## Concerns raised over possible Red River land takeover

A government agency cannot just take away a law abiding person's property. Or can they?

The answer seems to be yes because it reportedly happened already.

There was concern of just this situation at the Monday, April 14 meeting of Cooke County Commissioners Court. Members of the Court, the NRCS (Natural Resources Conservation Service), and several citizens who had heard of the possibility and own property along the Red River were wary of an invitation from the Bureau of Land Management.

Cooke County was asked to approve a Memorandum of Understanding with the United States Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management and to appoint a designee to represent Cooke County Commissioners Court's interests.

David and Jamie Markwardt, who have a ranch off FM 3748, CR 435 along the Red River, said that neighbors had called that morning to tell them that the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) was considering taking a mile of land all along the Red River, for what they didn't know. They were seeking information.

Precinct #4 Commissioner Leon Klement said he'd received a call from a property owner in Markwardt's area about six weeks ago on the topic. He called officials who told him it was a local dispute. Klement noted that Sunday night when he discovered that it was an agenda item, he began investigating it further.

"This morning, I talked to a Wichita County Judge and that's how it started with them. They got a notice like this, 'Would you be part of this' and then all of a sudden it's, 'We want to lay claim to this.' The BLM wants to control a mile wide strip from right west of Ringgold all the way to Vernon, and they're serious." That involves a 116

mile stretch. Klement said that the Wichita County Judge advised him that Cooke County should become a party to this because if you don't, you don't have a seat at the table and you don't know what is going on. Wichita County also appointed two designees rather than one. He added that they have already sent letters of protest to Thornberry, Cruz, and everyone concerned.

Klement asked the NRCS staff who were present if they knew anything. They said they were playing catch up because it had just come out. They commented, "You can read all you can, but it all says the same thing. It never tells the true story or what the purpose of it is."

Klement said that there was an unannounced meeting in Wichita Falls on the subject. Some citizens found out and they and a commis-

sioner attended.

County Judge John Roane suggested appointing two designees just as Wichita County had. He suggested Commissioners Klement and Gary Hollowell since

their precincts were on the Red River and had the most vested interest.

The Court voted unanimously to appoint Klement and Hollowell as the designees. They also agreed to say

yes to the invitation to take part, but with language to follow regarding the Memorandum of Understanding.

## Cooke designated as Storm Ready

Mark Fox, Weather Coordination Meteorologist with the National Weather Service Office in Fort Worth, attended the Monday, April 14 meeting of Cooke County Commissioners Court to present an award. He congratulated everybody in Cooke County on becoming a Storm Ready county.

Fox said, "Storm Ready is where you've got multiple ways to get and receive weather service information, multiple ways to push out that weather information to elected officials, county officials, and residents, and also have a good standing relationship with the National Weather Service."

Fox added that when he first started in 2009 as a meteorologist in this area, he worried about Cooke County because of its location. He said after the first storm season he did not worry about Cooke County because he knew that Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher was worrying about it.

Fletcher recognized several people who assist when there is a bad weather threat. Kevin Grant and Don Lawrence assist Fletcher and serve as back-ups when he is out of town. Volunteer ham radio operators Rick Nichols and Gary Burchett come to the EOC any time that they are called to help in bad weather times. The ham radio operators contact the weather service. They relay information that is reported by volunteer fire departments serving as the County's storm

## County drug lab taken out

On Tuesday, April 8, investigators with the Cooke County Sheriff's Office Drug Enforcement Unit, assisted by agents with the Department of Homeland Security Immigration and Customs Enforcement, ICE/ERO/

Dallas, Fugitive Operations Team 3, as well as Cooke County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) patrol, and the Property Crimes Enforcement Unit, dismantled a large-scale methamphetamine distribution operation in rural

Cooke County. Two search warrants were executed in the 5000 block of FM 3164 in rural Cooke County that resulted in the arrest of a 32-year-old Hispanic male and a 28-year-old

Hispanic female. The male was a wanted fugitive from Cooke County who had managed to elude capture for approximately two years and was wanted for an earlier drug-related crime in Cooke County. Investigators were able to seize approximately one pound of methamphetamine (445 grams) with an estimated street value of approximately \$40,450, 26 firearms (four of which were reported stolen to CCSO and GPD), digital scales, packaging materials, \$605 in U.S. currency, plus a Chevrolet

