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Council develops employee policies

A visit by the City of Muenster's auditors last month revealed that the policy regarding City employee vacation rules needs clarification. City Administrator Stan Endres explained that it is a new firm of auditors and they are looking into everything.

The policy does not state whether an employee can carry vacation time over into the next year. Endres said that although it is not written, employees have not been allowed to carry the time over unless there were some unusual circumstances. He suggested adding this clause to the Employee Handbook, "All accrued vacation must be used in the current year unless unusual circumstances dictate. The city administrator must approve to carry forward vacation days to the following year."

Also, he said that he's had some employees express concern over having to wait 10 years to get three weeks of vacation. The current City policy is two weeks off with pay after one full year on the job and three weeks after 10 years on the job. Endres checked with Cooke County Electric Cooperative and Nortex regarding their vacation policies. The Co-op is two weeks after one year, and after five years, one additional day is given for each year until a maximum of 15 days. At Nortex, employees get 10 days after a year and 15 days after 10 years.

Endres told the Council that another situation to consider is whether an employee of several years who quits and then returns later should be able to retain their work history (continue on with years acquired rather than starting over).

Discussion on the carrying over vacation days followed. The Council felt that most companies they knew of had employees use the time rather than letting it build.

Police Chief Mark Blankenship noted that the Police Department has a unique situation regarding vacation. They are burdened with trying to cover the City seven days a week as close to 24 hours a day as they can. "When one guy is off for any reason - sick, vacation, whatever the reason, I've got a problem," he said. "It's difficult to take a vacation, and the guys we've had, mostly, have been dedicated enough that they realize that and they're not leaving us hanging in a bad situation."

Paying the employee for the vacation time without them being off, rather than it just being lost, was discussed. Endres said he felt that police officers should not just lose their vacation time because of scheduling difficulties.

Mayor Joey Anderson remarked, "Somehow, you want to balance it because you don't want somebody just working all the time and never getting a break. Then you just get

burned out employees."

In changing the number of years before an employee gets three weeks of vacation, Alderman Tim Felderhoff noted that the City's policy is about average, better than some, not as good as others. Endres said that they do get 10 days of sick pay per year. They can accumulate up to 30 days of sick leave. The Council felt the 10 year wait should remain as it is.

On the carry over vacation time, it would be written as suggested excluding the police department. Endres suggested that it state that the Police Chief should work out

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County supports appointment of federal judge

The Sherman Division of the Eastern District of Texas has been without a resident judge since Nov. 10, 2006 when the presiding Judge Paul N. Brown retired. Brown was nominated on Sept. 11, 1985 by President Ronald Reagan and confirmed by the United States Senate on Oct. 16, 1985.

Judge Brown served faithfully in that role, including past the time of his taking senior status on April 1, 2001. He ceased taking new cases on June 1, 2006 and retired on Nov. 10, 2006, marking the end of 21 diligent years on the bench. He died on Nov. 26, 2012.

The resolution approved by Cooke County Commissioners Court at its Nov. 25 meeting noted that in the seven years that the bench has lain vacant, each passing day adds more cases to a crushing docket, corresponding delay in criminal and civil cases, and risk of denying Americans of average means access to our federal courts.

The ordinary judicial duties to serve the Federal Court sitting at Sherman are routinely filled by two Federal District Judges who drive 344 miles from Beaumont to Sherman to tend the docket there. Also, other judges are occasionally called from their duty stations in Texarkana and

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Generations keep marching into war

He rarely talked about it, but August Walterscheid was the first: drafted into the U.S. Army to fight in Germany in World War I, a soldier in the 138th Infantry.

Though he knew few details, Leonard Walterscheid, 84, of Grand Junction, knew that his father had served. So, when he graduated high school in Texas in 1948, and went to work at his cousin's Mobil station making \$27.50 a week, he kept the military in the back of his mind.

In January 1949, he and a friend enlisted in the U.S. Army, and after getting out and being called back up, he spent most of 1951 fighting in the Korean War.

