



York named MISD JH/HS principal

As of July 1, John York is the new junior high/high school principal at Muenster ISD. York was hired in mid June to fill the position vacated by Jason Atcheson who resigned to take a position with the Lubbock Cooper High School to be one of three assistant principals. Muenster ISD Superintendent Clay Richerson recommended John York to be the new secondary principal. The Board approved. According to Richerson, "The committee felt that he had good credentials and was a good fit for Muenster secondary schools. We had right at 30 applicants, interviewed nine."

"I am just excited to be here and excited to start

this new adventure and new chapter in my life," remarked Principal York. "I'm looking forward to being here for a long time and helping the school to be an outstanding academic and athletic school and keep it progressing to the future to being the great school that it is. It's got an outstanding reputation as one of the best 1A schools in the state and I want to keep it that way and strive for excellence."

There are several reasons that drew York to apply for the principal's position at Muenster. He noted, "This is an area of the state that is very inviting to me. My wife's family is from Bowie. It is closer to family even though we are moving from the neck of the woods where my parents live, we're moving back closer to her par-

ents. It was an opportunity for me to come to an outstanding school and get my first principal's job at a great school like Muenster that has a strong tradition in academics as well as athletics. It was also a good school for my kids. Even though my daughter will only be here one year, it is a good move for my son to be here academically and athletically. I've always been partial to the smaller school. I like the smaller school environment. You can get to know kids much more personally with their activities and various things like that. You tend to know more about the kids and have a little more influence on all kids in a smaller school versus a larger school

that I've been at over the years. Sometimes, you are not able to build those relationships with every kid you would like to and here I feel like you can do that."

There are no changes planned by Principal York at this time. "This is an exceptional school and they have great scores across the board," remarked York. "We have a great teaching staff. The teachers seem to be on the right path on doing what's right for the kids in assisting them in passing their state assessments. Athletically, the program is going in the right direction. It's more of a look at what's working and see if there is any adjustments that need

Dr. Wallace named NCTC lone finalist

Regents of the North Central Texas Community College (NCTC) District voted 6-0 Thursday to name Dr. Brent Wallace as the lone finalist for the position of President at North Central Texas College.

Dr. Wallace is currently the Vice-President of Instruction at NCTC. Dr. Wallace arrived at NCTC in August 2011 as Vice President of Instruction and Chief Academic Officer. As the Vice President of Instruction, Wallace is responsible for managing all instructional units for NCTC including academic transfer, career and technical education, continuing education, adult education, adult basic education, libraries, and recently the addition of tutoring, Office of Students with disabilities, and TRIO.

Wallace is a native of West Texas where he attended high school and college. Wallace attended Hardin Simmons University, receiving numerous business scholarships and graduating with a Bachelor in Business Administration Degree in Marketing.

Upon completion of his undergraduate degree, Wallace initially began a career in business where he ultimately became a manager and corporate buyer for a large furniture company. Wallace then attended Abilene Christian University where he completed a Master of Arts in Human Communication and graduate certifications in Conflict Resolution and Family Dispute Mediation. Wallace accepted a position as the Assistant to the Dean of the Patty Hanks Shelton School of Nursing, a consortium of Abilene Christian University, Hardin Simmons University, and McMurry University. After a year, he was promoted to the Director of Student Services, serving all three universities' nursing students and managing four offices while pursuing a Ph.D. in Higher Education Administration from Texas Tech University, which he completed in 2010. Dr. Wallace left Patty Hanks Shelton to become the Chair of Business Management and Administration at Cisco College. After several years as Chair he was promoted to Dean of Instruction where he served as administrator of all academics and multiple technical programs. Wallace continues to teach courses in speech communication.

Dr. Wallace came to NCTC with a research background in conflict and strategic planning in higher education. He has been a presenter at state and national higher education conferences and is a member of multiple state higher education groups including being President Elect of the

Proposed budget adopted by MISD

Muenster ISD's Board of Trustees held a special meeting on Monday, June 30 to give the public an opportunity to express their opinions on the proposed 2014-15 budget and tax rate. There was nobody in attendance for the hearing on the budget or tax rate. All Board members were present along with Superintendent Clay Richerson and Principals Lou Heers and John York.

