

NCTC students die in I-35 crash

Tragedy struck north Texas on Friday, Sept. 26 when four North Central Texas College (NCTC) students were killed in a two vehicle accident on I-35 in Oklahoma. All were members of the NCTC girls Softball Team.

NCTC President Dr. G. Brent Wallace released a statement on Saturday. He stated, "On behalf of the NCTC Board of Regents, administration, faculty, and staff, I would like to offer sincere condolences to these families. This is indeed a sad day for these families and for North Central Texas College. Please continue to pray for all these young ladies and the families of those who have lost loved ones."

Those who died as a result of the crash were Brooke Deckard, age 20 of Blue Ridge, TX; Jaiden Pelton, age 20 of Telephone, TX; Meagan Richardson, age 19 of Wylie, TX; and Katelynn Woodlee, age 18 of Windom, TX.

The accident occurred about 9 p.m. in Murray County, OK near the 47 mile marker. The softball team was on the way home from a game in Bethany, OK against Southern Nazarene University.

According to a news report by *KXII 12 NEWS*, "Oklahoma Highway Patrol (OHP) says a 2013 semi driven by 53-year-old Russell Staley of Saginaw, Texas was traveling northbound on I-35, crossed the center median, and struck a motor coach carrying the NCTC softball team. That bus was driven by Van Hedrick, who is listed as the team's coach. OHP says Staley was taken to Pauls Valley General Hospi-

Muenster Hospital Administrator Michael Kent reported on Sept. 23 at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors on an employee recognition program and suggestion boxes that the Hospital started. The Rising Star Award is featured in a display set up by the dining/kitchen area to honor employees. The display has a photo of the recognized employee for the month and positive comments about other employees.

Also new is a suggestion/comment box in the front lobby and in the dining area across from the nurses station. Comment boxes are checked every Friday. With the deadline for Meaningful Use compliance looming in regard to the government required electronic health records (EHR), Hospital administration and staff painted a much brighter picture at Tuesday's meeting of the MMH Board.

"Our only measure that we don't have the letter in yet is our Syndromic Surveillance," noted Administrator Kent. "We've tested with them successfully."

IT Director Steve Fowler added, "We well met what we were required to meet. We're just trying to make it functional so that we're actually in business and we don't have to deal with it. So, we met that criteria early. We just don't have that piece of paper."

Board Secretary John Aytes said, "That's a nice improvement over the past six months and we thank all of you."

Board President Ronnie Weinzapfel inquired if there had been verifications other than the Medisol program check. Debbie Neu said that she had verified that they are pulling all of the patients across and CNO Diane Neu was spot checking to be sure that the various things were being done.

MISD discusses building construction

Construction of the new junior high building at Muenster ISD continues to progress. At the regular Board meeting held on Wednesday, Sept. 10, it was agreed that

the project is still on course for a mid-December move in.

Work on the building that has been completed includes erection of frame work; purlins, bracing, and girts in place; safe corridors are in progress and approximately

90% complete with rebar and concrete filled cells. Plumbing and electrical for interior roughed in and perimeter studs and gyp board sheathing is underway.

The projected schedule next several weeks is to complete CMU concrete/re-

bar-filled safe corridor walls, concrete contractor to set forms and pour concrete roof on safe corridors, begin interior stud walls, metal building erectors will begin roof sheet installation, continue plumbing, electrical, and

tal where he was treated and released. Hedrick refused treatment at the scene.”

According to the *News 12* report, OHP is working the accident as a homicide investigation as is customary in such cases.

The *12 News* report said, “Three of the girls died at the scene while another girl died at Arbuckle Memorial Hospital in Sulphur. Two passengers on the bus were flown by helicopter to OU Medical Center in Oklahoma

During the August meeting, the Board of Trustees discussed possibly adding cabinets and countertops to some of the junior high classrooms. Kent said that they would wrap everything up on Sept. 30 and depending on patients, he will start processing the paperwork.

