

## Vote Saturday!

Muenster ISD will hold an election on Saturday, May 9 to fill three places on the Muenster ISD Board of Trustees. Two of the three places have no contest.

The ballot will show incumbent Kim Walterscheid, Place 6; Jeff Flusche, Place 7; and Place 5 with incumbent Richard Dangelmayr and Craig Stoffels both seeking election to that position. Steve Trubenbach currently serves in Place 7, but he did not file for another term.

This election is by position, not at large, meaning candidates are voted on for the Place that they file for. The person getting the most votes for the Place wins that Board seat.

Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. The election will be held in the Muenster Junior High Building, 135 East Seventh Street, Muenster.

## My Brother's House opens in Muenster

In April, a new non-profit resource moved into the former St. Richard's Villa building in Muenster after their Gainesville facility went up for sale after three years. My Brother's House is a 501 (c) (3) sober living facility for recovering alcoholics and substance abusers organized in 2012 in Gainesville. Men staying in the facility of their own free will range in age and are there to receive support from their peer group.

Patti W. Hunnicutt, secretary-treasurer for My Brother's House, remarked, "They, the residents living there, have painted and cleaned it up and decorated. Looks fantastic inside!"

The Live-in House Manager Terry said the facility will accommodate around 25-30 comfortably.

Living in this drug and alcohol-free facility offers dignity to the residents while building social support in this self-help atmosphere. Studies suggest living in this type of home alleviates social isolation in a functional environment without imprisonment and allows

the residents to co-exist with their neighborhood. Studies also show less reliance on public assistance, lower medical and legal costs to the community, higher employment commitment, and improvement in abstinence levels.

My Brother's House is a sober and clean environment that is a teaching tool for a way of living in recovery and learning through example day by day to live life honestly, ethically, and to help others. These men foster a relationship with a higher power - no matter the denomination and work - to put it into daily practice without dependence on drugs or alcohol.

My Brother's House is not a treatment facility, nor have the residents been mandated by the courts to reside in the house. Background checks are completed and no sex offenders or family violence offenders are admitted. Random drug and alcohol testing is administered by the House Manager. Each

## City warns residents to watch their dogs and keep lawn grass mowed

Are you one of the Muenster residents who are guilty of letting your dog or dogs roam freely about town or a property owner who needs to mow your lawn? City Administrator Stan Endres reported at Monday's City Council meeting that people have

been complaining to the City about both issues.

Endres said if you see a stray dog, call him or Leo Lutkenhaus and the City will try to catch the dogs.

"Everybody needs to be aware with the lawns, with all the rain, everybody's yards need mowed," remarked Endres. "There are a lot of vacant lots around town that people were calling about today. They definitely need to be mowed."

He asked that people pay attention to their dogs and that they be sure their grass is kept mowed.

The City Pool will open on Saturday, May 23. No changes are planned for admission costs.

Endres said that the new walking trail has been started and cement would be poured this week. There are currently no set plans for the City Park around the walking trail. Picnic tables and trees will be added, but they are not sure where yet.

Endres said that the City

will be responsible for the cost of a cement walkway to be constructed from the east side of the bridge to the park road. He felt like a good amount of the trees, water lines, and the cement walkway could be paid for with the money in the Germanfest Gate Fund. There is almost \$15,000 in the fund and

this year's gate percentage will be added. That money is designated to be used for improvements.

"That is something for the future and we need to start thinking about what we need to do there," Endres said.

## Muenster PD to collect prescription drugs

During the Muenster Hospital Spring Health Fair on Saturday, May 9, the first drug take-back event for the Muenster area will take place. Muenster Police Department and Muenster Memorial Hospital have partnered for the effort. Residents will have a chance to bring their expired or unused prescription medications for proper disposal by the Muenster Police Department.

This for prescription drugs only. It is completely anonymous - no questions will be asked. Only pills and other solids, like patches, can be brought to the collection site. Liquids and needles or other sharps will not be accepted.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets

## NCTC approves contractor for Health Sciences building

Regents of the North Central Texas Community College District unanimously approved Plyler Construction as the contractor to construct the new Leo and Mabel Scott Health Science Center on the Gainesville campus.