Tahoe. Investigators with the Property Crimes Unit recovered a stolen vehicle from Garland. The Humane Society of North Texas removed approximately 150 roosters which were discovered to have been used or intended to be used in illegal cock-fighting. Both the male and female were transported to and placed into the Cooke County Jail on drug charges, and the male is held on an additional immigration hold. The owners of the stolen firearms will be contacted by the appropriate agencies. Cooke County Sheriff Terry Gilbert stated, "I am not able to identify these persons or

comment at this time about these arrests since the investigation is ongoing. What I can tell you is that I am making sure that the deputies in my office are doing everything they can to stop the flow of illegal drug distribution that is victimizing the citizens of Cooke County. We are working closely with all State and Federal agencies to ensure that any offender caught is prosecuted to the maximum extent of the law. We are continuing the investigation and expect more arrests in the near future. If anyone has credible information about drug distribution in the Cooke County area, I ask them to call my office."

spotters to the weather service. There are ham radio operators sitting at desks in the weather service office where meteorologists are watching radar screens. Nichols and Burchett were presented certificates of appreciation by Fletcher on behalf of Cooke County for their support of the Sky Warn Program. "The assistance they provide ensures

the safety of our residents and that the valuable information is passed on to the National Weather Service in an effort to protect all of North Texas."

Fletcher noted that it is a group effort and takes several people to coordinate the efforts at the command center, plus other ham radio operators, and those who are out watching what is happening during storms to keep County residents informed on threatening weather. Judge Roane praised Fletcher and his assistants for all they do in keeping the County updated in emergency situations such as severe weather.

were combined by a unanimous vote of Commissioners Court. Commissioner Smith explained that the Baptist Church was no longer available to use as the voting place. County Clerk Rebecca Lawson added that Bill Black has done the job of election judge and he no longer is willing take on that responsibility.

Since some counties chose not to take part in Texas Department of Transportation's County Transportation Infrastructure Fund Grant Program, the money that they did not accept was divided among the counties that did agree to take part. Cooke County will now receive a total of \$1,403,000. The original amount was \$1,259,387.

Cooke County Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher updated the Court on the County's Storm Shelter Grant Program. The County was approved for the \$450,000 FEMA grant in May 2012.

Interested residents were asked to apply for shelters. The first 150 were notified in July 2012 of the deadline to finish their shelter and have it approved. After that time, those who did not comply were taken off the list and the next group given a deadline. March 31 of this year was the last completion period. There is still money remaining and so more people were notified in early April that they have an opportunity to participate. Their completion deadline is October 2014.

Fletcher said that there has been a total of 228 shelters completed so far in the County through the grant program. By quarters, there were 45 shelters completed in the first quarter, 13 in the 2nd, 22 the third, 44 the fourth, 19 the fifth, 20 the sixth, and 65 in the seventh.

Commissioners declared April 2014 as Child Abuse Awareness Month.

CASA Executive Director Vicki Robertson remarked, "As you heard in the proclamation, 50% of the children in Texas in foster care do not have a CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate). We are a little more fortunate than that. There are 10 children whom our staff is serving that need a volunteer advocate. We need 10 or 15 people to step up so we can continue to give every child in our County who needs an advocate."

CASA has placed 137 blue ribbons on the Courthouse lawn. Each represents a child

from Cooke County who was in foster care in 2013.

IT Director Darrell Hoberer gave a presentation on the state of the County IT. He said that Deann Black was hired part-time to help with the IT jobs. She is working on replacing the many old computers that the County is using.

Hoberer said that they have been doing a lot of work at the Sheriff's Office trying to make things better there.

Commissioners asked about plans to improve the speed of the Courthouse's internet connections by using the microwave line that the Sheriff's Office has. Hoberer said that he has been very busy with other projects, but it is high on his priority list to get that done. Currently, the Courthouse runs on a DSL line similar to those used in homes.

Following an executive session, Commissioners voted to hire counsel from Texas Association of Counties (TAC) to represent the Cooke County Sheriff's Office in a pending lawsuit.

In other business Commissioners Court:

- Declared April 13-19 as National Library Week. Library Director Jennifer Johnson-Spence noted, "Every year we have increased from the year before in circulation and visitor numbers. That says to me that even though there seems to be a trend that people think libraries are no longer important in this country anymore, that is not the case here in Cooke County."