Paperwork has begun for the Muenster Hospital District to renew its Level IV Trauma designation. This included a resolution by the active Medical Staff pledging its support to maintain the Hospital as a Level IV trauma facility and to provide the best care possible within the scope of their ability to all patients in need of their services.

The Board of Directors also approved a resolution stating that it is the desire of the Hospital Board and Administration to apply for and obtain appropriate funding to support trauma care provided by the Muenster Hospital. The resolution gave the Hospital administrator the authority to file the application to the Offices of EMS and Trauma System Coordinator.

The Texas Department of State Health Services administers a program to reimburse hospitals for uncompensated trauma care. The District first applied for and received this designation in December 1999.

Chief Nursing Officer (CNO) Diane Neu noted that the District normally receives about \$30,000 per year back from the state through this program.

In her monthly report to the Board, CNO Neu told of:

- Now having access to Texas Tech’s online continuing education free of charge for the staff this year for TORCH hospitals;
- First semester RN and 3rd semester LVN students from NCTC are doing clinicals at the Hospital. The third semester students are allowed to give meds and help a lot;
- Neu and Administrator Kent attended the Children’s Advocacy Center (CAC) meeting on Sept. 4 in Gainesville. She was asked to be on their task force.
- MMH is working towards becoming designated as a Stroke Certified Center. Tiffany Lutkenhaus, assistant CNO, is in charge of getting the Stroke designation set up.
- There were 70 ER visits in August. The Rednecks With Paychecks weekend had 35 ER visits with 28 being directly from Rednecks. There were 19 ambulance transports to MMH from there and the others were walk ins. A Level I trauma surgeon was on call for that weekend. There were nine outpatient surgeries on seven patients during August.

In other business, the Hospital Board approved:

- Medical staff appointment as approved by the Medical Staff for courtesy privileges for Steven M. Wiese, M.D., an ER physician, and David Miksits, M.D., a radiologist.
- Bad debt write off totaling \$22,114.72.

Elementary Principal Lou Heers gave an enrollment count of 289 students in grades Pre-K-6th. That compares to 284 last year.

During the month of September, bus evacuation drills will be held for all elementary students. Texas Primary Reading Inventory (TPI) testing for 1st and 2nd grade students. Kindergarten students will be assessed after the first six weeks of school. The Cognitive Abilities Test (CogA) is an IQ test that will be administered to all 3rd and 6th graders the week of Sept. 22-26. Kindergarten students take this test in January. The Iowa Test of Basic Skills (ITBS), an achievement test, will be administered to the 1st, 2nd, and 4th graders the week of Sept. 22-26. This test compares the student with same age students nationwide.

JH/HS Principal John York reported a total enrollment of 210 in JH/HS. The attendance rate from Aug. 25 to Sept. 3 was 99.6%. He said, “Great start to the school year. There has been a great effort made by teachers to make use of available technology in the classrooms. Students are responding in a positive manner to these opportunities.”

York said he’s heard good comments about the food in the cafeteria. Both students and teachers said it is quite good.

National Honor Society induction will be held Oct. 7 at 6 p.m. in the cafeteria.

Technology Director Jeff Presnall said that they have been tweaking the new lunch ordering process to alleviate and reduce the amount of time and confusion associated with the new cafeteria service. The use of online forms, erasable student check lists, and the physical order of students in the serving line are all being considered to reduce the amount of valuable time of teachers, principals, and cafeteria personnel with this rather multifaceted issue.

Presnall said that he met with Nortex about the new junior high building’s fiber connection, local area network, and intercom/bell system.

Athletic Director Brady Carney reported 29 boys participating in Junior High football. Cross Country has nine high school girls, nine junior high girls, and 10 junior high boys. Both Varsity boys and girls basketball teams will play in a Fall league in Justin at Northwest High School beginning this month.

In other business, the MISD Board of Trustees:

- Discussed, but took no action on an Accountability Stipend for 2014-15.
- Approved using Four Feathers to re-do the fire alarm system in the old junior high building.
- Discussed superintendent candidate applicants during executive session, but took no action following it.