Plyler was approved for their alternate bid of \$7,993,000 with a completion date of July 5, 2016. Regents were happy that the bid came in more than \$1.7 million below cost estimates. Plyler is also currently working on the new Industrial Technology Center, located next to the current Career Technology Center.

Regents also approved the renewal of the food service contract with Great Western Dining, who has been the sole provider of food service on the Gainesville campus since 1994. The contract includes a 3% increase for the

2015-16 contract term. Admission Department meal rate for prospective students will increase by 25 cents, catering prices will increase by 2.5%, and snack bar prices will increase by 3%.

The Board then approved the renewal of Administrative and Professional contracts. They also approved the employment of Rebecca Fonte as Controller, Jacob

with the dilemma of what to do about needed street repairs without going over budget. There is only \$150,000 remaining in the City's budget this year for street paving and repairs. That is about \$50,000 short of what they estimate minimal paving and street repairs would cost. Paving costs, according to paving contractor Jack Bolen, are about the same as last year.

Last year, the City spent \$205,000 on paving, \$30,000 of which was spent on patching streets that had had water leaks.

Endres said that the City will have to decide how much, if any, paving to do. He added that a Certificate of Deposit (CD) will have to be cashed in since the City purchased land for the new Fire Department/City Hall. There is a CD for \$115,000 and after the \$75,000 for the land purchase is repaid to the General Fund, the rest could go towards the remainder of the cost of paving.

Ninth Street around Muenster ISD has been slated for paving. Cooke County Precinct #4 has said it will help with that and this will help with the cost of the project.

Endres cited Seventh Street as being in need of repaving. Alderman Jewel Otto added that Sixth Street was also in bad shape.

Alderman Tim Felderhoff noted, "Your streets are going to just keep getting worse." He favored using the remaining money from the CD to help fund the paving project.

Endres said that in front of the Hospital on Maple Street, there is a lot of what

is referred to as alligatoring. The street is buckling up where the hot mix was laid down.

Leo Lutkenhaus added, "It's everywhere. We've got one here at Fischer's. It developed on the back side of Fischer's and on Second Street. A big area just fell apart this last couple of weeks. You are going to have to stop some of these alligators. They just won't quit. They keep going."

Alderman Jack Flusche stated, "Overall, we've got pretty good streets."

More discussion followed before a vote was taken. The Council voted to get proposals based on spending up to \$200,000.

The Council was informed that the City's hand-held water meter reading device was not repairable. The City's software company recommended purchasing an Android tablet for about \$200 so that the uRead Mobile Meter Reading application could be placed on it. This would enable the City crews to take electronic water meter readings. The readings would then be downloaded onto the City computer. There would be a one-time installation charge of \$500. A trainer would come from Houston to instruct the City secretary and crew on the use of the devices. The City would be responsible for paying airfare, motel, and meals, and there would probably be an additional \$50 added to the City's cell phone bill.

City Secretary Katrinka Bartush has been entering the information manually into the computer and it takes her only about 45 minutes. The City crews feel

it takes them less time to read the meters and write the numbers on paper than it did to use the reader.

It was decided since all was working with the manual input and that the cost may go down in the future, the City would keep operating as is. No action was taken.

Muenster Fire Chief Bert Walterscheid reported that during April and up to May 4, the Fire Department had responded to three structure fires using 110 man hours; two medical assists with 11 hours; two fire alarms going off using 16 hours of investigation; two public assists - the Bike Rally and when high water came through - using 17 hours on both of those; and one hay fire with 17 hours. That was a total of 250 hours on 10 calls for the month.

During his projects and activities report, Administrator Endres informed the Council that the driver for Progressive Waste Solutions said he would be training in Wichita Falls on the new truck that will be used here when Progressive starts picking up carts instead of bags.

