WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(P)—Senate finance committee Democrats were ready today to go forward with consideration of amended tariff bills. The republican tariff bill in preparation for the bitter controversy that will move next Wednesday from the floor of public statements to the senate floor.

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Controversy Material

Many observers saw in the committee majority's version of the bill new material for a controversy and intensity. Complying with President Hoover's request for authority to reorganize the tariff commission, republican committee members retained the house proposal to enable him to appoint new members without waiting for the terms of those now serving to expire.

A cloudburst occurs when a large quantity of water vapor condenses suddenly instead of gradually. As soon as water vapor condenses gravity causes it to fall rapidly.

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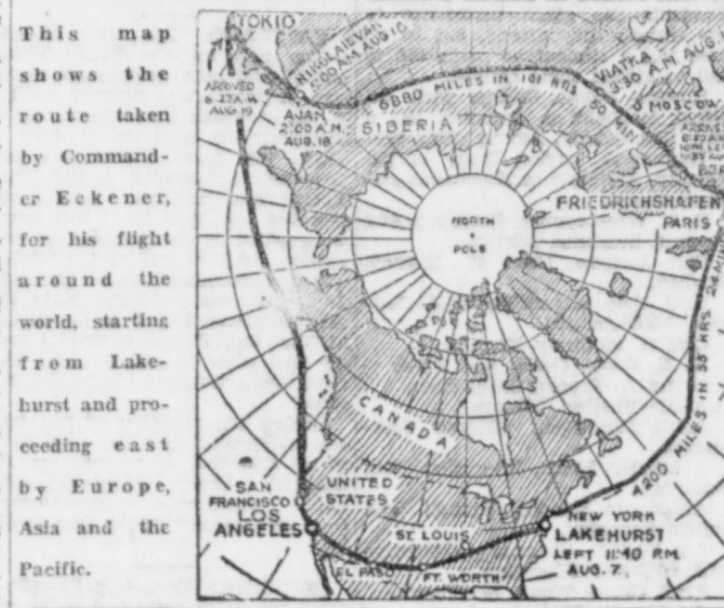

J. Woodward received today. The building has 10 classrooms, and will house grades 1 to 6, inclusive.

ATTENDANCE OF 300 EXPECTED AT TEACHERS' INSTITUTE HERE

All teachers employed in Brown county public schools will assemble at the Brownwood high school at 9:30 a. m. Monday, September 9 in teachers' institute to begin their work for the 1929-30 school term. Registration will begin at 8:30 a. m. In addition to the teachers employed in Brownwood and in other schools of Brown county, a large number of visiting teachers are expected to attend.

NEARLY 20,000 PEOPLE PAID ADMISSION TO FAIR THIS YEAR

Not only was the 1929 season of the Brown County Fair the biggest in point of paid admissions, nearly doubling the largest year prior to this, but it was pronounced by all as the best fair ever held in the county. The number who paid admission to the grounds was slightly under an acre of 5,000 a day, the total for the four days being over 19,000. This brought the fair association at 25c each, about \$5,000.

BRADY SCHOOLS TO OPEN SOON

BRADY, Aug. 29.—(SP)—The Brady schools will open on schedule time this fall, according to members of the school board, who have set opening date for Monday, September 9th, although a shift of this date may be necessary for the high school department, since it is possible that the high school building will not be sufficiently completed by that date for the opening. However, the work on the main building is rapidly drawing to a close, and will be only a matter of time before the second floor will be finished. The class room now being refinished and painted, while plasterers are fast completing their work on the first floor. According to school heads, the three ward schools in Brady will begin on September 9th, regardless of the high school situation. Seats are now being reserved from the old high school building to the new building, while the former is being converted into a ward school. Now being installed with small children's desks.

Conditions in K. C. Reserve District Good

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 29.—(P)—Agricultural conditions greatly improved in the tenth Federal Reserve district rose to the highest level on record during July, a report of the bank here declares. Distributing of commodities were reported to have established a new high peak. Wholesale and retail trade was heavy for the mid-summer season with sales in dollars slightly above a year ago. Production of manufactures and minerals were said to have continued the record output of earlier months of the year.

LACK OF RAIN BAD EFFECT ON TEXAS CROPS

DALLAS, TEX., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Continued deficiency of rain in the Northern Texas, Southeastern Oklahoma and portions of Northern Louisiana has had an adverse effect on growing crops, the monthly federal reserve business review, released today, said.

"Frequent showers in the southern third of Texas, while beneficial to some crops, were detrimental to cotton," the report said. "On the other hand heavy rains recently in portions of Northwest and West Texas, the southern half of New Mexico and Southeastern Arizona, and scattered localities elsewhere, have brought about a considerable improvement of crops in those sections. More rain, however, is needed in some portions."

The review said that while the corn crop has improved in some sections, in others it has deteriorated because of the lack of moisture. This year's production was estimated at 86,796,000 bushels, 5,317,000 bushels greater than on July 1 and compared with an actual production of 99,192,000 bushels in 1928.

Despite an increased cotton acreage production probably will be less than a year ago. August 1st figures indicate production in the eleventh federal reserve district will reach 5,675,000 bales as compared with 5,946,000 bales in 1928.

Ranges and livestock in the district remained in good condition although some sections and many localities suffered from dry weather. Grass is beginning to burn in some areas and stock water is being depleted.

The cattle market, after showing some strength during the first week of July, reflected an almost steady decline to the middle of August, nearly all classes sharing in the decline.

26,000 Acre New Mexico Ranch Sold. FORT WORTH, Tex., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Sale of the 26,000 acre ranch of Tom B. Owens of Ft. Worth and New York City, situated west of Tucuman, in Quay county, New Mexico, has been made to Wiley Blair and A. C. Adkins of Dallas. Consideration was not announced. The sale was made about a month ago.

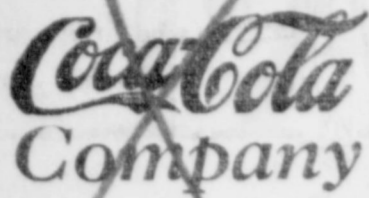
