

Do you know that an acre of Bermuda grass roots can be planted for only 13 cents?

It's a fact. And soil conservation technicians of the Muenster work unit give the figures.

The cost of planting Bermuda grass to prevent soil and water losses on the farm is way down this year. In spite of Sputnicks, Missles and the cost of living soaring into the wild blue yonder, the expense involved in sodding a waterway strip or a pasture to grass is actually less

than ever this year. Here's why. Through the 1958 Agricultural Conservation Program the Federal Government will share with farmers and ranchers the cost of carrying out approved soil and water conservation practices in accord-

In Cooke county the payment rates for the planting of Bermuda grass roots are as follows: Seedbed preparation, \$2.60 per acre; sodding operations 87 cents; 15 cubic feet of grass roots, \$2.10 per acre; fertilizer, \$3.40 per acre for a total payment of \$8.97 an dcre.

According to the local Soil Conservation Service personnel the cost of sodding an acre to grass roots at current prices will be as follows: Sodding opera-tions with sprigging machine rented from the District, \$1.50 per acre, 15 cubic feet of grass roots, \$2.25 and 100 pounds of 20-20-0 fertilizer, \$5.35 or a total outlay of \$9.10 per acre.

The total cost is shown as \$9.10 and the ACP cost-share is \$8.97 leaving the cost of planting each acre to Bermuda grass at only 13 cents per acre. It's a real missle age bargain.

The cost of planting the improved hybrid Bermuda grass is also very reasonable this year. Many landowners cooperating with the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District to protect and improve their soils prefer the faster growing, higher producing Coastal and Midland Bermuda. Under the ACP cost-sharing program this year these grasses can be planted for as little as \$2 an acre cost to the landowner.

If waterways or improved pastures are needed on your land, make plans now to get these and other grasses planted as soon as possible. The ACP cost-share payments are available on grasses and legumes and the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service is available to all landowners cooperating with the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District.