Some of the City's old or used equipment was auctioned off. The equipment and price it brought were: generator, \$2,650; two 1989 pickups - one confiscated by the Police Department on a drug arrest and the other the City's, \$1,000 and \$1,100; packer, \$400.

In other business at the May 4 meeting, the City Council:

- Approved payment of bills totaling \$121,933.91.
- Heard update on Police Department by Officer Laura Brackeen.

are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs.

Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines - flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash - pose potential safety and health hazards.

Last April, Americans turned in 390 tons (over 780,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at nearly 6,100 sites operated by the DEA (Drug Enforcement Administration) and more than 4,400 of its state and local law enforcement partners. When those results are combined with what was collected in its eight previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in over 4.1 million pounds - more than 2,100 tons - of pills.

DEA began hosting National Prescription Drug Take-Back events four years ago because at that time the Controlled Substances Act made no legal provision for patients to rid themselves of unwanted controlled substance prescription drugs except to give them to law enforcement; it banned pharmacies and hospitals from accepting them. Most people flushed their unused prescription drugs down the toilet, threw them in the trash, or kept them in the household medicine cabinet, resulting in contamination of the water supply and the theft and abuse of the prescription drugs.

DEA suspended the program in November 2014 and now assists law enforcement and other certified agencies in conducting their own events.

**Session Update**

Last week, HB 31 and HB 32 by Rep. Dennis Bonnen (R-Angelton), two bills I co-authored, were heard and passed through the House. What this means is the largest tax cut in history will provide relief to every person and business in HD 68.

The plan calls for a reduction of the sales tax from 6.25% to 5.95% and a 25% cut in the franchise tax for every business. This plan: (1) provides \$4.9 billion reduction on the sales tax and business franchise tax; (2) provides a permanent tax cut (3) provides relief for every person and business in HD 68.

**84th Session Bills Update**

Session has entered the final stages. Bills are moving out of committee and getting stuck before reaching the house floor. Regardless, several of my bills are heading to the house floor. Please take a look below regarding the upcoming bills:

**HB239 Fuel Tanks**

This bill updates current Texas law to allow small, rural cities more capacity to maintain above ground fuel tanks. The bill increases business while maintaining national safety standards.

**HB293 Joseph Marshall Evans Memorial Highway**  
The bill names a portion of State Highway 16 as the Joseph Marshall Evans Game Warden Memorial Highway who passed in the line of duty.

**HB2812 Dual Credit**

The bill allows students to save money on college by removing the limit of dual credit courses a student can take outside of his junior college service area.

**HB1905 Airline Tax**

I have worked with the Texas Comptroller to eliminate unnecessary and outdated taxes that are burdensome to Texas travelers who fly.

**HB1269 TCEQ Penalties**

The bill allows small, rural municipalities and counties a chance to fix problems found by the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality instead of issuing fines for the sake of fining.

**HB 544 CHL TSA**

The bill allows responsible concealed carry holders to return firearms back to safekeeping in cases of forgetfulness at the airport. This increases the rights of responsible gun owners and adds common sense to the gun laws governing airports.

resident is required to sign a contract agreeing to abide by rules and regulations of the house which includes participation in a 12-step recovery program and being responsible for themselves with everyday activities such as housekeeping and meal preparation. These men pay rent, work or are actively seeking employment, learn money-management skills, and work to understand past actions and how those actions have affected the resident's life both positively and negatively.

According to Kelly Fiore-Watson, Board member, "Addiction is a disease. I am not a doctor, scientist, not even a recovering alcoholic. Unfortunately, my life has been affected by drug addiction and alcoholism through my father, stepmother, my son, and my brother who passed away from a drug overdose in 2011 at the age of 38. The sober living house was named

in honor of my brother's lost battle with addiction and for all of the men who struggle every day learning to cope with life without alcohol and drug addiction. Many times we wish a person struggling with addiction would just 'STOP.' Unfortunately, it is not that easy for many. Living in a sober living house is the perfect place for restarting a sober life."

