BIG AUDIENCE HEARS JERUSALEM LECTURE AND SEES PICTURES

Delivering the fourth of a series of sermon-lectures on Palestine Sunday night, Rev. W. B. Gray addressed the largest audience that has ever been seated in the First Presbyterian church. The congregation of the Central Methodist church attended almost in a body, the evening service in that church having been suspended. The theme of the lecture was "The Holy City and Calvary," and stereopticon pictures gave a realism to the address that made it very interesting and instructive.

A solo, "The Holy City," was sung by Miss Clare Drey as an impressive part of the service. Miss Drey and Mrs. Louis Walker also sang a duet during the opening portion of the service, and Mrs. Robert Hall played two organ numbers.

Jerusalem, as pictured by Dr. Gray, is the only walled city now standing in the world, and in addition to the walls surrounding the city, there are innumerable walls within the city itself. It is a city of mosques and cathedrals and churches, with a densely packed population made up principally of Arabs and Jews but with representatives of all the other nationalities as well. The site of Calvary has not been definitely determined, three locations being pointed out to the tourists. One is within the city, a site upon which the Church of the Holy Sepulchre now stands; another is just outside the city wall, on a hill called the Skull; and a third is farther away, a tremendous ash heap where refuse from burned offerings has been thrown through many centuries.

In response to requests by other pastors of the city, Dr. Gray is arranging for a union evening service to be held within a week or two, at which time he will give a resume of presented in his own church.

An interesting feature of the series of lectures heretofore

Sunday morning service in the First Presbyterian church was a lecture upon the Jewish religion by Gus Rosenberg, Brownwood merchant, who spoke at the Sunday school hour to more than a hundred men and women assembled in the basement of the church. Mr. Rosenberg, a Reformed Jew, gave a clear-cut delineation of the present day ceremonial worship of the Jews, explaining the difference between Reformed and Orthodox Jews which, he said, is principally that of language employed in their worship. Orthodox Jews use the Hebrew language in their synagogues, while Reformed Jews conduct their services in the language of the country in which they live, and their churches are called temples instead of synagogues.

Attitude Toward Christ.

The attitude of the Jews toward Jesus Christ, as explained by Mr. Rosenberg after a great deal of study of Jewish literature and the statements of some of this country's most prominent rabbis, was also discussed. The Jew, he said, believe Jesus Christ was a Jew, a great rabbi or teacher, whose teachings are in every respect worthy; he was the first to teach the doctrine of the brotherhood of man as a natural outgrowth of the doctrine of the fatherhood of God; he was not the promised Messiah, although many of his followers believed him to be, and his claims of divinity were more or less figurative and were inspired largely by the worshipful attitude of his followers. Mr. Rosenberg said the Jews particularly dislike the oft-repeated charge that the Jews put Christ to death. To the contrary, he said, the Roman authorities and their soldiers executed Christ, the Jews having no authority to do so. The lecture was well received by the large class, which included visitors from several other Sunday schools of the city.

QUALITY COTTON SEED USED IN THIS COUNTY SUBJECT DISCUSSION

The condition of cotton seed planted by Brown county farmers came under discussion at a meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce following the weekly luncheon, at the Southern Hotel Monday noon.

"The seed used by our farmers has run out and is so poor in quality that Brownwood cotton is being penalized from 150 to 200 points," said O. W. McDonald, gin man. He and Lawrence Moore appeared before the directors with samples of cotton from ordinary run down seed as being pretty generally used here, and cotton from pedigreed seed; also some of the seed itself for comparison.

There were various methods of remedying the condition, but only one was discussed at length. This was the idea of getting together some money to purchase first class seed and getting the farmers to buying it.

"Even then," said Mr. McDonald, "it will take several years before we can raise the correct kind of cotton and hope to get recognition for it from the buyers."

The discussion brought up the fact that a great many growers take their cotton to Santa Anna where it is claimed they get better prices. It seemed to be agreed that this practice is common and that those who did it got a slightly higher price for their cotton, but it also was decided among the members present that when the buyers realized it was Brown county cotton of poorer classification, it would react against those growers, and also against Santa Anna. But it was agreed also that this county is really not raising the quality of staple as they should because of the poor seed they are using.