**Texas program offers
classes for engaged couples**

Wedding planning is hard, but marriage can be harder. Thanks to a program sponsored by the Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC), couples approaching marriage can build a solid foundation and save the \$60 marriage license fee as well.

The *Twogether* in Texas program offers premarital education to engaged couples across the state through a network of providers. Couples who go through a class can have their marriage license fee reduced by \$60 and waive the 72-hour waiting

period after they get their license.

"The premarital education that couples get in the *Twogether* in Texas program can set a strong foundation for a marriage and give couples a better idea of the challenges they will face," said Gordon Leeks, who oversees the program for HHSC.

"The idea behind *Twogether* in Texas is that couples take an eight-hour class which covers conflict resolution, communication, and other key aspects of marriage," Leeks said. "The goal is to increase the well-being of all Texas children by providing voluntary marriage and relationship education skills to their parents."

Couples can find organizations and churches that offer the classes by searching online at *TwogetherInTexas.com* or calling 2-1-1. Contact the organization of your choice to check on class times and register to attend. Some organizations charge a small fee to cover the costs of the classes, and others offer free classes.

Couples who complete a class get a certificate that they can take to their county clerk when they apply for their marriage license. The certificate is good for one year and serves as proof that the couple is eligible for the discounted marriage license.

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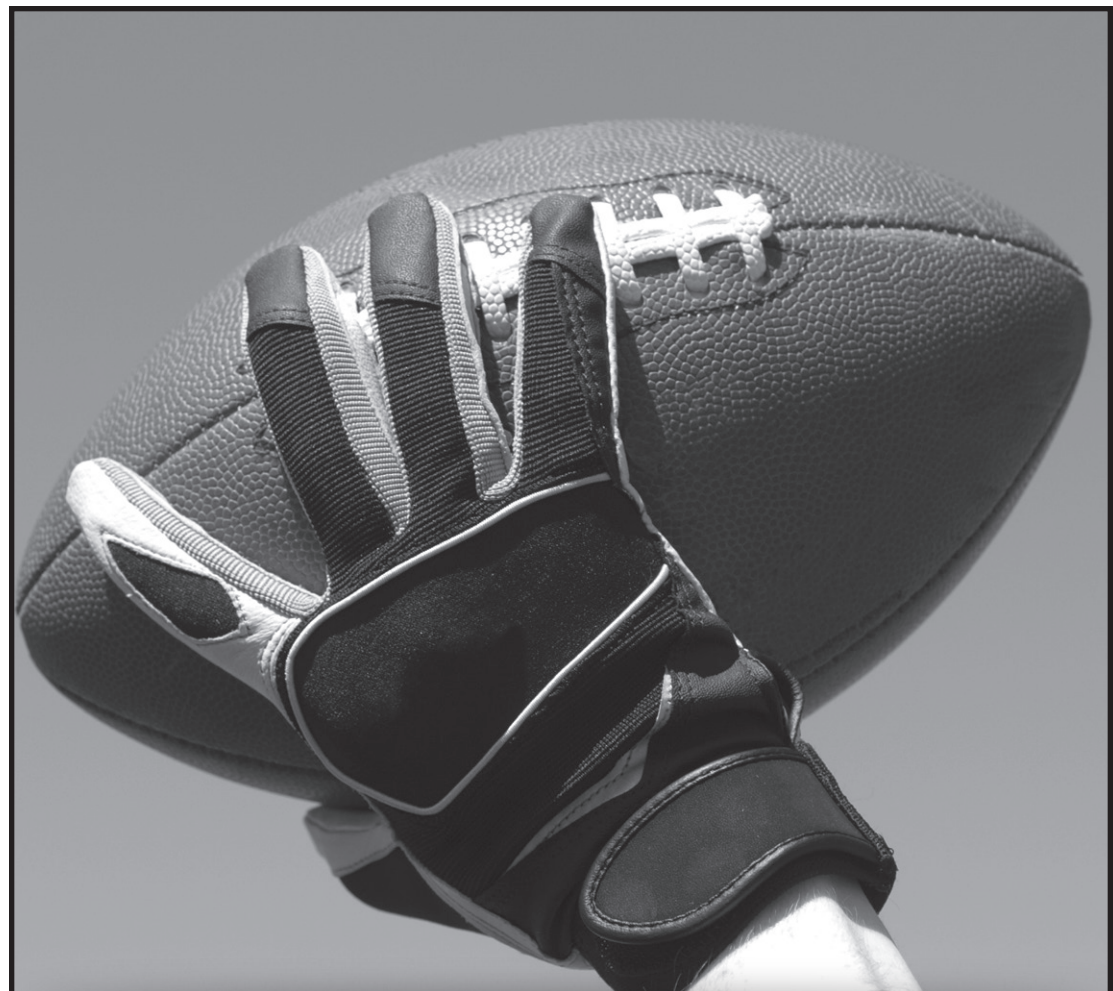

