

County takes security measures for JP# 1 office

In a past meeting of Cooke County Commissioners Court, Justice of the Peace Pct. 1 Dorothy Lewis voiced concerns in regard to safety issues at the JP office located in the new Cooke County Justice Center. Commissioners addressed these concerns and budgeted for some solutions.

Level one bullet resistant glass with a two-way electronic communication device will be installed at the reception area of the JP office. The total cost is \$5,651.40. Commissioners approved the installation.

Judge Lewis added, "You still need to do something about the security on that side of the Jail." Commissioner Gary Hollowell noted that he thought that security cameras had been funded for that area. Commissioner Al Smith agreed that they had approved a larger monitor to accommodate additional cameras around the Jail.

Cooke County Sheriff Terry Gilbert was asked to follow up on the additional cameras and report back to the Court.

Commissioner Hollowell reported on the ADA inspection of the Cooke County Annex. There were a few write-ups. The County has 90 days to respond and nine months to repair them. Commissioner Klement said that within the past year, regulations for the height of light switches had been lowered. Hollowell said that the switches had been placed 1/2 inch too high and would have to be lowered.

EMS Director Kevin Grant informed the Court that a fence had been erected and construction would begin on the new EMS station.

Klement suggested that Commissioner Hollowell be appointed to help oversee construction of the facility. Klement said that there should be two elected officials appointed to the task.

Hollowell responded, "I think it's important that we have adequate representation from the Court at these meetings that are involved. If that is the only way we can make that happen, sign me up." The Court appointed him to the committee to see to the construction of the EMS building. County Judge John Roane also serves on that committee.

Klement suggested that the County purchase one or more AED defibrillators for use in the Courthouse as there aren't any there at present. It was also suggested that there be one at JP 1, JP 4, the Jail, Sheriff's Office, and the Courthouse.

Grant volunteered to check on prices and with Emergency Management Director Ray Fletcher to determine where they are needed.

An executive session took place, but no action was taken as a result of it.

In other business, Commissioners Court:

- Approved the salvage of two non-working vacuum cleaners and a non-working microwave removed from the Sheriff's Office; four Life Pack 12 defibrillators Serial numbers 12650211,

- 12650214, 12662490, and 30674912 which will be used as trade-in on new defibrillator units; and 10 twin box springs and eight mattresses from the EMS stations.

- Approved the indigent cremation of Charles E. Spann.

- Accepted insurance settlement on the Justice of the Peace Pct. 4 building due to

water damage in the amount of \$1,525.11.

- Approved out-of-state travel for Jennifer Johnson-Spence, library director, to attend the Association of

Rural and Small Libraries Conference in Omaha, Nebraska from Sept. 24 - 28.

- Approved the Cooke County Library to be closed March 28 for inventory.

Survivors include his mother Clara of Muenster and several aunts, uncles, and cousins.

He was preceded in death by his father Richard; brother Melvin Wilde; and nephew Daren Wilde.

Art gallery toured by Century Club

Century Club met in the original Davis and Blevins Gallery on the first Thursday of March to enjoy a much anticipated tour of Donna Howell-Sickle's newly opened gallery and studio on the Square. Nineteen members and several guests were also treated to an informational program regarding how the community can best deal with Saint Jo's newly designated status of being a "wealthy" school district.

Saint Jo ISD Superintendent Larry Smith with School Board member Mike Martin came to explain the position of SJISD on the upcoming Title 41 Election. Being defined as "property rich" by the Texas Education Agency is rather a pleasant dilemma. After careful consideration, the school leadership is asking the community to join them in selecting the options which they believe will give the most flexibility in directing the excess

property wealth.

Options #3 and #4 will appear on the ballot as Measure 1 and Measure 2. To be able to employ these two options requires that they first be approved by the voters in the district. All who live in the Saint Jo School District need to inform themselves and take part in the May 11 Chapter 41 and School Board Election. Tax rates are in no way involved in this issue.

Donna took the floor in her evolving Davis and Blevins Gallery and sketched the outline of how she has become so involved in this community, weaving her art and life into its history and economy. It all began in 1995 with the purchase of the building. It served as her first home here and later, her first gallery. Downtown businesses were near empty by 2008, when Donna determined to open a gift shop somewhere on the Square. After a trip to market, she determined that a

smaller gift shop combined with a gallery would be more manageable. Art lovers owe a debt of gratitude to that decision, as the Davis and Blevins Main Street Gallery was the result.

When the historic, but structurally derelict, Frie Building turned up next door in need of a lot of love, reconstruction, and expertise, Donna and her husband John Sickles took it on. Discoveries were many and challenges were great as the couple shared the ups and downs of their labors.

After a brief tour of the downstairs of the newly completed undertaking, most Club members feel pretty sure that the long neglected, proud old building has reached its own "happily ever after," enjoying its very own resident artist. Saint Jo now boasts one more beautifully restored historic jewel and a cultural asset in this enterprise.

