As a Boy Scout, Clayton earned 23 merit badges, hiked over 275 miles, and camped 89 nights, at places such as Camp Hale, Ar. and Worth Ranch. He served as patrol leader 2007/2010 and again in 2011/12; assistant patrol leader 2006/07; librarian 2010/11; chaplain aid; and color guard at several meetings.

The highlight of Clayton's Scouting experience was as a participant in the Muenster Council to the high-adven-ture Philmont Scout Ranch in Cimarron, New Mexico, where he hiked 75 miles, to an elevation of 12,242 feet, and spent more than 10 days in the back country with his BEST bud, "Dad," by his side. ### **Muenster ISD Board hears** Legislative update **By Janet Felderhoff**

All Board members were present at the Dec. 12 meeting of the Muenster ISD Board of Trustees. They heard Superintendent Clay Richerson give a Legislative Update on school vouch-ers. He stated, "These terms and ideas of vouchers are in pre-filed bills. The 83rd Legislature does not open until Jan. 6. Any legislation passed could affect public, charter, private, or parochial schools.

Superintendent Richerson explained that each student is valued at \$8,300 by the

Johnny enjoys tinkering with wood. He said it takes a lot of patience. He isn't yet able to look at a piece of wood and envision what it could become under the ministering of a skilled carver's hand. "I have to have a go by. I look at something before I can do it," said Johnny. Pieces of wood that roughly resemble something are called blanks. These are sold to woodcarvers who need a visual. To carve pieces such as the dragon that do not have a blank available, Johnny gets his instructor to cut a block of wood for him to carve out. He said that he works on most pieces in the woodcarving classes, but since he needs to get the ornaments finished, he works on them at home.

The time required to complete carving varies. Johnny said of the Christmas tree ornaments, "I can knock one out in a few hours, but it's the painting that'll kill you." He described having to take care when painting colors like white and black together and having to do the details.

Johnny said that when he made an ornament for his grandkids, he would not make one for himself. When he'd go to their homes and see their ornaments, he did

state. If a parent applies for the practice gym have doors a voucher the state will write them a check for \$5,300, saving the state \$3,000 per application. There would be no accountability of parent for the check received or accountability for state testing for the student. The state could put a stipulation on a student leaving one public school to another public school, in that the student may transfer only if the school they are leaving has a lower accountability rating.

The parent or legal guardian of students entering kindergarten or student attending public school for entire prior academic year eligible would receive reimbursement for private school tuition or 60% of state average per-pupil maintenance and operations expenditure, whichever is less. This saves the state 40%. There would be no means testing or other eligibility requirements.

Also explained were tax credit scholarships, School of Last Resort vouchers, and full time virtual education.

Richerson also reported that enrollment is down 10 students from the beginning of the year and updated the Board calendar.

to Johnny, "A good sharp knife." He has several detail knives used for carving. Also used are a hammer and mallet to chip away. His wood of choice is basswood, a very soft wood.

The largest piece that Johnny has done is a statue of St. Francis that stands about 18" tall.

Relief carving is another type of woodcarving. That is when you take a piece of wood, draw your design, and then carve the figure inside of it. Johnny especially likes to use relief carving to make lighthouses.

A recent project is an ornament carved from an egg-shaped piece of wood. Designs are carved out and then a wood burning tool used to outline the shape. This helps hold the paint on the small wooden carvings and to stand out. He likes to use a blow drier to speed the drying process of paint.





### Fr. Denis Soerries, OSB 1931 - 2012

Fr. Denis Soerries, OSB, age 81, monk of Subiaco Abbey, died Dec. 13, 2012.

The fourth oldest of 11 children, Clarence Soerries was born Feb. 18, 1931, in Hartman, Arkansas. He attended Sacred Heart Elementary school in his hometown and came to Subiaco Academy for his secondary education, graduating with the class of 1949. He entered Subiaco Abbey, professing his vows as a Benedictine monk on Sept. 14, 1951, receiving the name Denis. He was ordained to the priesthood on May 26, 1956.

Immediately following ordination, Fr. Denis took summer courses in English at St. Louis University. He was on the faculty of Subiaco Academy the following year. He then began summer classes at the Universitv of Notre Dame, and also enrolled for the school year 1957-58. With the opening of the 1958-59 school year, Fr. Denis was assigned to Laneri High School in Fort Worth. During summer 1959, he completed his advanced studies at the University of Notre Dame, receiving an M.A. degree in English. He remained at Laneri High School until 1962.