This matter was referred to the agricultural committee, of which H. G. Lucas is chairman, and Mr. Lucas said that the discussion was to the point, and he was sure his committee would probably make a like report as was made at this meeting.

John T. Yantis, in this connection, asked why Brownwood always paid a premium for a sorry first bale of cotton, short staple stuff which had to be gathered from a good many acres and which did nobody any good, when the citizens might make up awards to go to the man who raised the best staple cotton in the county instead. He said he would like to discourage this first bale fare.

O. P. Griffin, county agricultural agent, made a report of the Brown county exhibit at the State Fair of Texas, where it received an award of \$125 for first place in the third class. He said he showed seven major crops for this county. He went into detail on the method of scoring and showed the difference between a high score booth and one which gave the public the correct idea of the major crops of the county.

Mr. Burks read a letter from W. C. Headrick of Fort Worth, who said he was pleased with the acceptance of his ideas of a hotel in Brownwood, which were discussed by the directors at last Monday's meeting, and said he is now working on detailed plans for the 150 room hotel. Mr. Burks also made a report on the condition of the highway building within the county.

MILLER GIVES SIX PARDONS

AUSTIN, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The Echo newspaper published by inmates of Huntsville penitentiary, was without an editor today.

E. R. Robinson, editor of the paper and prime mover in prison welfare work, who was serving six years from Dallas county for burglary, was a "free man." He had 11 more months to serve.

Acting Governor Barry Miller issued a full pardon to him. He issued five other full pardons, one conditional pardon, and one general parole in addition to full pardons and one conditional pardon granted previously.

Others drawing full pardons were

Loftis, Hill county, serving one year for violation of the prohibition law, with four months to go; Antonio Romer, Miami county, three years for violating prohibition law, having served one year and seven months; C. C. Monroe, Grayson county, two years for burglary, with term to expire next January 21; John Rogers, Sabine County, five years for criminal assault, had served 17 months; Lorenzo Ramirez, Haskell county, five years for manslaughter, had served since 1927.

A condition pardon was issued to Louis Reneau, Dallas county, serving from two to four years for felonious theft. He had served over two years.

The general parole was given to Will Hargrove, 75-year-old negro convicted in Walker county for the alleged murder of J. J. Hardy. He had been in prison since 1912. The jury had given him death, but Governor Colquitt commuted the sen-

tence to life. Later he was absolved by a dying statement of a man who had been indicted with Hargrove for the murder.

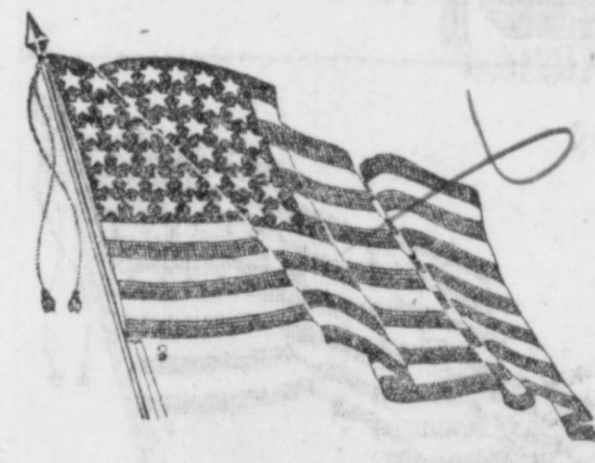

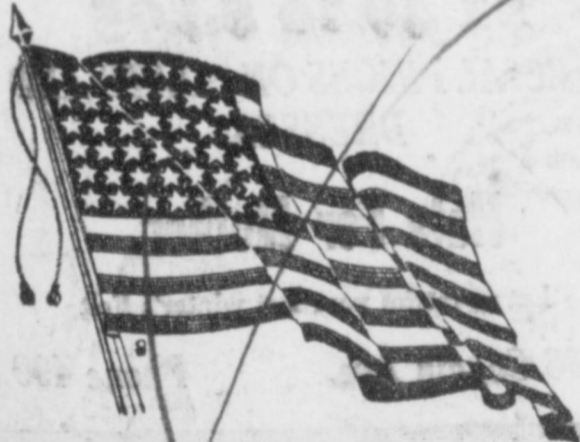