Superintendent Richerson noted that the information being discussed had been prepared by the Cooke County Tax Appraisal District (CCAD). "We had first talked about doing a 30¢ I&S (interest and sinking), but it fell just short of what we needed for our I&S taxes," he explained. "A 31¢ tax just barely covered it. We had talked about a 32¢ tax and Moak & Casey, the school's lawyers representing MISD in the 313 agreement, wrote a letter saying that they recommended a 32¢ tax for I&S." The rate posted in the District's Notice of Public Meeting was 30¢. Board President Steve Trubenbach remarked, "Thirty-one cents would have left us about \$7,000 short on I&S."

The proposed M&O (maintenance and operations) tax is \$1.04. The M&O is capped at that rate. Total proposed tax rate at this time is \$1.36 which would keep the revenue about the same as last year since values are down some.

Richerson noted, "It shows on the CCAD debt service that we are going to pay more this year. We don't have any more debt. We actually have less than last year, but the way the

steps are, we increase in payments and that is part of the debt service. So, there is a 27% overall in expenditures."

According to Richerson the Texas Legislature adopted Rider 71 in HB5 which will cost school districts money. "They are adding money to all the teachers' salaries," he said. "It's not very much and then you got to change your payroll and adjust your TRS, insurance, and all that. The other one that affects us pretty good is they came out with a new step so then we have to change everybody's salary. Again, that changed everything in payroll. With those increases, the District lost more money through unfunded mandates."

They then discussed the proposed budget for 2014-15. It had estimated revenues of: Operation Fund \$4,882,407; Food Services \$168,300; Debt Service Fund \$1,301,533. Bonds are \$29,455,784. Appropriations: Operation Fund \$5,156,581; Food Services \$187,730; Debt Service Fund \$1,261,369; Bonds \$29,455,748.

The total money expected from the state is \$6,300. Trustee Neal Flusche commented, "\$6,300 to educate 480 kids."

With a unanimous 7-0 vote, the Board approved the proposed 2014-15 budget as presented.

The tax rate will not be set until August when MISD receives certified values from the CCAD.

Following an executive session, the Board voted to hire Jodie York as a junior high ELA (English Language Arts) teacher. She was offered a 10-month probationary contract. They also approved hiring Dr. Robert Stever to assist with administration when needed.

to be made to make it better. This is definitely not a place where you want to come and rock the boat. If it is not broke, you don't fix it. You just make a few adjustments here and there."

York grew up in Whitney and his parents still reside there. He earned both his Bachelor's degree and Master's degree from Tarleton State University in Stephenville.

In 1996, York accepted his first teaching/coaching job in Bowie where he taught 7th grade History and coached football and basketball. After five years, York went to Gold-Burg ISD where he served as athletic director and head basketball coach. He worked there for three years, and then in 2004 accepted a job at Whitney as boys' head basketball coach and World History teacher. After serving in that capacity for four years, York was named assistant principal at Whitney High School. After three years, York moved to Hillsboro for one year where he took a teaching and coaching job. He coached football and basketball and was head golf coach. York had a friend who was principal at West who also had a son. They had coached their two sons in basketball since the

boys were eight. This gave the boys an opportunity to play basketball together. The first year that York was at West he taught for half a semester. Then he became an administrator liaison after the explosion.

"This last year at West, I was the dean of students where I was the campus principal over the accelerated high school program, computer based where we could get at-risk kids graduated - prevent them from dropping out," continued Principal York. "I was also the principal over the DAP at West. And now I'm here."

York and his wife Jodie have been married for 18 years. They have two children, a daughter Jaycie and a son Cal. Jaycie is a senior and Cal is a freshman.

During his free time, York likes to spend time with his family and to play as much golf as possible. He said, "I like to be involved in all my kids' activities. I don't like to miss any of my daughter's or son's athletic events or whatever they are doing. I like to be at those things."

Principal York has been in his office several times previous to his official starting date. He attended the School Board meeting on June 30. His wife was hired at that meeting to a teaching position with MISD.



Remembering the price of freedom on Independence Day





Oak Apple Gall

Come one, come all! Gather 'round, y'all! And I'll tell you about the Oak Apple Gall! It ain't an acorn and it ain't an apple either. If you MUST know what it is, I've got the cure to your fever! That's right, people! Everyone is dying to know about the Oak Apple Gall! And we arborists hold the key to a floodgate of oak apple gall knowledge. So grab a seat and prepare to have your minds blown!