When his son, Tommy Walterscheid, 62, of Fruita, graduated high school in 1969, "me and three buddies weren't ready to go to college, but we knew that we'd

get drafted, so the idea was to join the Navy because the Navy wasn't going to Vietnam," Tommy recalled.

Except, the U.S. Navy was fighting in Vietnam, and he spent most of 1971 fighting the Vietnam War in a spy plane patrolling the coasts of Asia.

Then, in 1998, three months before he even graduated Fruita Monument High School, Tommy's son Timothy Walterscheid, 33, of Fruita, enlisted in the U.S. Army. He served with NATO missions in Kosovo and for 14 months in Iraq.

"He seems to want to make all the same mistakes I made," Tommy joked.

But the footsteps of military service were trod deep in the Walterscheid family, and three generations of the Grand Valley family have not only served, but served in war.

So, beyond the kinship of family, they're joined by the

brotherhood of service and a shared understanding of what it's like to go to war.

"No one ever chooses to go to war," Leonard said, but every soldier knows it's a possibility. They've all experienced the brutality.

Tommy recalls landing in Da Nang, Vietnam, disembarking from his plane at the airfield only to see body bags being loaded into another nearby plane. Leonard remembers running to the bunkers during shellings, which happened often. Timothy remembers being so tired after a patrol that it didn't seem worth the effort to take cover when the air raid sirens went off - the Super Bowl was on and he just wanted to finish the game.

And just like that, for father, son, and grandson, the stories turn. It was hard, and sometimes heartbreaking, but often it was fascinating.

Once by Grayson Bar Association resolution on May 11, 2011, and again by letter dated Sept. 28, 2011, the Grayson Bar Association requested relief from President Barack Obama, with the assistance of our Senators. The Administrative Office of the United States Courts has since declared the vacancy left by Judge Brown as one of the nation's most pressing "Judicial Emergencies."

Adding to the problem, the Hon. Richard A. Schell, the only other resident district judge in the Sherman division of the Eastern District of Texas, but sitting in Plano, has indicated his intention to take senior status in March of 2015, further underscoring the urgency of filling the Sherman court vacancy left by Hon. Paul Brown.

Commissioners Court approved a resolution that said, in part, "BE IT RESOLVED, that by Resolution the Cooke County Commissioners' Court respectfully requests our United States Senators, working with appropriate officials, forward to President Obama a bipartisan slate of qualified potential nominees in time to allow both President Obama to nominate and the Senate to confirm by March 31, 2014, a federal judicial nominee for the Sherman Division of the Eastern District of Texas sitting at Sherman, Texas, with strong preference being given to a nominee residing in Grayson County reasonably to assure unbroken federal judicial presence in Sherman."

Commissioners approved the nomination of Jerry Fleitman and Randall Reed for the Cooke County Appraisal District Board.

In other business conducted at the Nov. 25 meeting, Commissioners Court:

- Approved change orders for the Cooke County EMS Station project totaling \$78,459.15, which includes the cost of a new generator, a map, and sealing floors.
- Approved funding the DPS roof project at a cost of \$55,000, with the money to be taken from the Contingency Fund.

Held an executive session regarding a wind farm, but took no action.

Consent agenda items approved were:

- Accepting donation of map frames (\$375) to the Cooke County EMS Station 1 from David Parsons of Door Stop.
- Salvage of unusable 35 mm cameras and video recorders and miscellaneous boxes from the Cooke County Sheriff's Office.
- Salvage of a 1989 Champion Motor Grader from Road and Bridge Precinct # 1.
- Allowing the County Attorney's Office to apply for a scholarship to allow Callie Paxton, victim assistance coordinator, to attend the conference on Crimes Against Women in 2014.
- Sheriff's Office bonds (E. Coberley, R. Jones).
- Cell phone allowance for Aaron Carney, investigator.
- Accepting donations to the Cooke County Historical Commission for the publication of their County history book (\$50 Patty Brennan, \$250 Rodney Howell, \$100 Mrs. J.E. Pybas, \$10 Leon Bayer, \$500 V.F.W. Club, \$250 Cooke County Heritage Society, \$100 Prosperity Bank, \$250 Muenster State Bank, \$100 Landmark Bank, \$100 The Zielinski Law Firm, PC, \$50 Rebecca Lawson).

