Becker honored for County Extension Agent service

Cooke County Commissioners Court expressed their appreciation to Wayne Becker during Monday's regular meeting. Becker served as a Texas AgriLife Extension Agent for Cooke County from February of 2003 until this April. He resigned to accept another job.

The Court proclaimed April 22 as Wayne Becker Day in Cooke County and approved a proclamation that said in part, "The Office of Texas AgriLife Extension Agent requires hard work, personal sacrifice, dedication, professionalism, and enthusiasm."

"Wayne Becker has assisted numerous farmers and ranchers with their agricultural needs and also coaches the Cooke County 4-H kids with many competitions such as dairy judging, taking them all the way to Nationals several times. (Becker) has loyally served the citizens of Cooke County and exhibited all the characteristics of a professional in the performance of his du-

ties for the past 10 years as a Texas AgriLife Extension Agent."

Cooke County does not currently have a replacement extension agent for Becker.

Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell requested that Commissioners Court adopt procedures for lowering the County flag. Maintenance is charged with putting out the flag and receives emails from state and national authorities asking that it be flown at half staff at certain times such as after the Boston Marathon tragedy. Hollowell said that maintenance has been getting conflicting orders on whether to follow or ignore these requests.

"I would like to ensure that Cooke County joins the rest of the Country in recognizing tragedies and loss of life, so I would move that maintenance follow future email requests from state and federal authorities until otherwise directed by the Court."

Judge Roane asked, "So, it's your position that what the President wants, we

should want?"

Commissioner Leon Klement remarked, "It's my opinion that when the President and the Governor request you lower the flags, you follow suit and lower the flags. We are extensions of the State of Texas and I noticed that theirs were low-

ered this week when I was in Austin."

Judge Roane said, "I have a deep appreciation of the flag and this country and I have my own opinion whether the flag should be lowered or not. What I said four months ago when we had this same discussion was that if I was

left in charge of this, then I would continue to do what I feel is right by that flag and that country."

Hollowell said that the maintenance man is at the mercy of the five members of Commissioners Court and it does him a disservice whenever he gets guidance from one person that he feels is inconsistent with the Court.

Commissioner B.C. Lemons added that he feels that the County should go along with whatever the federal or state government says in regard to the flag.

From the audience, Bob Wartman of Mountain Springs noted that he'd been reading about the Court's controversy over the flag. He commented, "You people would be a lot better served to do something for these people in a tangent way. I love my flag. It is representative of my country and the people who die for it, but

that's what it is - a symbol. I could care less if you raise it or lower it."

Wartman suggested that next Thursday at 2:50 p.m., the people of West will declare a moment of silence. He said that it would be good to pause at that time and weep with those people, say a prayer, or do whatever you feel. "These people need construction tools, they need food, water, and I think you'd be better served to do something like that," he concluded.

The Court voted 4-1 to have maintenance follow future email requests from state and federal authorities to lower the flag until otherwise directed by the Court. Judge Roane cast the nay vote.

Glen Cooper, regional business officer with Health & Human Services Commission, explained that the Texas Department of State Health Services currently leases 5,500 square feet of space on California Street for State Health Services and Department of Family Protective Services. That lease expires on Nov. 1. An office is being built on Justice Center Road, but will not be completed until March 2014. That space is being leased from the Gainesville Housing Authority and the lessee will not extend the lease for the time until the new facility is available.

Cooper asked the Court's assistance in finding a temporary place to move for the time between the lease expiring and being able to move into their new facility. If space can't be found, the nurses may have to be pulled from Cooke County and relocated in Denton or See COUNTY, pg. 5

During the event, teams walk laps around the track raising money for the American Cancer Society.

The American Cancer Society's Relay For Life began in May 1985 when Dr. Gordy Klatt walked and ran for 24 hours around a track in Tacoma, Washington raising \$27,000 to help the American Cancer Society fight the na-

tion's biggest health concern - cancer. This event is now worldwide and continues to raise over \$4 billion to fight cancer.

There are many fun activities scheduled for the Relay event. Some of them are tethered hot air balloon rides, a carnival, teen town, massages, karaoke, jazz-

Mass of Christian Burial for Eleanor C. Schad Felderhoff, age 84 of Muenster, was held at 10 a.m., Friday, April 19. A Rosary/Vigil was held at 7 p.m., Thursday. All services were held in Sacred Heart Catholic Church. Burial was in Sacred Heart Cemetery. Services were officiated by Rev. Ken Robinson and directed by McCoy Funeral Home of Muenster. Eleanor died at 2:55 a.m., Wednesday, April 17, 2013 at her home in Muenster.

