Concerns raised over possible Red River land takeover

A government agency cannot just take away a law abiding person's property. Or can they?

The answer seems to be yes because it reportedly happened already.

There was concern of just this situation at the Monday, April 14 meeting of Cooke County Commissioners Court. Members of the Court, the NRCS (Natural Resources Conservation Service), and several citizens who had heard of the possibility and own property along the Red River were wary of an invi-tation from the Bureau of Land Management.

Cooke County was asked to approve a Memorandum of Understanding with the United States Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management and to appoint a designee to represent Cooke County Commissioners Court's interests.

David and Jamie Markwardt, who have a ranch off FM 3748, CR 435 along the Red River, said that neighbors had called that morning to tell them that the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) was considering taking a mile of land all along the Red River, for what they didn't know. They were seeking information.

Precinct #4 Commissionreceived a call from a property owner in Markwardt's area about six weeks ago on the topic. He called officials who told him it was a local dispute. Klement noted that Sunday night when he discovered that it was an agenda item, he began investigating it further. "This morning, I talked to a Wichita County Judge and that's how it started with them. They got a notice like this, 'Would you be part of this' and then all of a sudden it's, 'We want to lay claim to this.' The BML wants to control a mile wide strip from right west of Ringgold all the way to Vernon, and they're serious." That involves a 116

mile stretch.

Klement asked the NRCS staff who were present if they knew anything. They said they were playing catch up because it had just come out. They commented. "You can read all you can, but it all says the same thing. It never tells the true story or what the purpose of it is.

Klement said that there was an unannounced meeting in Wichita Falls on the subject. Some citizens found out and they and a commis-

Fox said, "Storm Ready is where you've got multiple ways to get and receive weather service information, multiple ways to push out that weather information to elected officials, county officials, and residents, and also have a good standing relationship with the National Weather Service."

Fox added that when he first started in 2009 as a meteorologist in this area, he worried about Cooke County because of its location. He said after the first storm season he did not worry about Cooke County because he knew that Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher was worrying about it.

Fletcher recognized several people who assist when there is a bad weather threat. Kevin Grant and Don Lawrence assist Fletcher and serve as back-ups when he is out of town. Volunteer ham radio operators Rick Nichols and Gary Burchett come to the EOC any time that they are called to help in bad weather times. The ham radio operators contact the weather service. They relay information that is reported by volunteer fire departments serving as the County's storm

County Clerk Rebecca Lawson added that Bill Black has done the job of election judge and he no longer is willing take on that responsibility.

Since some counties chose not to take part in Texas Department of Transportation's County Transportation Infrastructure Fund Grant Program, the money that they did not accept was divided among the counties that did agree to take part. Cooke County will now receive a total of \$1,403,000. The original amount was \$1,259,387.

Cooke County Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher updated the Court on the County's Storm Shelter Grant Program. The County was approved for the \$450,000 FEMA grant in May 2012.

Interested residents were asked to apply for shelters. The first 150 were notified in July 2012 of the deadline to finish their shelter and have it approved. After that time, those who did not comply were taken off the list and the next group given a deadline. March 31 of this year was the last completion period. There is still money remaining and so more people were notified in early April that they have an opportu-nity to participate. Their completion deadline is October 2014

Fletcher said that there has been a total of 228 shelters completed so far in the County through the grant program. By quarters, there were 45 shelters completed in the first quarter, 13 in the 2nd, 22 the third, 44 the fourth, 19 the fifth, 20 the sixth, and 65 in the seventh.

Commissioners declared April 2014 as Child Abuse Awareness Month.

CASA Executive Director Vicki Robertson remarked, "As you heard in the proclamation, 50% of the children in Texas in foster care do not have a CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate). We are a little more fortunate than that. There are 10 children whom our staff is serving that need a volunteer advocate. We need 10 or 15 people to step up so we can continue to give every child in our County who needs an advocate.

Hoberer said that they have been doing a lot of work at the Sheriff's Office trying to make things better there.

Commissioners asked about plans to improve the speed of the Courthouse's internet connections by using the microwave line that the Sheriff's Office has. Hoberer said that he has been very busy with other projects, but it is high on his priority list to get that done. Currently, the Courthouse runs on a DSL line similar to those used in homes.

Following an executive Commissioners session. voted to hire counsel from Texas Association of Counties (TAC) to represent the Cooke County Sheriff's Office in a pending lawsuit.



Weather Whys - lightning

Q: How hot can a lightning bolt be? A: Hotter than you probably think, said Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "Scientists have done numerous experiments on this very subject," McRoberts explains, "and the air around a lightning bolt can reach as high as 60,000 degrees Fahrenheit. That's about five times hotter than the surface of the sun. That's why when the air gets that hot near a bolt of lightning, it expands faster than the speed of sound, and the expansion of the air into the cooler surrounding air creates a sonic shock wave - and that's thunder. And since these waves originate along the path of a lightning bolt, there are several of these shock waves one right after another, each at a different altitude. That's why thunder often seems to rumble."





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

Wind can be good or bad, depending upon how cold it gets," he said. "If it's a still night, the cold will settle down in the low-lying areas. So it's good in the sense that wind keeps the air stirred up, but it can also spread freeze damage across a wider area.

"Unfortunately, one county over - or even one field over — there can be a degree difference. Anytime you get down to that 32-degree mark, it gets kind of tricky with flowering wheat. Farmers will really have to be scouting their fields and pay attention to what the weather conditions were like."

Neely doesn't expect realistic evaluations of the extent of freeze damage to the crop earlier than one week, perhaps two.

"It really depends upon the weather after the freeze. If it becomes hot and dry, we'll see symptoms a lot sooner. If it stays cool, it'll take a little bit longer for those symptoms to show up."


USDA predicts less corn, more soybeans in 2014

If Mother Nature cooperates, American farmers could grow a record number of soybeans this year.

According to the latest crop report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, this year's soybean planting estimate is 81.5 million acres. That's a 6% increase over last year. If realized, U.S. farmers will produce a record-setting crop between 3.4 and 3.5 billion bushels of soybeans.

While farmers are planting more soybeans this year, they may be planting less corn. A little over 91 million acres of corn are anticipated. That's the lowest amount of corn planted since 2010.

According to the American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF), if the corn crop is realized it will be the fifth largest crop since 1944.

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