It is the hope of the residents and Board of Directors that the community and local merchants will have compassion, understanding, and acceptance of their mission. These men are truly grateful and appreciative of this chance, not to just live in a house, but to give back to others in need.

# Exam tables approved for Clinic

Muenster Hospital District's Board of Directors met on Tuesday, April 21. They were asked to consider the purchase of four new exam tables for the Rural Health Clinic. The current tables are very old and have torn areas that have been patched over.

The cost would be \$1,517.40 each for a total of \$6,069.60.

The Board agreed it was a good price and unanimously approved the purchase.

Reviewing the statement of revenues, Administrator Michael Kent reported a loss for the month of March of \$203,000 for the Hospital District in total. The Hospital, Clinic, and Home Health all experienced losses for the month. The Retail Pharmacy showed a profit of \$19,000.

Reviewing the financial numbers, Board Secretary John Aytes stated, "Our total cash on hand when we take into consideration the CDs at almost \$900,000, we're at a little over \$2.5 million at the end of last month. That's pretty good to start off the rest of this year until we collect taxes. But then when we look at our earning statement again, the fact that our total loss to-date is almost \$1.5 million. We still have April, May, and June to finish off the year. We are using up our cash. A turn around situation is absolutely crucial."

Following an executive session, the Board voted to approve the Interview Com-

mittee to finalize negotiations and sign contract with Dr. Graves. Members appointed to that committee are Board President Ronnie Weinzapfel, Kenny Klement, Aytes, and Mary Del Olmo.

CNO Diane Neu said that nursing students from NCTC continue to work at MMH. The fourth semester students have completed their time there and first semester students have an additional week.

During March, there were two surgeries, one patient in Cardiac Rehab, and four patients in Wound Care. There were 119 ER visits and the average daily census for March was 9.61.

Marketing Director Gayla Blanton said they are focused on the May 9 Health Fair. "We are really pleased with the reception from the outside community," remarked Blanton. "We have a lot of people coming in." She said there will be stations lo-

cated inside the Rehab Center branching out into the main hallways, and outside.

Included are a number of public service groups, several screenings outside the tests being offered at special prices for the Health Fair. These include blood pressure checks, vision screenings, skin cancer checks, and more.

Administrator Kent reminded the Board that the MMH Auxiliary is holding its 3rd annual Party on the Patio on May 7 and Board members were asked to help grill if possible. Kent said the Auxiliary has just donated \$1,000 toward the purchase of a new ER stretcher.

In other business conducted the Board:

- Approved bad debt write offs totaling \$56,933.06. It was noted that \$39,759 was 43 self-pay ER patients.

- Approved Courtesy Staff credentialing for radiologist David Bass, M.D.

"Prescription drugs should never be flushed down a toilet or thrown in the trash," said Chief of Police Tom Barr. "And leaving them in your medicine cabinet can result in injury to yourself or to others - especially children - in your family."

Local ladies will have an opportunity to sign up for free mammography services through Moncrief Cancer Center/UT Southwestern Medical Center. The first screening is scheduled for May 26 and spaces will go quickly. The free program is directed at women without insurance, however those with insurance who would like to have the procedure done locally can also schedule appointments through the program.

Other participants in the Saturday event include: Abigail's Arms, CASA, Home Hospice of Cooke County, Cooke County United Way,

and My Brother's House.

Blood pressure checks and information on emergency medical response will be provided by MMH Home Care, with diabetes education from Joan Walterscheid. Upper body skin cancer screenings are being performed by Tami Dobbs of The Dermatology and Skin Cancer Surgery Center, and vision checks will be provided by York Eye Associates.

Safety information and up-close looks at cool vehicles will be a possibility through CareFlite helicopter, Cooke County EMS, Cooke County Sheriff's Office, and Muenster Fire Department.

All law enforcement, fire, and medical vehicles, along with a bounce house and slide for the kids, will be located on the parking lot immediately south of the main hospital building, weather permitting.