Born March 13, 1929 in Gainesville, Eleanor was one of seven children of Joseph W. and Cora Lee Schad. She grew up in Gainesville where she graduated high school at St. Mary's Catholic School in 1946. After graduation, she lived at home (until she married) and worked in the office at the Gainesville Ford dealership. After one year there, she worked in the bookkeeping department at Gainesville National Bank for four years. A mutual friend introduced her to Frank Felderhoff. They dated and soon thereafter married on June 19, 1951 in St. Mary's Church.

Frank was a native of Muenster. He and Eleanor lived in Muenster since their marriage. A veteran of WWII serving some 37 months in the war, after being discharged, he returned to Muenster where he worked for 41 years for Cooke County Electric. He and Eleanor were proud parents of two daughters and four sons. When the children were older, Eleanor worked as a bookkeeper for Tuggle Motor Company for six years, and later at Muenster Memorial Hospital for 15 years.

A member of Sacred Heart Parish, Eleanor was also a member of Catholic Daughters, St. Anne's Society, and the VFW Auxiliary. She enjoyed life with her family and friends immensely. She loved to party with her family, playing cards (Hearts and/or Tripoli) with them and her friends. She was a great family lady and a friend to many.

Survivors are daughters and spouses Patricia and Ronald Fuhrmann of Muenster, and Marilyn and Dale Trevathan of Richland Hills; sons and spouses John and Cheryl Felderhoff of Garland, Tim and Ramona Felderhoff of Muenster, Mark and Terrye Felderhoff of Ponder, and Terry Lee and Kristi Felderhoff of Gruver; sister and spouse Mary Jo and Charles Naughton of Fort Worth; 15 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

As of April 15, there had been 30 CALLS FOR SERVICE with three INCIDENT reports created and three ARRESTS made. Officers have issued 29 traffic citations.

The City and the Police Department are preparing for the 2013 Germanfest. City-wide security will be re-enforced with additional officers, as well as security, inside the Germanfest grounds. It is our goal to create a safe and secure event for everyone's enjoyment. We urge everyone to help us by being prepared for the large crowds with many of the visitors on our streets.

It has been brought to my attention that there are some concerns from citizens about seeing Muenster Police Department vehicles out of the city limits. Our main concern is to protect and serve the citizens of Muenster and our visitors. Unfortunately, we are not immune from criminal activities here in Muenster. As a result, some criminal investigations develop leads that send us out of Muenster to recover property and apprehend suspects.

If as a concerned citizen, anyone with questions concerning our officers' actions and equipment usage is urged to contact me for details.

There seems to be an increase of drivers in the City who disregard stop signs. According to State law, a driver must come to a complete stop at a stop sign and then and only then proceed in a safe manner. In the coming days, the Police Department officers will be monitoring stop signs around the City. PLEASE, for your safety and the safety of OTHERS, obey traffic safety laws.

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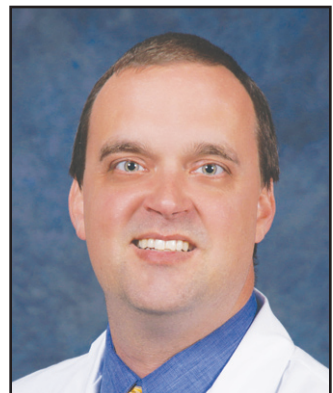

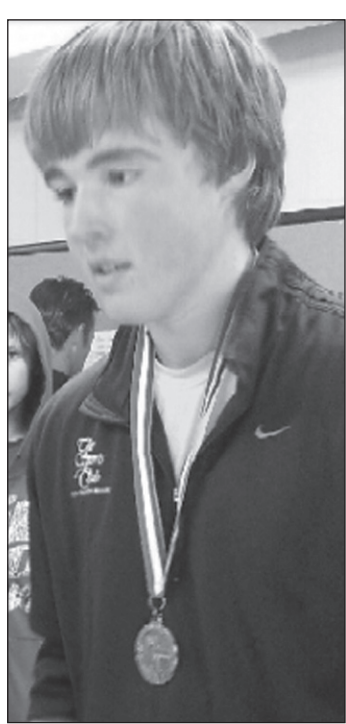

Feedlots unexpectedly boost cattle buying as feed costs drop

U.S. feedlot owners unexpectedly increased the number of cattle added to their herds in March compared with a year earlier as a drop in corn costs improved prospects for an end to operating losses.

