Price said that carpet was being laid that day and should be finished the next. Pouring of the sidewalks was waiting warmer weather. They scheduled it for Monday, Jan. 19 which was predicted to be warm and sunny.

According to Junior High/High School Principal John York, the tentative move in date is Feb. 6. He said that the teachers are getting excited about the move to the new fa-



Class on Dust Bowl free to public

North Central Texas College is providing a unique opportunity to its service community this spring semester: a new Humanities course focusing on the Dust Bowl experience of the 1930s.

The course will be offered through both the academic program and the Lifelong Learning division. The class, taught every Tuesday from 1 to 4 p.m., in Room 803 on the NCTC Gainesville campus, will be divided into four segments covering history, science, literature, and art. NCTC encourages all interested persons to join the class, which will be open and free to those who do not seek academic credit.

Texans voice concerns about CSP

only comes along once every five years, so as the public comment period on the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) came, ranchers and farmers across Texas and the nation made their voices

The program offers payments for actively managing, maintaining, and expanding conservation activities, but Traci Bruckner, senior policy associate for conservation and agriculture at the Center for Rural Affairs, said among the concerns with the CSP Interim Final Rule is that it places a higher emphasis the farmers and ranchers who have been implementing conservation as a very central part of their farming

"So, we're saying that they org.

It was an opportunity that should level the playing field there," she said. "Reward farmers and ranchers equally for the environmental outcomes, regardless of when they adopt those."

Additional concerns raised included that the CSP rule doesn't do enough to support beginning and small-acreage farmers. Bruckner said she believes it should be amended to close the loopholes that allow the largest operations to exceed payment limits.

"We're saying there should be 'actively engagement rules' applied to this," she said, "and that they should actually limit the payment question were missing. on the adoption of new prac- limit to what the statute says, tices "rather than supporting which is \$40,000 per year and

Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak officially over

The outbreak of Vesicular Stomatitis that affected horses and cattle across Texas, Nebraska, and Colorado is considered over, according to *Horsetalk*. No new cases have been reported since early December 2014.

"All premises previously under quarantine in Nebraska and Texas have been released," Dr. John Clifford, deputy administrator for Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), said. "All the remaining premises under quarantine in Colorado will be released 21 days after lesions of all affected animals on the premises have healed."

The final report shows the outbreak was the worst on

record. A total of 644 horses and cattle were infected. Of those

cases, 89 horses and 8 cattle infected in Texas.

Producers have the the option to choose between two safety net programs: Price Loss Coverage, also known as PLC, and Agricultural Risk Coverage, and the opportunity to reallocate base acres and update payment yields.

"These are five-year decisions," said Dr. Joe Outlaw, co-director of the Agricultural and Food Policy Center at Texas A&M University and AgriLife Extension economist. "Farmers have to decide what is best for their operation, knowing that their choices will extend through the life of the farm bill."

The deadline for base allocation and yield update is Feb. 27. The 2014 farm bill ARC/PLC election deadline is March 31.

"I can imagine some farmers are thinking that is a few months away," Outlaw said. "The actual deadline may be sooner for some. If a producer wants to purchase the Supplemental Coverage Option, or SCO, from their crop insurance agent, this decision will need to be made during the normal insurance sign-up. They are ineligible for SCO if they eventually choose ARC. With the early planting dates of South Texas, the de facto deadline is the crop insurance purchase deadline, which will be Jan. 31. Farmers need to make their ARC/PLC decision



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