FARM & RANCH

Cooke County FSA announces sign-up for the CRP

Cooke County Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Scott Tiemann announced that FSA will conduct a four-week Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up beginning May 20 and ending on June 14.

"It continues to be our goal to ensure that we use CRP to address our most critical resource issues," said Tiemann. "In 2012, Texas experienced the worst drought in 60 years. CRP protected environmentally sensitive lands from washing or blowing away. It gave ranchers extra grazing land when they needed it. I expect there will be strong competition to enroll or re-enroll acres into CRP, so I urge Cooke County producers to maximize their environmental benefits and

make sure their offers are cost-effective."

In addition to erosion control, CRP provides significant water quality benefits including reduced nutrients and sediment loadings and adverse consequences associated with floods as well as expanded and enhanced wildlife habitat.

Currently, about 27 million acres are enrolled in CRP nationwide; more than three million of these acres are enrolled in Texas. CRP is a voluntary program available to agricultural producers to help them safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion, and enhance wildlife habitat. Contracts

on an estimated 3.3 million acres of CRP nationwide are set to expire on Sept. 30, and more than 362,000 of those expiring acres are in Texas.

Producers who are accepted in the sign-up can receive cost-share assistance for planting covers and receive an annual rental payment for the length of the contract (10-15 years). The contract is not deed restricted. This means the land can be sold, and the new owner has the option to extend or terminate the contract. Contact the FSA Office for details.

Producers also are encouraged to look into CRP's other enrollment opportunities offered on a continuous, non-competitive, sign-up basis. Continuous sign-ups often provide additional financial assistance. Those sign-up dates will be announced later.

FROM THE CAPITAL

Real property rights
HB 677 - exempts dams that are located in the unincorporated area of a county with a population of less than 350,000, and impounds less than 500 acre-feet of surface water from TCEQ dam safety requirements for dams located on private property. However, these dams must still be constructed and maintained to TCEQ safety standards.

Taxation
HB 1943 - limits the increase in the appraised value of the residence homestead for ad valorem taxation from 10% to 5%. SB 154 is the companion bill to HB 1943.

Transportation
SB 1029 - further prohibits TxDOT from converting non-tolled state highways to toll roads by removing existing statutes that provide exceptions for the Texas Transportation Commission to redesignate existing roads as tolled lanes. The previously reported HB 1054 is the companion bill to SB 1029.

Water conservation
SB 198 - prevents property owners' associations from placing restrictions on "using drought-resistant landscaping or water-conserving turf." SB 198 was voted from the Senate Committee on Natural Resources.

County Agent's Report

New regulations potentially affecting those with petroleum storage tanks

Basic obligations under the Oil Spill Prevention, Control and Countermeasures (SPCC) program, which is a federal program within the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), call for new agricultural regulations potentially affecting those with petroleum storage tanks. Producers need to be aware that if you store more than 1320 gallons above ground or more than 42,000 gallons completely buried containers, you need to submit an SPCC Plan.

According to Fouad Jaber, Ph.D., assistant professor and Extension specialist with the Biological and Agricultural Engineering Department for Texas Agrilife Extension Service, farms in operation on or before Aug. 16, 2002 must maintain or amend their existing SPCC Plan by May 10. Any Farm that started operation after Aug. 16, 2002, but before May 10, 2013, must prepare and implement an SPCC Plan on or before May 10.

Note: Any Farm in operation before Aug. 16, 2002 that does not currently have an SPCC Plan, must prepare an SPCC Plan immediately.

Agricultural producers are encouraged to check here to determine if they are considered a "Tier 1 Farm": http://www.epa.gov/osweroe1/docs/oil/spcc/qf_app_guidance.pdf.

Any agricultural entity classified as a Tier 1 Farm under the SPCC regulations has the OPTION of preparing its own SPCC Plan using a form provided by the EPA. A copy of the template form can be downloaded at www.epa.gov/oem/docs/oil/spcc/tier1template.pdf.

Due to the complexity and thoroughness required in the SPCC Plan, serious consideration should be given to hiring a professional to write and certify the plan.

USDA releases Pesticide Data Program

A new report released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) indicates that the overall pesticide residues found on foods tested in 2011 do not pose a safety concern and are at levels below standards set by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

Each year, the USDA and the EPA identify foods that should be tested on a rotating basis. In 2011, fresh and processed fruits, vegetables, soybeans, eggs, dairy products, and water were tested in the Pesticide Data Program.

"Consistent with guidance from health and nutrition experts—and as affirmed federal nutrition guidance that urges people to make half their plate fruits and vegetables—we encourage everyone to continue to eat more fruits and vegetables in every meal and wash them before you do so," USDA officials said in a release.

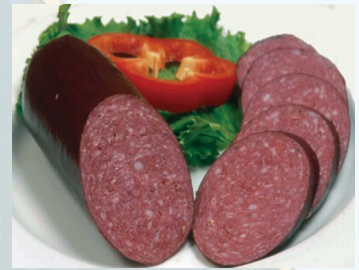