About 1.899 million head of cattle entered feedlots, up 6% from 1.792 million in March 2012, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said in a report. Thirteen analysts surveyed by Bloomberg News forecast a 1.5% decrease, on average. The feedlot herd totaled 10.909 million as of April 1, down 5% from a year earlier. Analysts expected the inventory on feed to be 5.8% lower.

The price of corn, the main ingredient in livestock feed, has tumbled 25% from a record in August, including 1.2% last month, on signs that inventories will be big-

ger than forecast and that U.S. growers will harvest the most ever this year. That means lower costs for feedlot owners, who have been losing money every month since May 2011, including about \$118 per animal on average in March, according to Allendale Inc.

"The feedlots were anxious to put in feeders with corn values drifting lower," Don Roose, president of U.S. Commodities Inc. in West Des Moines, Iowa, said in a telephone interview. "We think the outlook for profitability and the bottom line was better."

Feedlot operators typically buy year-old animals that weigh 500 pounds (227 kilograms) to 800 pounds, called feeders. The cattle are fattened on corn for four to five months until they weigh about 1,300 pounds, when they are sold to meatpackers.

Losses

Losses by feedlot owners were the biggest last year in July at \$320 a head because of higher feed costs, said Rich Nelson, Allendale's chief strategist in McHenry,

Illinois. The slump continued into 2013, with losses of \$160 per animal in January, \$145 in February, and \$118 in March, he said.

More cattle being fattened for slaughter will put pressure on prices, said Mark Schultz, the chief analyst at Northstar Commodity Investments Inc. in Minneapolis.

The report showed "obviously more cattle than expected," Schultz said in a telephone interview after the report. "You're going to have more cattle on corn to be fed than what we had earlier thought, so they're moving a little bit quicker."

Feedlots sold about 1.771 million animals to meatpackers last month, down 7.7% from a year earlier, the USDA said. Analysts expected a 6.1% drop, on average.

Cattle futures for June delivery fell 0.1% to settle at \$1.213 a pound at 1 p.m. on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. The price is down 8.3% this year.

Feeder-cattle futures for August settlement declined 0.8% to \$1.4605 a pound. Prices have dropped 5.3% in 2013.

Report: U.S. corn planting behind five-year average

A new report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture reveals that the nation is behind its corn planting average for this time of year.

According to Brownfield, as of Sunday, Texas and North Carolina are the only two major corn-growing states in the United States who have attained their respective corn planting average for this time of year or higher.

Only two percent of the U.S. crop has been planted to date. Last year, 16 percent of the corn crop had already been planted by this time.

The USDA's first national corn planting update of 2013 also shows that nine of the 18 top corn growing states in the U.S. have yet to plant one percent of their planned crop.

Legislation to address possible misuse of farm license plates

Texas legislators are considering a bill designed to help reduce the misuse of agricultural license plates.

HB 3256 by Kyle Kacal (R-College Station), if passed, would require farmers and ranchers to show their agriculture and timber producer registration to their county tax assessor-collector when applying for farm vehicle registrations, specialty agriculture license plates or a short term permit to carry excess weight.

According to the Texas Farm Bureau's Austin Newsletter, "HB 3256 aims to remedy the abuse of wrongful persons obtaining a 'farm' specialty license plate."

Environmental Working Group's view of report is misleading says FDA

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is responding to an environmental group's "misleading" view of the 2011 Retail Meat Annual Report of the National Antimicrobial Resistance Monitoring System (NARMS).

According to the FDA, the Environmental Working Group's (EWG) report "oversimplifies the data and provides misleading conclusions."

The FDA says the EWG's report is "inaccurate and alarmist" in defining bacteria resistant to one, or even a few, antimicrobials as superbugs even if they're treatable by commonly-used antibiotics.

Peach crop may have been cut by three-fourths by freeze

The first thing that opens on a peach tree is the bloom, which makes it susceptible to late freezes.

What some have termed "crazy weather" appears to have cut potential peach yields by three-fourths or more in the major production areas of the state, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service horticulturist.

Unseasonably warm weather punctuated by late freezes in the Central Texas, North Texas, and Rolling Plains regions has knocked back the peach crop considerably, said Dr. Larry Stein, AgriLife Extension horticulturist in Uvalde who works mainly with pecans, fruits, grapes, and vegetable crops.

"We've definitely had some damage," Stein said. "A lot of fruit has been lost, but there are still some peaches around."

The damage varied by peach variety and growing sites, he said.

"At the best sites (on higher ground), the cold air drained away, and in a lot of those instances there are a few peaches scattered around," Stein said. "And it was also variety driven. Certain varieties — Redglobe was one — seemed to fare better than others."