Also participating in the health fair will be Texas Department of State Health Services, "Be The Match" Bone Marrow Registry and the NTMC Sleep Wellness Center.

"We will also have the Area Health Education Center here to provide information on health careers," stated Gayla Blanton, MMH Director of Marketing. "It is going to be a big event with a broad range of fun exhibits."

Also scheduled as part of the Fair is a blood drive

with Texoma Regional Blood Center from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. The mobile unit will be parked on the south lot.

"Blood is always needed," reminded Blanton.

Attendees planning to have bloodwork done need to remember to fast. Refreshments will be available following testing.

And, as another reminder, Blanton stated that no one would be allowed into the testing area before 8 a.m. "Please enter at the front entrance off Maple Street to register. To be fair and accommodate all, doors will not open to the MMH Rehabilitation Center, where testing will take place, until 8 a.m."

Tours of the Rehab Center and demonstrations of various therapies will be ongoing.

The Fair will take place - rain or shine - with outside displays moving inside or under cover in the event of rain.

The victory advances Sacred Heart to the State Semifinals in Waco.

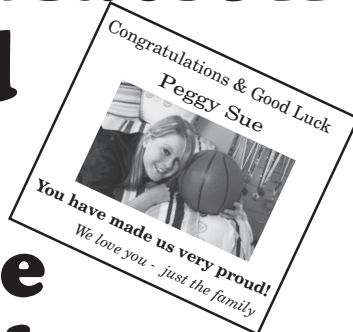


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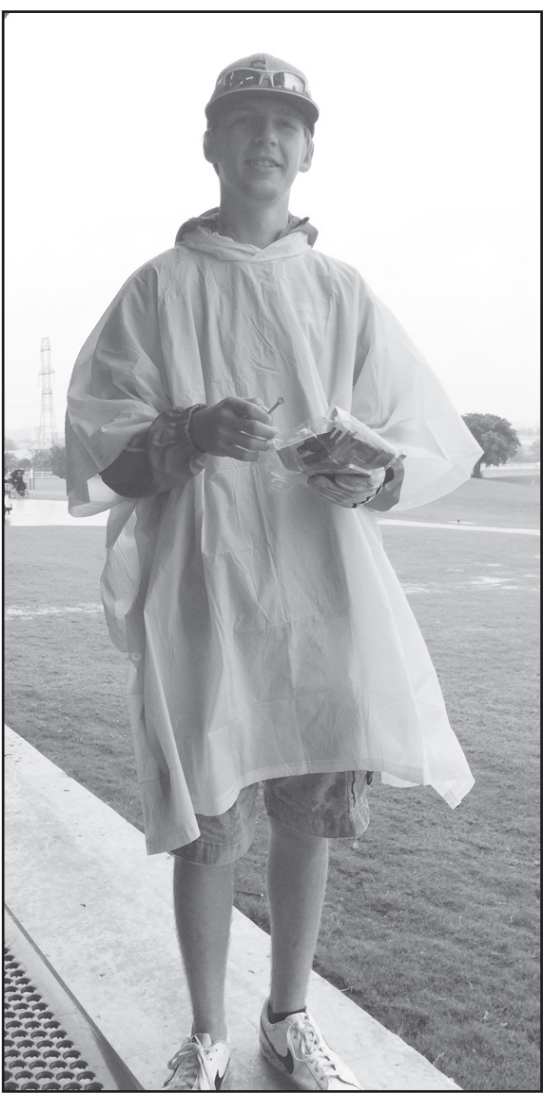
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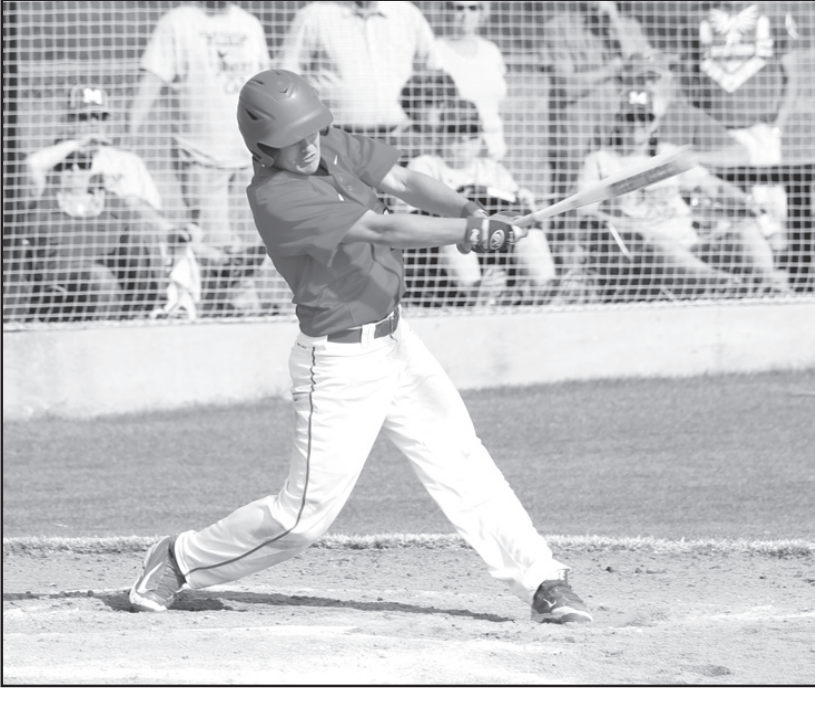