- Set spending limits to no more than 25% of their 2015 budget for elected officials who will serve another term - Judge John Roane and Pct. 4 Justice of the Peace Jason Brinkley.

Consent agenda items approved by Commissioners Court included:

- Receive and file for record a 235th District Court Order appointing Shelly Atteberry as the Cooke County Auditor for a 2 year term.

- Duro-Last Warranty for the Cooke County DPS building roof.

- Transfer of five radar gun units from Cooke County DPS inventory to the Cooke County Sheriff's inventory.

- Surplus and or salvage of six seized vehicles awarded to the Cooke County Sheriff's Office and auction and advertisement of the same.

- Accepting auction proceeds from the sale of Road and Bridge Precinct #4's equipment in the amount of \$29,171.70.

- Accepting auction proceeds from the sale of Road and Bridge Precinct #1's equipment in the amount of \$2,326.58.

- Municipal boundary change and annexation of 3.57 acres and 3.996 acres by the City of Gainesville located at FM 1202 and CR 444.

- Out-of-state travel for Jennifer Johnson-Spence, Library director, so that she may attend the American Librarians Association Conference in Las Vegas, NV from June 26-July 1.

- Accepting the Texas Commission on the Arts Quarterly Arts Response Performance Support Grant for the Cooke County Library in the amount of \$158.

- EMS Director renewing Cooke County's ambulance license with the Texas Department of State Health Services.

- Accepting payment for Supplemental Medicaid Payment for the period of March 1, 2012 to Sept. 30, 2012 from the State Medicaid Monies (1115A Monies).

- Voting machine rental agreement between Cooke County and Gainesville Hospital District for the May 2014 election.

- Texas Department of Public Safety 2012 Grant Adjustment for the Homeland Security Grant Program.

- 2014 budget calendar.

- Renewal agreement between Cooke County and Election Systems and Software, LLC for a one-year term beginning July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015 with two, one-year renewals for ballot layout, coding voice file, and ballot printing.

1954 - 2014

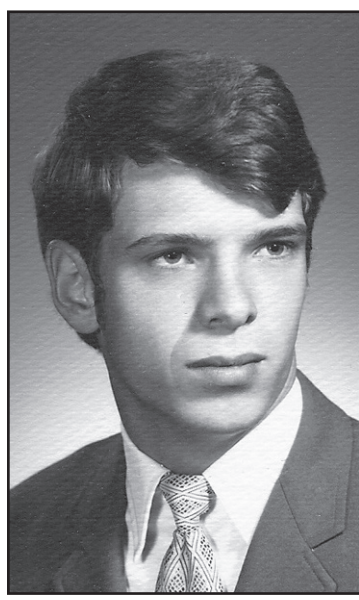

## Weather Whys - lightning

Q: How hot can a lightning bolt be?

A: Hotter than you probably think, said Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "Scientists have done numerous experiments on this very subject," McRoberts explains, "and the air around a lightning bolt can reach as high as 60,000 degrees Fahrenheit. That's about five times hotter than the surface of the sun. That's why when the air gets that hot near a bolt of lightning, it expands faster than the speed of sound, and the expansion of the air into the cooler surrounding air creates a sonic shock wave - and that's thunder. And since these waves originate along the path of a lightning bolt, there are several of these shock waves one right after another, each at a different altitude. That's why thunder often seems to rumble."

## Glaucoma is a stealthy opponent

Glaucoma is a leading cause of blindness and visual impairment, affecting as many as 2.2 million people in the U.S. The condition has no warning signs, so many people do not realize they have it.

UT Southwestern Medical Center ophthalmologists are encouraging people at risk—those older than 40, with a family history of glaucoma, or of African-American or Hispanic heritage – to be tested. Using drops in the eyes that dilate a patient's pupils, eye care professionals can check for signs of glaucoma.

"With early detection and treatment, vision loss can of-

ten be prevented," said Dr. Jess Whitson, an ophthalmologist at UT Southwestern. He recommends having a dilated eye exam every one to two years.

Glaucoma is a group of diseases that can damage the optic nerve in the eye. In its most common form, fluid builds up in the front chamber of the eye, and resulting eye pressure damages the optic nerve.

As the disease progresses, people with glaucoma may notice their side vision gradually failing. Left untreated, glaucoma can lead to serious vision loss or blindness as the field of vision narrows.