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details with the Police Commissioner on assuring that the officers get their vacation or compensation for it.

In a bridge over for employees who quit and return, it was suggested that should be at the City Council's discretion.

The policy will be written and brought back to the Council for consideration next month.

Chief Blankenship gave his monthly police report. He said that they now have two active reserves who are able to work on their own. He feels this will help in alleviating the problem of accumulated comp time for his full-time officers. Reserve officers are required to work at least 16 hours per month.

Chief Blankenship said he's interviewed another officer who is interested in serving as a reserve and received a call that day from another interested person.

Reserve officers receive \$25 per shift for expenses. The minimum shift is four hours.

Investigator Dan Lintner resigned to seek other employment. Chief Blankenship noted that he has hired a replacement. The new officer is coming to Muenster from the Cooke County Sheriff's Office after five years of employment there. He was a patrolman, a corporal, and is currently an investigator.

Endres reported that the City will observe Christmas and New Year holidays by closing City Hall and giving employees time off on Dec. 24 and 25 and Jan. 1.

Endres commended Alderman Jewel Otto and her crew Donnie Bateman, Billy Hennigan, and Joe Bohl for the great decorating job at the City Park.

The new sewer line project in the ally between Hickory and Sycamore streets is nearly completed. It should be done before the end of this week.

In other business conducted at the Dec. 2 meeting, the City Council:

- Approved the purchase of Muenster Marks in the amount of \$100 for each employee for Christmas.
- Gave unanimous support for Jeannie Anderson's appointment to a two-year term as the General Law Cities (population under 5,000) representative on the Board of Directors of the Greater Texoma Utility Authority.
- Declared the week of Dec. 8-14 as Muenster Museum Week in conjunction with the Muenster Historical Society's celebration of Muenster's history.
- Approved payment of bills totaling \$140,188.50.

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ing and the people they met unforgettable. Each man has a world of stories.

Timothy will mention the 14-man contingent from Moldova, who showed up in Iraq - "I guess they were ordered there?" he wondered - with only the equipment on their backs, not even much in the way of tents, but a willingness to tag along on American patrols and detonate the explosives they found.

Tommy recalls a time flying over Laos, when one of the plane's engines caught fire, and the crew hastily got their parachutes on and the hatch door open when the fire went out. It was exquisite relief.

Leonard recalls all the details of the 8-inch Hauser gun to which he was assigned, one of a 35-man team that backed the U.S. Marines at the front lines, firing over them into enemy territory. The shells: 208 pounds each. The recoil: 72 inches. The gun: 40,000 pounds, sometimes requiring the team to lift it out of two feet of mud. Leonard's job was to keep the recoil oil at the exact right level.

There were the camel spiders in Iraq and the fecund humidity of Vietnam and the mud of Korea. There were fear and fellowship and honor of service. Timothy re-enlisted, even after seeing war up-close in Kosovo.

There was the devastation, the mass graves," Timothy recalls. "But we got to see when they started playing soccer again, when things started recovering. And that was pretty amazing."

Three generations of Walterscheids, three different wars, three lifetimes of experience, but father, son and grandson share the feeling: It was an honor to serve.

He had an old, white van that was a mobile party wagon. It was never a surprise to see that van filled with people and oftentimes loaded with tacos too. Kevin and his crew would go to K-Mart in Gainesville and play hide and go seek in the store. One major problem - they always left trails of taco filling all over the store. Poonchos restaurant will never be the same. Kevin, Pooder, Phil, and Darrell loved going there after gun shows and one time actually got kicked out. Between constantly raising the flag, stabbing each other with forks, and then filling the sopapillas so full of honey that it created a mess when they were bit into, the manager decided it was enough.