By mid-1962, the monks of Subiaco Abbey voted to send their college seminarians for study at St. Bernard College in Cullman, Alabama, and monks of St. Bernard voted to send their minor seminarians to Subiaco Academy for their high school studies. Each monastery agreed to send a monk along with the students, so Fr. Denis accompanied the Arkansas group to Cullman, Alabama. where he was prefect of Subiaco's college students and a teacher of English. For four years, he retained his position at St. Bernard College. In 1966, he was recalled to

merit badge counselors and the Muenster community for their continued support of the Scouting program.

Michael, along with several other Muenster Eagle Scouts, will be honored at an Eagle Court of Honor on Saturday, Jan. 12, 2013 in Sacred Heart Catholic Church at 1 p.m. All are welcome to attend.

In the autumn of 1968, Fr. Denis was sent to Corpus Christi to be on the faculty of Corpus Christi Academy. After three years, he was recalled to teach again at Subiaco Academy and become commuting pastor of Sacred Heart of Mary Church in Barling, Arkansas.

In 1976, he began three decades of residential pastoral ministry, the first at St. Mary Church in Fort Worth. His longest tenure in residential pastoral work was at Sacred Heart Church in Muenster, from 1978-89. His last Texas pastorate was at St. Peter's Church in Lindsav, 1989-90. Returning to Arkansas in 1990, he was appointed pastor of St. Edward Church in Little Rock, and then in 1992 he was recalled to Subiaco to serve the pastoral needs of St. Benedict Church. In 1999, he was appointed pastor of St. Joseph Church in Paris, Arkansas, and four years later he was assigned the pastorates of St. Ignatius Church, Scranton, and its mission church of St. Meinrad in Prairie View. His final assignment was pastor of St. Scholastica Church in Shoal Creek from 2008 until his death.

### Fr. Sebastian Beshoner, OSB 1930 - 2012

Fr. Sebastian Beshoner, OSB, age 82, monk of Subiaco Abbey, died Nov. 19, 2012. He was born in Paris, Ar-kansas, on Oct. 7, 1930, the ninth child in a family of 12 children. He was christened Charles after his father.

During his childhood in Paris, he attended St. Joseph Church and its parochial grammar school. For his secondary education he enrolled at Subiaco Academy, Subiaco, Arkansas, graduating with the class of 1948.

Charles entered Subiaco Abbey, professing his vows as a Benedictine monk on Sept. 16, 1950, receiving the name Sebastian. He said the Lord prepared him during childhood for his profession day as a cenobite because he was raised in a household of 11 siblings where he "learned humility, love, sharing, caring, service, and all the virtues needed in community living.'

For four years, he balanced a life of daily study for the priesthood with monastic assignments in the sacristy, kitchen, cafeteria, and Abbey farm. On May 28, 1955, he was ordained to the priesthood. For the next 15 vears. Fr. Sebastian's main duties were in the field of education. Beginning in 1956, he was a prefect and English teacher at Subiaco Academy. Five years later, he was named assistant director of the scholastics. During the summer months of the late 1950s, he attended graduate classes at St. Louis University, and later at Benedictine Heights in Tulsa, Oklahoma. He did further study in Memphis, Tennessee. In 1962, he was assigned

to Our Lady of Victory in Fort Worth. He returned to Subiaco Academy the following year. In 1968, he was one of the assistant deans and the director of the Academy cafeteria. Three years later, he was named assistant formation director in the Abbev

By 1972, Fr. Sebastian became assistant pastor of Sacred Heart of Mary Church in Barling, Arkansas. He devoted weekdays to classroom teaching in the Academy, and ministered on weekends in Barling. The following year, he was appointed resident pastor of Holy Redeemer Parish in Clarksville, Arkansas. Two years later, he was recalled to Subiaco as pastor of St. Benedict Parish. In 1983.

His next appointment was in Texas as assistant pastor of Sacred Heart Parish in Muenster from 1989-91. He was then recalled to Arkansas to become pastor of his home parish St. Joseph in Paris.

Fr. Sebastian's artistic talents were evident. His outdoor hobby was landscaping yards and flower gardens. For indoor leisure he crocheted exquisite doilies, tablecloths, and other needlework masterpieces. He always enjoyed his annual vacation with family members, traveling to Louisiana for fishing expeditions.

St. Peter Church in Lindsay was his last pastorate. During the second year of his tenure there, Fr. Sebastian suffered a stroke while saying Mass in the parish church. He returned to the Abbey on Dec. 28, 2001.