The Lindsay FFA livestock judging team has qualified for State competition. Competing at the Area V FFA contest held at Texas A&M, Commerce on April 8 were team members Alex Harrell, Campbell Williams, Matthew Huston, and Dalton Metzler.

Of the 69 teams in competition, Lindsay placed 3rd behind Howe and S&S. Individual high scoring point honors also were earned by Alex Harrell and Mat-

Livestock Judging is a competitive event that tests students' ability to select and evaluate livestock. 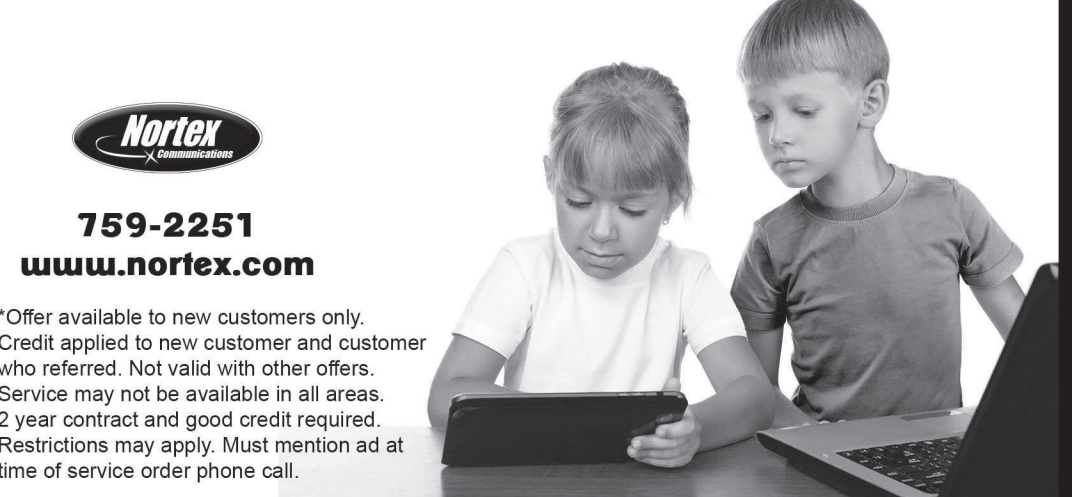

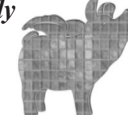

## Freeze puts large swathes of Texas wheat at risk of freeze injury

Sub-freezing temperatures on the morning of April 15 put large acreages of Texas wheat at risk for freeze injury, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

Temperatures were not as low in the Panhandle and Rolling Plains — mostly in the mid-20s — and wheat there was not as likely to have been injured as in the Central and West Central regions, said Dr. Clark Neely, AgriLife Extension small grains and oilseed specialist, College Station. This was because the wheat in the Panhandle and Rolling Plains was not as far along in development.

However, in isolated areas of the South Plains, tem-

peratures dropped into the mid-20s to upper teens — a temperature that poses a high chance of damage at any stage of wheat development, Neely said.

“Based upon what I’ve seen, looking at the weather map and reports from around the state, I would anticipate potential freeze injury anywhere from the Waco to Dallas area and westward to the Concho Valley and San Angelo area,” he said. “Primarily because that’s where the crop was flowering, and flowering is when the crop is most susceptible to freeze damage.”

Wheat across the state is one to two weeks behind in development due to a

cooler-than-normal spring and the drought, and that is a good thing when it comes to late-spring freezes, Neely said. Most Texas High Plains wheat was still in the jointing stage.

Generally, when wheat is flowering, freeze damage can occur when temperatures are as high as 32 degrees and stay there for two hours or more, he said.

It was very “touch and go, and flirting with the freezing mark” in those central parts of the state, Neely said.

Many other factors come into play, such as soil moisture, plant-moisture content, whether it’s windy or calm, and the terrain of the field.

“Wind can be good or bad, depending upon how cold it gets,” he said. “If it’s a still night, the cold will settle down in the low-lying areas. So it’s good in the sense that wind keeps the air stirred up, but it can also spread freeze damage across a wider area.”

“Unfortunately, one county over — or even one field over — there can be a degree difference. Anytime you get down to that 32-degree mark, it gets kind of tricky with flowering wheat. Farmers will really have to be scouting their fields and pay attention to what the weather conditions were like.”