Kevin married Theresa Bartel on Nov. 14, 1992 in Pilot Point. They made a life in Tioga. Nine days before his 27th birthday, Mariah was born making him a daddy for the first time. It was always fun to see big Meatball holding this little baby. Less than two years later, Theresa and Kevin had Abby. Kevin was a big pushover when it came to those girls. He enjoyed going to all the games, band performances, and school events.

Kevin continued his work in the meat business when he went to work at Wal-Mart.

Right away, he was a favorite and quickly made Wal-Mart a part of his family. As he was promoted, his family grew. He always believed in giving every person a chance and became a popular leader and friend. He wanted every person, no matter their role, to know they were appreciated. Kevin was even known around the store for his story telling and bargain finding.

He loved the pawn shops, garage sales, and deer lease. He and Phil would go on and on "What you got?" "What

you give?" "What you take?" "What to boot?" This would go on for hours, driving everybody crazy. They loved it though along with the numerous daily phone calls just to see what the other one was doing or eating.

A snack table was provided and the dinner was catered by Rohmer's Restaurant.

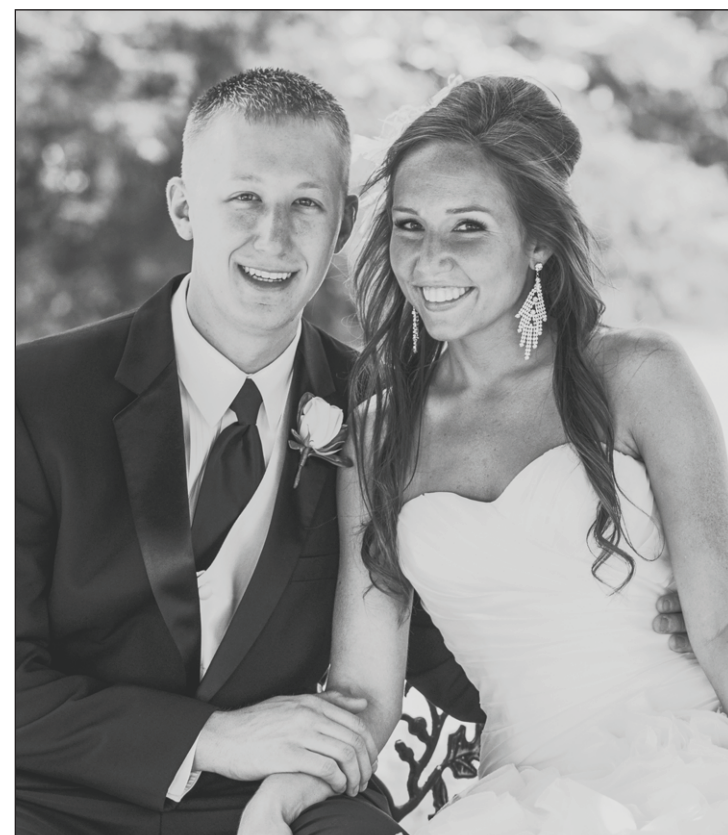

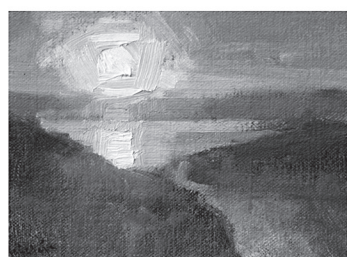

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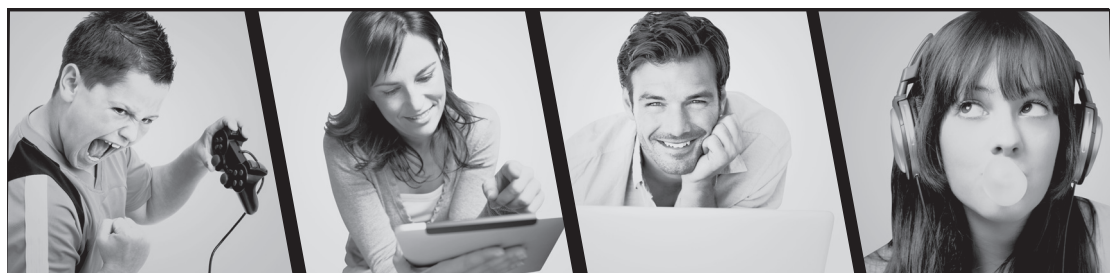