Dennis explained the importance of the new Fire Station. "We have some older trucks in bad shape," he said. "We can't replace them with newer, longer trucks until we have a new Fire Station to store them."

The grant money is there, the Department just can't receive these grants with the current station as it is too small for the larger trucks, and it is a requirement for them to be placed in a building.

"So the long-term, we want first, a new Fire Station, then two, to replace two trucks," Dennis said.

Proceeds from the Oktoberfest will give both organizations a good start on their planned projects. So come out Sunday and enjoy good food, good music, and fun for all ages.

Cousins celebrate 60 years in priesthood

On May 10, cousins Fr. Nicholas and Fr. Bruno Fuhrmann celebrated their 60th anniversary of ordination. They are the two oldest priests at Subiaco Abbey. Fr. Bruno just turned 85 years young and Fr. Nicholas will follow later this year.

Fr. Nicholas presided at the liturgy, with Fr. Bruno taking some of the parts of the Mass. Abbot Jerome Kordell gave the homily. Two days later, Fr. Nick returned to the hospital for heart bypass surgery. He knew this was coming, but was determined to be present for his anniversary celebration.

"He (Fr. Nick) is doing fine now," Alice Schumacher, his niece, said. "I called the other day and was told he was swimming."

About 125 relatives from the area attended the special Mass at St. Benedict's Church at Subiaco, AR and the reception that followed. Schumacher said all the families were well represented at the celebration, some coming from Oklahoma, Tennessee, California, and Kansas. Even their surviving sisters attended: for Fr. Nick, Rose Stoffels and Theresa Huchton, both of Muenster, were there, and for Fr. Bruno, his sister Juliana Grewing of Muenster and sister-in-law Margie Fuhrmann of Lindsay attended.

Fr. Nick and Fr. Bruno are the last of the "Forest of Fuhrmanns" remaining at Subiaco. At one time, there were 10 Fuhrmann relatives in the monastery.

"We prayed that this name not disappear from the Subiaco roster," was written in *The Abbey Message*.

It all started with Fr. Joseph Fuhrmann, Fr. Nick's uncle. He was ordained a priest on May 28, 1932, the first young man from Lindsay to become a priest. He had 17 nieces and nephews who followed him into religious life: seven as priests, four as brothers, and six as nuns. He died in 1973.

Nephews who became priests include Fr. Leo Koesler OSB, Fr. David Flusche OSB, Fr. Aloys Fuhrmann OSB, Fr. Bruno Fuhrmann OSB, Fr. Nicholas Fuhrmann OSB, Rev. Monsignor Fred J. Mosman, and Fr. Vincent Flusche.

Those who became broth-

er monks were Bro. Henry Fuhrmann OSB, Bro. Michael Fuhrmann OSB, Bro. Louis Fuhrmann OSB, and Bro. Vincent Klein OSB.

The priests/brothers who are OSB are Order of Saint Benedict and went to Subiaco.