Neely doesn’t expect realistic evaluations of the extent of freeze damage to the crop earlier than one week, perhaps two.

“It really depends upon the weather after the freeze. If it becomes hot and dry, we’ll see symptoms a lot sooner. If it stays cool, it’ll take a little bit longer for those symptoms to show up.”

## Agriculture Market Summary



For the week ending April 12, feeder cattle prices reported by Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$6 higher per hundredweight (cwt) compared to their previous sale. However, a few locations also noted lower prices, especially on feeders weighing 700 pounds or more. Texas direct feeder cattle prices were steady on cattle weighing less than 800 pounds, but lower on heavier weights. Tight supplies and strong demand continue to support the feeder cattle market. Fed cattle cash

prices were \$1 lower at \$147 per cwt in very light trade. Wholesale beef values were lower. Beef export sales for the week totaled 18,500 metric tons (MT), the highest of the marketing year, up 34% from the previous week and 21% from the prior four-week average. Export shipments of 12,400 MT were up 1% from a week earlier, but down 4% from the average.

Wheat prices declined after projected U.S. ending stocks came in higher than expected and export sales fell to their

lowest level of the year. The decline was limited by ongoing concerns about dry conditions on the U.S. Plains and hopes that the situation in Ukraine could boost U.S. exports. Wheat export sales totaled only 41,800 MT, the lowest weekly total of the marketing year, down 88% from the previous week and 90% from the average. Cancellations mostly offset new sales. Export shipments of 553,600 MT were up 6% from the previous week and 14% from the average.

Corn and grain sorghum prices were lower due to good planting weather in some parts of the country and weak export data. Corn export sales for the week totaled 658,700 MT, down 31% from the previous week and 30% from the prior four-week average. Export shipments of 1,217,400 MT were down 15% from a week earlier, but up 10% from the average.

## USDA increases beef production forecast

Higher beef production offset lower pork, broiler, and turkey production, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s (USDA) latest World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates (WASDE) report.

An increase in 2014 beef production is predicted. “The larger forecast second-half slaughter reflects larger placements of cattle during the first half,” the report says.

As the demand for processing-grade beef remains strong, forecast beef imports for 2014 are raised from last month. The export forecast also is raised based on continued strong sales to Asian markets.

Pork exports are predicted to decrease due to tighter supplies and higher prices are expected to constrain sales.

According to the report, the broiler export forecast is reduced based on February export data. Due to weaker sales, turkey exports are lowered.

Cattle prices for 2014 are raised from last month, the report says, reflecting continued price strength for fed cattle. Forecast hog prices

are raised based on current prices and continued tight supplies of market hogs. As cattle prices climb higher, broiler and turkey prices are raised.

## USDA predicts less corn, more soybeans in 2014

If Mother Nature cooperates, American farmers could grow a record number of soybeans this year.

According to the latest crop report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, this year’s soybean planting estimate is 81.5 million acres. That’s a 6% increase over last year. If realized, U.S. farmers will produce a record-setting crop between 3.4 and 3.5 billion bushels of soybeans.

While farmers are planting more soybeans this year, they may be planting less corn. A little over 91 million acres of corn are anticipated. That’s the lowest amount of corn planted since 2010.

According to the American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF), if the corn crop is realized it will be the fifth largest crop since 1944.

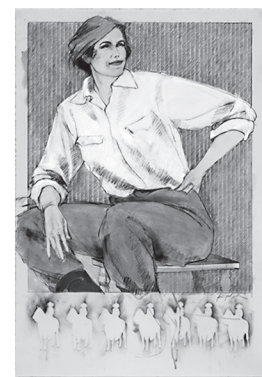

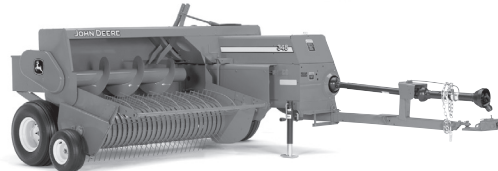
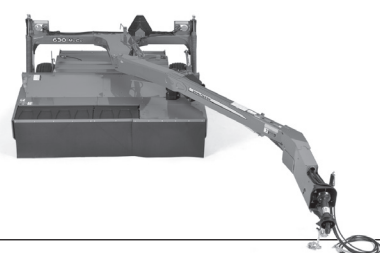
