NCTC students die in I-35 crash

Tragedy struck north Texas on Friday, Sept. 26 when four North Central Texas College (NCTC) students were killed in a two vehicle accident on I-35 in Oklahoma. All were members of the NCTC girls Softball Team.

NCTC President Dr. G. Brent Wallace released a statement on Saturday. He stated, "On behalf of the NCTC Board of Regents, administration, faculty, and staff, I would like to offer sincere condolences to these families. This is indeed a sad day for these families and for North Central Texas College. Please continue to pray for all these young ladies and the families of those who have lost loved ones.

Those who died as a result of the crash were Brooke Deckard, age 20 of Blue Ridge, TX; Jaiden Pelton, age 20 of Telephone, TX; Meagan Richardson, age 19 of Wylie, TX; and Katelynn Woodlee, age 18 of Windom, TX.

The accident occurred about 9 p.m. in Murray County, OK near the 47 mile marker. The softball team was on the way home from a game in Bethany, OK against Southern Nazarine University.

According to a news report by KXII 12 NEWS, "Oklahoma Highway Patrol (OHP) says a 2013 semi driven by 53-yearold Russell Staley of Saginaw, Texas was traveling northbound on I-35, crossed the center median, and struck a motor coach carrying the NCTC softball team. That bus was driven by Van Hedrick, who is listed as the team's coach. OHP says Staley was taken to Pauls Valley General Hospi-

to renew its Level IV Trauma designation. This included a resolution by the active Medical Staff pledging its support to maintain the Hospital as a Level IV trauma facility and to provide the best care possible within the scope of their ability to all patients in need of their services.

The Board of Directors also approved a resolution stating that it is the desire of the Hospital Board and Administration to apply for and obtain appropriate funding to support trauma care provided by the Muenster Hospital. The resolution gave the Hospital administrator the authority to file the application to the Offices of EMS and Trauma System Coordinator.

The Texas Department of State Health Services administers a program to reimburse hospitals for uncompensated trauma care. The District first applied for and received this designation in December 1999.

Chief Nursing Officer (CNO) Diane Neu noted that the District normally receives about \$30,000 per year back from the state through this program. In her monthly report to the Board, CNO Neu told of:

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Cousins celebrate 60 years in priesthood

On May 10, cousins Fr. Nicholas and Fr. Bruno Fuhrmann celebrated their 60th anniversary of ordination. They are the two oldest priests at Subiaco Abbey. Fr. Bruno just turned 85 years young and Fr. Nicholas will follow later this year.

Fr. Nicholas presided at the liturgy, with Fr. Bruno taking some of the parts of the Mass. Abbot Jerome Kordell gave the homily. Two days later, Fr. Nick returned to the hospital for heart bypass surgery. He knew this was coming, but was determined to be present for his anniversary celebration.

"He (Fr. Nick) is doing fine now," Alice Schumacher, his niece, said. "I called the other day and was told he was swimming."

About 125 relatives from the area attended the special Mass at St. Benedict's Church at Subiaco, AR and the reception that followed. Schumacher said all the families were well represented at the celebration, some coming from Oklahoma, Tennessee, California, and Kansas. Even their surviving sisters attended: for Fr. Nick, Rose Stoffels and Theresa Huchton, both of Muenster, were there, and for Fr. Bruno, his sister Juliana Grewing of Muenster and sister-in-law Margie Fuhrmann of Lindsay attended.

Fr. Nick and Fr. Bruno are the last of the "Forest of Fuhrmanns" remaining at Subiaco. At one time, there were 10 Fuhrmann relatives in the monastery.

"We prayed that this name not disappear from the Subiaco roster," was written in The Abbey Message.

It all started with Fr. Joseph Fuhrmann, Fr. Nick's uncle. He was ordained a priest on May 28, 1932, the first young man from Lindsay to become a priest. He had 17 nieces and nephews who followed him into religious life: seven as priests, four as brothers, and six as nuns. He died in 1973.

USDA's deregulation of Enlist to help farmers control resistant weeds

After a thorough review of biotech traits, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced its decision in deregulating Dow AgroSciences' Enlist corn and soybean traits. The traits will help with resistant weeds that have more than doubled since 2009 and infest approximately 70 million acres of American farmland.

According to a Dow Agro-Sciences release, the Enlist traits are part of the EnlistTM Weed Control System, a new trait and herbicide technology that will control herbicide-resistant and tough weeds. "We've used the latest science and technology to address problem weeds. Enlist will be a very effective solution and we're pleased to have this technology one step closer to the farm gate."

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State hay supplies range from surplus to practically non-existent

What is the status of statewide hay supplies? It depends upon where you are, according to Dr. Larry Redmon, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service state forage specialist, College Station.

East of U.S. Interstate 35, all the way to San Antonio, and northeast of Interstate 37 to Corpus Christi, the rains have generally been significant throughout the season, and supplies are good, Redmon said.

"So a lot of people in that region have some full hay barns and are in pretty good shape," he said. "But having said that, there are still some pockets, even within that region, that have not had the rains.

And west of I-35, again the hay supplies are extremely site specific, Redmon said. There are parts of the Edwards Plateau that have received some good rains, and other parts of that same region have not.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing and the interests the group or association seeks to protect must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

If any requests for a contested case hearing are timely filed, the executive director will forward the application and any requests fOr'a cont~sted case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meetirtg. Unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearigg, the executive director will mail the response to comments along with notification of Commission meeting to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to consider in this
