The machine has not yet been purchased and this new machine will do those tests plus some others that the old machine doesn't do. That \$20,000 would be applied to the \$57,000.

After discussion on the cost of a refurbished piece equipment compared to a new one, what other tests a new one might perform, and the age of the refurbished machine, the Board approved purchase of the refurbished equipment at \$57,000 as long as it was not older than five years.

Employee health insurance will remain with the current provider Blue Cross. There will be a 4.5% raise in

Statistics chart reviews showed that MMH is well above other Critical Access Hospitals (CAH) in both Texas and the U.S. regarding the amount of cash on hand and the number of times MMH can pay its current liabilities using its current cash. For the month of May, MMH could pay its current liabilities with the cash on hand 4.1 times compared to other Texas and U.S. CAHs that averaged just over two times. Cash on hand for MMH in May with no cash coming in could pay its current liabilities for 118.7 days compared to the average Texas CAH at 40 days and U.S. CAH at 60 days.

The Board also reviewed anonymous surveys and comments from Clinic patients regarding Drs. Jones and Roa and FNPs Trubenbach and Ambrose. Another chart showed responses from 30 inpatients about the care they received at MMH. This also was anonymous. Results from MMH were compared to those reported by NTMC, Nocona, the Texas average, and the U.S. average.

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
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Vacation Bible School taught how the Mass comes alive!

There aren't any visible lines dividing the waterways into traffic lanes, but boasters operating in crowded lakes and harbors stay on their sides of the road to avoid col-

The principle all must the other boat. follow is: Only one boat has speed. A boat not having the right-of-way must yield to

• Crossing: Crossing oc-

curs when two boats approach at an angle. A boat on the right (starboard) side of the other boat is privileged and has the right-of-way. That boat holds its course and speed. The "burdened" vessel yields by slowing down or stopping and passes behind

the right-of-way. This boat overtakes another boat from over motor-powered boats. is termed "privileged" and is the stern, the overtaking boat expected to proceed without is burdened. The privileged hanging course or altering vessel holds a steady course and speed.