# 97% of U.S. farms are family-owned

## AFBF asked Congress to pass bill blocking EPA's WOTUS rule

The American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF) asked Congress to pass legislation ordering the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to withdraw the controversial "Waters of the United States" (WOTUS) proposal.

In a letter copied to all members of Congress, AFBF President Bob Stallman

wrote that the Regulatory Integrity Protection Act of 2015 represents an opportunity for Congress to take "the first important step toward resolving this issue fairly." The bill was approved this week by the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, chaired by Rep. Bill Shuster (R-Pa.)

If the legislation does not pass and EPA moves forward

with a final rule, the likeliest result would be landowners "being forced to engage in expensive litigation to protect their rights."

"Our members overwhelmingly oppose this rule. It is a bad rule for farmers. There is no question about that. Anyone who alleges the opposite either misunderstands the rule or misunderstands farming," Stallman wrote.

USDA news release.

Key highlights from the report include the following five facts about U.S. family farms:

1. Food equals family—97% of the 2.1 million farms in the United States are family-owned operations.
2. Small business matters—88% of all U.S. farms are small family farms.
3. Local connections come in small packages—58% of all

direct farm sales to consumers come from small family farms.

4. Big business matters, too—64% of all vegetable sales and 66% of all dairy sales come from the 3% of farms that are large or very large family farms.

5. Farming provides new beginnings—18% of principal operators on family farms in the U.S. started within the last 10 years.

## Global 2015 beef exports projected to set record

Global 2015 beef exports will reach a record 10.2 million tons, according to the latest Livestock and Poultry World Markets and Trade report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

According to *Drovers Cattle Network*, the global beef exports estimate is up 3% from the last report issued in October 2014. U.S. beef production is up 2% from the October report to 11.1 million tons. This is primarily based on heavier cattle weights. U.S. beef exports are revised 5% lower to 1.1 million tons due to a stronger dollar.

In breaking out exports by country, the report shows India increasing its lead over Brazil as the world's largest exporter of beef. Much of India's beef production and exports come from Buffalo, rather than cattle. Australia is the third largest beef exporter, followed by the United States.

## Pecans lack visibility in the marketplace

Pecans have an image problem. They have a lack of visibility, unlike the massive marketed almonds, pistachios, and walnuts.

It's not about flavor, nutrition, or plate appeal. In terms of flavor and nutritional quality, pecans rank highly, according to *Southeast Farm Press*.