Nieces who became nuns were Sr. Henriann Fuhrmann CDP, Sr. Michael Marie Fuhrmann CDP, Sr. M. Corinne Koesler CDP, Sr. Catherine Henry Fuhrmann CDP, Sr. Mary Lin Koesler CDP, and Sr. Mary Helen Fuhrmann SSMN.

The sisters who are CDP are Congregation of Divine Providence. The other men and women joined different Catholic religious orders.

Fr. Nicholas Fuhrmann was born Linus Fuhrmann on Dec. 5, 1930 in Lindsay, the sixth child of William and Margaret Orth Fuhrmann. He was ordained a Benedictine priest at Subiaco on May 16, 1954. He and his cousin Fr. Bruno returned to Lindsay where he celebrated his First High Mass at St. Peter's Catholic Church. He then returned

to Subiaco to continue his studies. He received his Masters in English from St. Louis University.

Fr. Nick taught English at Subiaco Academy and coached boxing and football. In 1980, he was assigned to St. Mary's Parish in Windthorst before being named pastor at St. Mary's Parish in Gainesville. There, he taught religion in the grade school and revived the sports program by coaching football and track. Later, he spent time in Belize then became the


residing priest at the hospital in Jonesboro, AR, before returning to Subiaco.

Fr. Bruno is the son of the late Joseph and Mary Orth Fuhrmann of Lindsay. He was born there on July 29, 1929. In 1947, he made his profession to become a priest and was ordained in Little Rock, AR. On May 16, 1954, Fr. Bruno returned to Lindsay to say his First Mass in St. Peter's Church on May 23, 1954. He celebrated Mass that morning and his cousin Fr. Nick also celebrated his First Mass that afternoon.

"One of the outstanding features of these two Masses was that all of the assisting clergy were relatives with the exception of Fr. Conrad Herda, who was the pastor at Lindsay," as was written in *Lindsay, Texas: The First 100 Years*.

After his ordination, Fr. Bruno taught at Subiaco Academy before being assigned to a string of parishes, including being assistant pastor at Sacred Heart Church in Muenster. Since 1971, Fr. Bruno has served as the Abbey procurator. Today, he works in the wood shop at the Abbey.

The Sacred Heart Tigers came out ready to play last Friday night when District rival Colleyville Covenant Christian Cougars entered the Jungle expecting another win over Sacred Heart.

The Tigers scored 36 points in the 1st half, sending Covenant home with a 38-14 loss.

"A total team effort," noted Sacred Heart Coach Dale Schilling. "The Tigers played very physical on defense and executed on offense. I couldn't be more pleased with both sides of the ball."

Action began when Zach Flusche returned the opening kick to the Tiger 28 yard line. Two short passes gained

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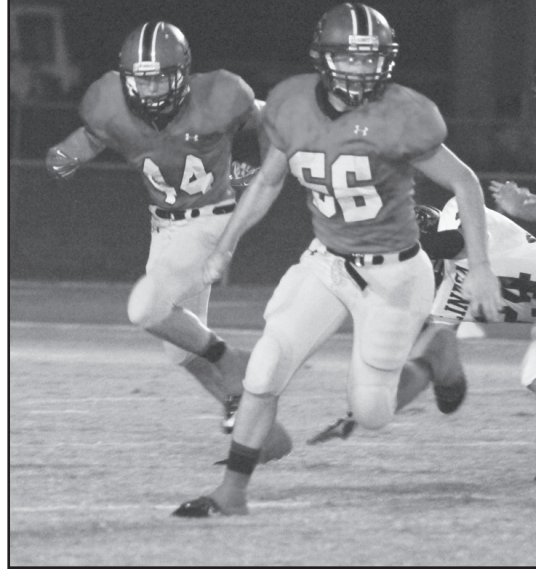

USDA's deregulation of Enlist to help farmers control resistant weeds

After a thorough review of biotech traits, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced its decision in deregulating Dow AgroSciences' Enlist corn and soybean traits. Theft Prevention Tips

Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association

1. Display TSCRA member sign on gates and entrances. It is an excellent deterrent.
2. Lock gates.
3. Brand cattle and horses. Make sure the brand is recorded with the county clerk.
4. Put driver's license number on all saddles, tack, and equipment.
5. Videotape horses and tack. Keep complete and accurate descriptions on file. Establish an organized, easy-to-find proof of ownership file to save valuable time in recovery process.
6. Count cattle regularly.
7. Don't establish a routine when feeding. Vary the times you feed.
8. Be cautious about who gets keys and combinations.
9. If possible, park trailers and equipment where they are out of view from the roadway.
10. Keep tack rooms and saddle compartments on trailers locked.
11. Don't feed in pens.
12. Participate in neighborhood Crime Watch programs.
13. Don't build pens close to a roadway.
14. Never leave keys in tractors or other equipment.

How to report a theft

If you believe livestock or equipment have been stolen from you:

1. Contact your local police or sheriff.
2. Then, contact your TSCRA special ranger.
3. Or contact TSCRA at 800-242-7820 or 817-332-7064.

Be prepared with answers to as many of these questions as possible to help the investigators with your case.

- Your name
- Your telephone, cell phone, and fax numbers. If you are a TSCRA member, give your membership number and they will retrieve your contact information.
- Case number from your local law enforcement agency
- What was stolen?
- When do you think the livestock or equipment was stolen?
- Can you estimate the time of day, the day of the week, or a range of dates?
- When did you last see the missing livestock or equipment?
- Was there any physical evidence left at the scene?
- Please describe the evidence.
- Were there any identifying marks on the livestock or equipment, such as: ID number, serial number, brand, ear tags, ear notches, marks, or scars?
- Was your driver's license number anywhere on the equipment?
- Do you have photos?
- Do you have a suspect in mind?
- Have you seen any suspicious vehicles in your area? Can you describe them?
- Were there any witnesses? How can we contact the witness or witnesses?

State hay supplies range from surplus to practically non-existent

What is the status of statewide hay supplies? It depends upon where you are, according to Dr. Larry Redmon, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service state forage specialist, College Station.

East of U.S. Interstate 35, all the way to San Antonio, and northeast of Interstate 37 to Corpus Christi, the rains have generally been significant throughout the season, and supplies are good, Redmon said.

"So a lot of people in that region have some full hay barns and are in pretty good shape," he said. "But having said that, there are still some pockets, even within that region, that have not had the rains."

And west of I-35, again the hay supplies are extremely site specific, Redmon said. There are parts of the Edwards Plateau that have received some good rains, and other parts of that same region have not.

"In the Vernon area, in the Rolling plains, essentially they are still like they were in 2011, the catastrophic drought year," he said. "They have not changed at all; they are under exceptional drought."

There is some hay moving from hay-surplus areas in the eastern parts of the state to the western, Redmon said.

"I looked at what Dr. Levi Russell, AgriLife Extension

economist in Corpus Christi, is showing on his budgets. It kind of depends, but he was showing breakeven costs on Bermuda grass hay big round bales from \$44 to close to \$60," he said. "So I'm assuming that for some people buying hay, they are going to be paying from \$60 to \$70, depending on the size of the bale, especially for any hay that has fertilizer costs associated with it."



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TDA offers feral hog control grants

The Texas Department of Agriculture's (TDA) County Hog Out Management Program runs through Nov. 30. The program's goal is to reduce the feral hog population and to continue abatement during the year through incentives to qualifying counties throughout the Lone Star State.

According to TDA, the highest ranking counties in this program will receive

assistance to continue local activities which may range from educating the landowners on abatement methods, coordinating trapping and hunting programs, to conducting aerial gunning and addressing public safety hazards related to feral hogs.

To be eligible for an award under the program, the applicant must be a Texas county. The county must have or develop a method to accurately

track the number of feral hogs taken in the county during Sept. 1 through Nov. 30.

TDA anticipates making eight awards ranging from \$20,000 to \$5,000 each.