As the years of recuperation passed, Fr. Sebastian was able to partake in the monastic liturgy, concelebrating Mass, and later being celebrant of the Eucharist. When his health permitted him to do light work, he lent a helping hand as needed. He also accepted the position of monastic bell-ringer, daily summoning the monks for the Liturgy of the Hours, Mass, and other liturgical functions. He took an active interest in all community affairs, enjoying recreational competition of cards and dominoes with colleagues.

A soft-spoken gentleman, Fr. Sebastian was well respected by those who knew him. Above all, he was a man of prayer, dedicated to the care of souls.

He is survived by sister Caroline Wheat of Bixby, Oklahoma; and brothers Garret and Frank Beshoner of Paris, Arkansas.







# 25 years of holiday action

Twenty-five years ago, a pair of men had the idea to have a high school basketball tournament at a neutral site that would bring together not only teams from Cooke County, but all around North Texas.

Now 25 years later, that tournament is still going strong, and both men are still involved.

lege. The first tournament was held the last week of December in 1988 at Cooke County College. The name of the college has since changed to North Central Texas College, but the mission of the tournament remains the same – to highlight some exceptional high school student-athletes.

Now 25 years later, LeBrasseur will once again be on the sideline when his Tigerettes open play at the tournament and Carson will be broadcasting games for Nortex Communications.

Back in 1988, the Gainesville girls and Muenster boys won championship trophies at the inaugural tournament. This year, both schools will once again send teams to try and take home the prestigious Commissioners Cup trophy that goes to the tournament champions.

Over the years, the tournament has featured some talented players and teams.

On the girls side, Gainesville High School and Lindsay High School have both won the tournament four times. Gainesville won the first two tournaments in 1988 and 1989, then took home the first-place trophy again in 1995 and 2011.

For the boys, Callisburg has taken home the top prize more than anyone. The Wildcats have captured the first-place trophy a total of seven times (1993, 1994, 2000, 2002, 2003, 2008, 2009).

But it's not just the games that make the tournament special.

Back in 1990, a tradition of recognizing the outstanding student-athletes in the tournament was started. The Academic All-Star team includes senior boys and girls who have maintained a three-year high school average of 90 or higher. Each scholarathlete receives a plaque recognizing him or her for their achievement.

Another highlight of the tournament is the presentation of the Bill King Award, given to an individual or organization who promotes sportsmanship and supports area youth sports programs.







# **'Superbugs' not related to** farming, expert says

Dr. Christine Hoang, DVM, MPH, CPH, assistant director of Scientific Activities at the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) and an expert on antimicrobial resistance, shed light on the use of antibiotics in livestock during a recent U.S. Farmers & Ranchers Alliance

(USFRA) panel discussion. One of the most common criticisms about the use of antibiotics on farms is that it might lead to the creation of resistant human pathogens, such as MRSA and C. difficile. Dr. Hoang stated that

because studies have shown that these "superbugs" are not related to farming.

"They're human-related resistant infections that are in no way related to antibiotic use in livestock production," she said.

The prevention of antibiotic resistance in humans is one of the reasons why veterinarians support the continued use of preventive applications of antibiotics in the practice of medicine on farms. Dr. Hoang explained that waiting until an animal is sick to

these fears are unfounded, use antibiotics could, in fact, make it more likely these "superbugs" will develop, because veterinarians will be forced to treat sick animals with more powerful antibiotics that are more commonly used in human medicine and use them at higher doses.

Dr. Hoang explained that there are other benefits of preventive applications of antibiotics on farms. Preventive antibiotic use reduces the transmission of food borne illnesses into our food supply, and there are substantial animal welfare benefits.

"Because you are preventing the disease before it occurs, there is benefit to the animals because they are not getting sick and suffering,<sup>7</sup> she said.

Dr. Hoang also explained the benefits of including antibiotics in animal feed, which is something that has drawn criticism in the media. Including preventive medications in livestock feed is simply safer and more humane, reducing the need for injections or other individualized treatments of animals.

# TDA market recap

For the week ending Dec. 15, feeder cattle prices reported by Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$6 higher per hundredweight (cwt), with a few to \$10 lower on fleshy unweaned calves and some as much as \$10 higher. Texas direct feeder cattle sales were steady to \$3 higher. The Oklahoma City National Stockyards were steady to \$2 higher on feeder cattle, but steady to \$2 lower on calves. The feeder cattle situation has not changed much over the past several weeks, though demand did seem to pick up late in the week.