"In 1963, the pecan crop was 365 million pounds worldwide. Last year, it was 273 million. In comparison, almonds produced 162 million pounds back then and now produce 2 billion. Pecan growers are getting their tails kicked in the marketplace. I'd like to see that change," said Mike Adams, owner of Royalty Pecan Farms in Caldwell.

Adams is president of the American Pecan Board, a self-supported group of growers, shellers, and accumulators that represents all 15 states that grow pecans.

"A comprehensive marketing strategy will increase the demand," Adams said. "There will be more consumers eating our products, and the biggest increase will come in our domestic market. Our competition has full-time professional staffs that look out for their interests every day. The pecan industry has no one to look out for us. This puts us at a big disadvantage. The time is now to take control of our future."



## USDA explains current avian flu outbreaks

Dr. John Clifford, with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Chief Veterinary Office, recently held a press call to help explain important information about the avian influenza event currently occurring in the U.S.

Since December 2014, USDA has confirmed cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) H5 in the Pacific, Central, and Mississippi flyways (migratory paths for birds). The disease has been found in wild birds, as well as in some backyard and commercial poultry flocks.

There are three important things to know about this situation:

1. Our food supply is safe. Food is safe because the U.S. has the strongest AI surveillance system in the world
2. The risk to humans is low. No human infections with these viruses have been detected, and the CDC considers the risk to people from these HPAI H5 infections in wild birds, backyard flocks,

and commercial poultry to be low.

3. USDA will continue to do everything it can to support states and producers. USDA is coordinating closely with state officials and other federal departments on rigorous surveillance, reporting, and control efforts.

All bird owners, whether commercial producers or backyard enthusiasts, should prevent contact between their birds and wild birds and report sick birds or unusual bird deaths to state/federal officials, either through their state veterinarian or through USDA's toll-free number at 1-866-536-7593.

## SHCS 3rd and 4th graders visit Circle N Dairy, attend Farm City Day

Sacred Heart Catholic School third and fourth grade students toured the Circle N Dairy to learn the science of dairy farming. Michelle Neu, owner, explained the importance of the cows receiving a properly balanced diet in order to produce good quality milk. She showed the children the silo. Then she grabbed some freshly prepared silage and explained how the silage is regularly tested for nutritional value.

Next, the children were shown the controlled temperature barn where the cows can relax and where they are fed their special diet. She demonstrated the method used to quickly clean the barn and explained how water is used and recycled in many areas

except the milking barn where only clean fresh water is allowed.

Then the children took a tour of the milking barn where Neu showed them the entire automatic milking system and how every piece of equipment is cleaned and inspected regularly.

However, the activity the children most enjoyed was petting and feeding the baby calves. All the students were divided into groups where they took turns bottle feeding the calves.

Last, the children enjoyed a cold bottle of white or chocolate milk as a treat before they left for lunch and playtime at the Lindsay City Park.

Soon after lunch the children headed to the NCTC Equine Center where the

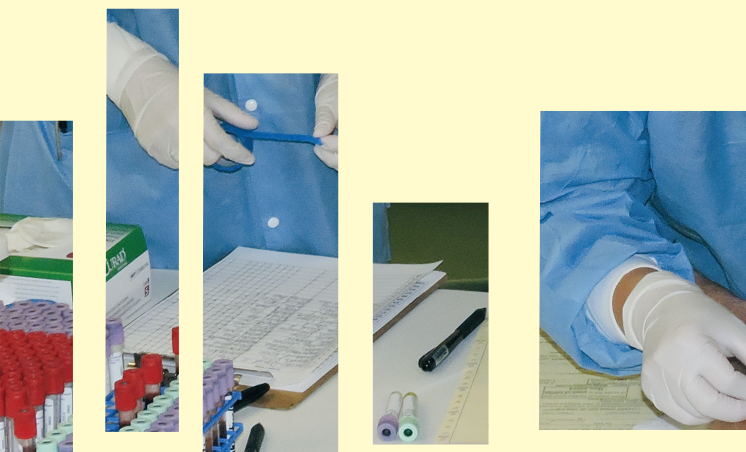