Probably at some point in your life, if you have been around a Red Oak long enough, you've noticed these big round puffy balls... growing in their canopies and wondered what they were. Are they a fruit? Oak trees make acorns, right? Hummm?

The skin of the gall is green and fleshy in the spring, and turns brown and papery by summer. It's hollow on the inside with some fibrous fluff radiating from the center.

Myths and legends have surrounded oak apple gall all the way back to medieval Europe. In North America, word has it that Huckleberry Finn and Tom Sawyer had numerous in-depth debates about oak apple gall, though none of those conversations made it into any of Mark Twain's books. Too bad!

In England in 1660, after a brief 12 year reign of the Puritans (a period in which no dancing, no art, and no fun of any kind was allowed in all of England), the people declared May 29 as Oak Apple Day to commemorate and celebrate the reinstatement of the king, Charles II, who hid in an oak tree to escape death. All of England had quite a party on Oak

Apple Day, and it is still observed in some areas of good ole' England to this day.

So what is an oak apple gall? Well, it's not an apple or a fruit at all. As the name might suggest, it's a gall. Galls are areas of chemically altered plant tissue often caused by various insects. In the case of oak apple gall, it is caused by a gall wasp, which is a small, non-stinging wasp. The wasp lays its egg on a leaf vein along with a chemical that causes the plant tissue to form into a gall around the egg. The egg hatches and the larvae feed inside the gall until they are old enough to bore out of it later in the season and continue their life cycle. You can often find these pin-sized exit holes in the galls later in the season.

Galls do not cause harm to an oak tree. They can be a cosmetic issue if they infest a tree, and the best way to get rid of them is simply to pick them off by hand if the tree is small enough. Otherwise, the infested tree may be treated with a series of general pesticide applications in the early spring. The jury is still out on whether systemic insecticides will work.

This year in particular has been an abundant one for oak apple gall, as they can be found on oaks, especially red oaks, all over our north Texas region.

So, if you find yourself lonesome and in need of a friend this summer, make friends with an oak apple gall... or better yet, make friends with an ISA Certified Arborist to help address any other tree questions about Oak Apple Gall you may still have!

FSA County Committee nominations now being taken

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that the nomination period for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees began June 15.

"County committees are a vital link between the farm community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture," said Vilsack. "I hope that every eligible farmer and rancher will participate in this year's county committee elections. Through the county committees, farmers and ranchers have a voice; their opinions and ideas get to be heard on federal farm programs."

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election, and reside in the local administrative area where the person is nominated.

Farmers and ranchers may nominate themselves or others. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must

sign the nomination form FSA-669A. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. Nomination forms for the 2014 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1. Elections will take place this fall.

While FSA county committees do not approve or deny farm ownership or operating loans, they make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs, and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to 11 members who are elected by eligible producers.

FSA will mail ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 3. Ballots are due back to the local county office either via mail or in person by Dec.

1. Newly elected committee members and alternates take office on Jan. 1, 2015.

Shortage of winter wheat seed has farmers ordering for 2015

Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, and Kansas wheat farmers are yet to finish harvesting their 2014 crop, but these farmers need to start ordering seed for 2015.

Supplies of certified seed in these states are limited, thanks to multiple years of drought, plus this year's late freeze and recent hailstorms. Farmers are encouraged to line up certified seed needs as quickly as possible in order to ensure they procure an adequate supply of the varieties they want, according to Agriculture.com.

Roger Osburn, director of Oklahoma Pedigreed Seed Services, handles the seed certification process of varieties from Oklahoma Genetics, Inc., and advises, "If you wait until the last minute, you might be out of luck."

Wheat prices steady, time to sell might be now

Oklahoma and Texas Panhandle wheat producers may be ready to sell their harvested crops, if the price and the timing are right.

From June 2008 through May 2013, the six-year average wheat price is \$6.48. The months of August through November during the last six years, the average price set at \$6.50, excluding storage and interest expenses, according to *Southwest Farm Press*.

The United States is projected to supply 7.7% of total world wheat production. Since only about 35% of the world's wheat has been harvested, it is uncertain of the 2014/15 world wheat marketing year production, making wheat prices also uncertain.

Farmers may risk delay in selling their wheat crop for hope of higher prices. One recommendation is to sell wheat in increments of one-third or one-fourth between June and December. With the current wheat supply, demand, and price averages, now may be a good time to sell.
