Ground work laid, a delegation of six men today began the task of fashioning the structure of what is planned to be the largest cooperative marketing organization ever at tempted— a \$30,000,000 central agency to finance the handling of cotton in 15 southern and western

organization was reached late yes-terday at a conference here between members of the federal farm board and directors of cooperative and growers' association in the cotton belt states of the south and west. A general committee of 21 will serve as the directorate of the agency, which must be in operation and its first general meeting held prior to July 1.

Farm Board Support With support of the farm board, loan fund for its stock holding mem bers or their subsidiaries to finance the movement of crops to market, or "any proper activity necessary to the free delivery, handling or marketing of cotton or cotton seed Blanton, who voluntarily vacator their by-products."

The agency will come into existence through the tarnsforming of the American Cotton Growers' Exchange, now operating as a mutual organization, into an incorporated mpany of a nonprofit, cooperative character, under a charter to con-form to the Capper-Volstead Act of 1922, and with an authorized capital tock will be open to state, regional

T. Anderson, fireman, and Kenneth Brice, tax driver. The firemen were killed as a wall caved in. Brice died as the roof fell in while he was crying for

Y., Dec. 11 .--(AP)—Armed with guns smug-gled into the prison from outside the walls, according to prison officials, approximately 1,-158 convicts in the Auburn State Prison revolted today, shot down principal keeper George A. Durnford, seized Warden Edgar S. Jennings and several other keepers and held them as hostages for the release of about twelve ring leaders of the mutiny.

### STATE POLICE

All state police on duty throughout this section were rushed to Auburn and concentrated about the prison. Forty-five state troopers from the Oneida barracks were rushed to the prison in automobiles and on motorcycles.

Thirty men from the Syracuse police force were dispatched to Auburn in charge of Deputy Chief George S. Pea-cock. They were armed with riot guns and tear bombs.