Hornets fly higher than an Eagle

The Hornets ended the 10 game winning streak of Texas Leadership Charter Academy (TLCA) of San Angelo last Friday afternoon with a big Regional Championship 41-18 final. The victory advances Muenster to the Quarterfinal round of the Class 1A-2 State Championship Playoffs. They will face the undefeated Albany Lions this Friday night.

The Friday afternoon Regional playoff game in Memorial Stadium at Tarleton State University in Stephenville began in favor of the Lions. "We gave up a long touchdown play on the first play of the game. But I was proud of the way our offense responded, driving down field and scoring. That was very big!" noted Muenster Coach Brady Carney.

"The 1st half, we stopped ourselves more than they did," the Coach added. "Defensively, except for the first run, they played well."

TLCA's defense allowed only 10.8 points per game this season, prior to Friday's loss to Muenster. The Hornets had a total offense of 346 yards compared to the Eagles' 205. Muenster had two turnovers, one scooped up for an Eagle touchdown, while TLCA lost four turnovers, one interception putting 6 points on the board for Muenster.

The Eagles took the opening kick to the TLCA 35 yard line. The next play, the Eagles were on the board. The PAT kick failed for a 6-0 score 21 seconds into the game.

The Hornet offense also began at the 35, taking a few more plays to cover 65 yards. Ten runs were pounded out between Clint Sidwell, Mason Binder, and Kyle Klement, the final a 3 yard scoring run by Sidwell. Chance Herr added the extra point and with 7:03 on the clock, Muenster took a 7-6 lead.

The Eagles got in two plays, with their third attempt intercepted by Sidwell and returned for a touchdown. The 2-point conversion failed, giving the Hornets a 13-6 lead with 6:06 remaining in the 1st period.

TLCA returned Binder's kick to their 35 yard line. Three plays later, Dalton Bartel covered a fumbled ball on the Eagle 37. With 4:31 on the clock, Blayne Jones completed a pass to Cole Walterscheid for a Hornet touchdown. The point after kick by Herr increased Muenster's lead to 20-6.

A 61 yard kick return set up the Eagles' next touchdown, a 20 yard run. The PAT failed and the scoreboard read 20-12 with 2:53 still left in the 1st quarter.

Two flags forced a Hornet punt on 4th and 34, allowing TLCA to carry the ball into the 2nd period. Unable to get

10, the Eagles punted. Jace Fredrick returned the kick to the Hornet 41 yard line.

Tavi Saldana gained a quick 14 yards. Sidwell added 2, Jones 14, Saldana 11 more, and Binder 7 to the Eagle 11 yard line. Klement ended the drive crossing the goal line with 8:42 on the clock. Herr booted the extra point for a 27-12 score.

The kick was recovered by Ryan Hoepfner on the Eagle 48, but the Hornets couldn't take advantage of the turnover and punted. It was three runs, all for losses, for TLCA, punting on 4th and 23. Fredrick returned the punt to the Hornet 46. Four short runs by Saldana, Binder, and Klement moved Muenster to the Eagle 36. With 2:23 remaining in the 1st half, a fumbled ball was picked up by an Eagle and run back for a TLCA touchdown. The 2-point conversion run failed, for a 27-18 score.

The Hornet offense continued to struggle with a holding flag and an intercepted pass. The Eagles' attempt to score again before the halftime break ended when Fredrick picked off a pass with 7 seconds on the clock.