Overall, tight feeder supplies and prospects that they will get even tighter are trying to push prices higher while high grain prices and the dry conditions in many areas are trying to pull them lower. Fed cattle cash prices were 50 cents higher per cwt in moderate trade. Beef prices were higher.

Wheat, corn, and grain sorghum prices were lower on continued weak export demand for U.S. grains. However, domestic grain supplies remain tight and prices are still well above where they were at this time last year.

Childhood obesity rates dropping in some areas

Childhood obesity rates are declining in some areas of the country as the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) implemented new national nutrition standards for school lunches this year, according to a recent article in USA Ťoday.

Studies have reported lower childhood obesity rates in El Paso, New York City, Philadelphia, Anchorage, California, and Mississippi.

'We've had 30 years of increasing rates of obesity, but we might be seeing the turn-ing point for this epidemic," pediatrician James Marks, a senior vice president for the Robert Wood Johnson

# **County Agent's Report**

### Use caution when handling and feeding hay

The inherent dangers involved in farming and ranching, such as frequent contact with powerful machinery, implements, and animals, result in a high susceptibility to injury. According to the Texas Department of Insurance, 22 of the 433 work related deaths in 2011 were attributed to Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing, and Hunting.

During the winter months, one of the more dangerous ag ricultural tasks is handling and feeding hay. Transporting hay is a necessary and fairly common task for farmers and ranchers. It is the type of task we do often enough to take for granted. However, a round bale can weigh between 1,200 to 2,200 pounds. If handled incorrectly, a bale could land on a person and have fatal consequences.

Keep these rules in mind to keep you, your workers, and your family safe.

 Check that the couplings between tractors and trailers are properly secured.

 Do not move partly loaded trailers over slopes or areas of rough ground which could cause bales to be dislodged.

 Determine and inspect driving routes over pasture land in advance and instruct drivers accordingly.

 Plan road travel to avoid overhead obstructions, such as trees and low bridges.

• When transporting bales by tractor and attachment, carry the bale as low as practicable to the ground.

 Tractor stability may be affected if carrying bales at raised heights over uneven terrain or turning too sharply.

 If stopping to open gates, lower the load to the ground before getting off the tractor.

• Ensure people in the vicinity are clear of the driving route during transportation.

• Travel at a safe speed.

• Ensure that no one rides on any machinery, particularly the drawbars of trailer units.

### Drought management for this winter

By now it is beginning to be old news, but it is apparent that we are in a drought. During 2012, we had been hoping for a "normal" autumn so that we could rely on small grains and ryegrass for winter forage. It is safe to say that normal" is not going to occur this year and that the drought will continue. This may cause livestock producers to make some adjustments to their plans. Dr. Wayne Wagner and Phil Osborne, livestock specialist and animal husbandry specialist from West Virginia Extension Service, have provided a set of pointers which, like the drought, may be becoming redundant. However, it is usually good for producers to review management practices that are most likely to help them remain profitable. The following are some tips which fit cattle enterprises here in Cooke County. They should help cattlemen make solid production decisions:

1. Consider early weaning calves. The nutrient requirement of a dry cow is about 50% to 65% of that of a cow nursing a calf. A young calf on dry feed has an efficient feed conversion rate. It is more cost-effective if you wean and feed the calf and let the cow forage for her own needs. If this is done before the cow loses substantial condition and if we get some rain and forage growth this fall, the cow should be in reasonably good body condition at the time you might normally feed hay. If you take the cow into winter in poor shape, you will increase her nutrient requirements through the winter and probably hinder the herd's reproductive performance next spring.

If you are going to use the early weaning strategy, do not wait until the cowherd has lost substantial body condition and/or there is no forage remaining. Cows can live on mature grass, leaves, and some weeds, but they cannot live on bare ground.

2. Value the hay crop you do have and plan to get the most you can out of it. When you feed hay, do not waste it by providing cows with more than they can eat or utilize.

3. Consider culling poor producers. The earlier you do it the better. Do not keep marginal cattle at a time when feed resources are scarce because feed will be your major expense.

4. Consider feeding alternative feeds. Cattle can eat more than hay; in fact, they will do well on many other types of feed. On a cost per unit of energy basis, hay is usually the most expensive feed for cattle. For example, one pound of corn provides as much energy as two pounds of hay, but cows fed only corn will remain hungry. By-product feeds should



This year, they were more near normal for summer rainfall and have made some hay that is not being utilized. Likewise, here in Cooke County we were able to make good quantities of winter annual grass hay. Check with your neighbors and with other advertising sources for prices and availability.