The teams exchanged possession as the 3rd quarter clock ticked away the minutes. Muenster's second drive of the 2nd half started on their own 34 yard line. Runs by Bartel, Klement, Binder, and Sidwell moved the ball to the Eagle 6 yard line. Bartel found the end zone with 3:34 on the clock. Herr added the extra kick for a 34-18 score.

TLCA got in six plays and punted. Fredrick returned the ball 42 yards to the Eagle 33. A Jones to Walterscheid pass the next play found paydirt. Herr added the PAT for a 41-18 score with 42 seconds remaining in the 3rd quarter.

The Eagles took the ball into the final period and to the Hornet 18 yard line, but the drive ended when Saldana intercepted an Eagle pass. The teams exchanged possessions a few times as time ticked off the clock for a Muenster Regional playoff victory.

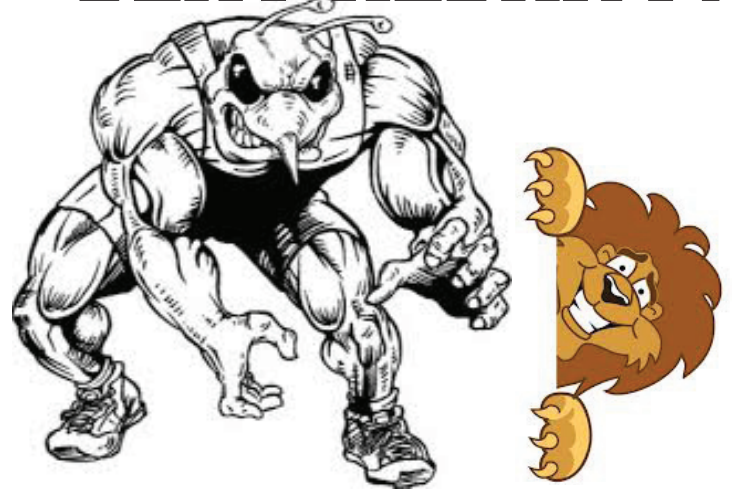
Muenster vs Valley View

Ordinance No. 356 - It shall be unlawful for any person to park or leave standing at any time on any street or street right-of-way in a residentially-zoned area, a semi-truck and/or trailer, stock trailer, boat, recreational vehicle, camper, utility trailer or equipment trailer; other than during deliveries or pick-ups. Exceptions are approved for 72 hours only for out-of-town visitors and for work trailers that are parked only for overnight.

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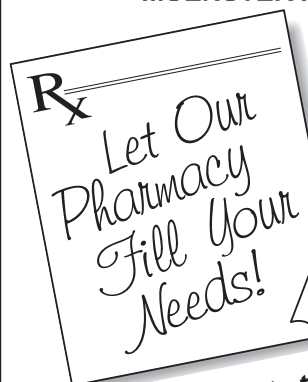

Texas Agriculture Market Summary

For the week ending Nov. 30, a Texas feeder cattle auction trend is not available, as most reporting locations were closed for the Thanksgiving holiday. Texas direct feeder cattle sales were mostly steady. Fed cattle cash prices were \$1 higher per hundredweight (cwt), with sales of only about 600 head of hattle confirmed by USDA. Wholesale beef values were higher.

Weekly beef export sales were down 43% from the previous week, but shipments were 13% higher. The primary destinations were South Korea, Mexico, and Japan. Cotton prices were higher.

Weekly export sales were 13% lower than the prior week; however, shipments were 35% higher. China, Pakistan, Japan, and Egypt were the leading destinations.

Corn and grain sorghum prices were lower. Weekly corn export sales were up 7% from the previous week and four times higher than the average needed to meet annual projections. South Korea, China, Peru, and Mexico were the leading buyers. Wheat prices were lower. Export sales were down 9% from the previous week, but were still higher than expected and nearly double the weekly average needed to meet USDA

export projections for the marketing year.

Futures markets were higher for fed cattle, cotton, wheat, and lumber, but low for feeder cattle and corn. Most of the state east of a line from Del Rio to Fort Worth recorded rainfall last week with totals of two inches or more reported in Southeast Texas.

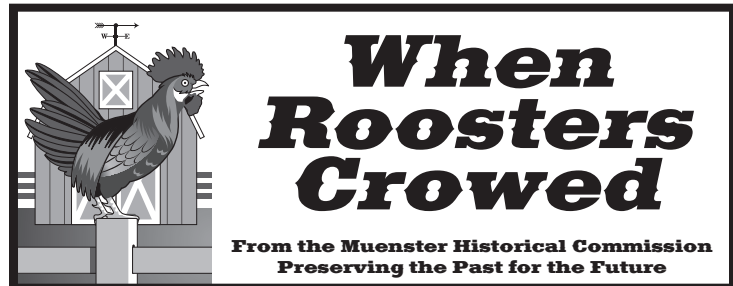
New guide available to assist veterans in agriculture

Chickens

Most farms raised lots of chickens; it was the main source of meat in the summer and fall. Mother took care of the chickens and the boys got to clean the manure out of the chicken house.

Farmers hatched their own baby chicks or mail order hatcheries sold them at reasonable prices. The Muenster Hatchery, owned and operated by Clive Gobble, also custom hatched eggs for many years, keeping a good chicken population in the Muenster community.

After a chicken lays so many eggs, it stays on the nest and keeps the eggs warm so that the fertilized egg embryo will begin to grow and hatch out.

When a hen quit laying, they were used for sitters with around 15 eggs put under them. The hens were shut up in the new nest for a few days or they would return to the nest where they had laid their eggs. It takes three weeks for chickens to hatch.

When chickens got lice or mites, they would shed their feathers and stop laying eggs. Insecticides were not available, so the nest boxes were removed from the chicken house and the old straw thrown away and burned. With a small torch, the inside of the boxes would be heated, hoping to burn the insects out of the box. Then fresh straw would be added and the nest returned.

Senators' bill should relax FDA's menu labeling proposal

To ease menu labeling requirements proposed by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), Sen. Roy Blunt (R-Mo.) and Sen. Angus King (I-Maine) introduced the Common Sense Nutrition Disclosure Act.

The FDA's two proposed regulations would require caloric labeling on menus and menu boards in chain restaurants, vending machines with 20 or more locations, and retail food establishments.

According to Agri-Pulse, the senators' bill would limit the menu-labeling provision to establishments that derive 50% or more revenue from food that is intended for immediate consumption and prepared and processed on-site. This bill would not include pre-packaged food in the labeling requirement.

Under the bill, retailers could select from several approaches in providing calorie information.

"Convenience stores and their food offerings vary greatly—even those that are part of the same chain—based largely on their location and customer base," said Lyle Beckwith, National Association of Convenience Stores (NACS) vice president of government relations. "This legislation...sets realistic requirements for how businesses are classified under these regulations."

TxDOT's gravel plan on hold

The Texas Department of Transportation's (TxDOT) plan to convert 83 miles of paved road in South and West Texas to gravel drew outrage from lawmakers in Austin and citizens in the counties affected.

Following a 60-day moratorium that ended this month, TxDOT has not made any further plans for road conversions.

According to the *Mexian Tribune*, lawmakers appropriated the \$225 million for state roads impacted by energy sector development dur-

ing the legislative sessions. Last month, Sen. Tommy Williams (R-The Woodlands) offered the agency the chance to double their budget to address the road problem, making the funding contingent on TxDOT promising to hold local hearings before future road conversions took place. Williams has since resigned from the Senate.

The Legislative Budget Board, which consists of House and Senate representatives, denied TxDOT's request for additional funding.

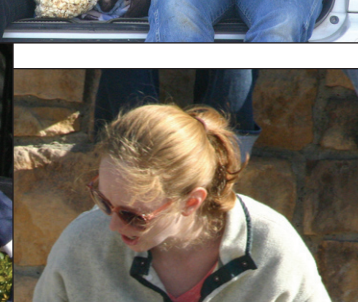
