



Roberts Announces Alvord Clobbers of MHS in Openers of For Re-Election As State Senator



Ray Roberts, State Senator as a possible candidate for high

Roberts lives in McKinney and is an automobile dealer with farming interests. He is best known for his work as a member of the Texas Water Resources Committee, which planned most of the water legislation for the 55th legislative session and the special sessions. He was the joint sponsor of 19 water measures proposed by the committee and served as Vice Chairman of the Senate Committee on Water and Conservation. He has been concerned with maintaining the water rights of agricultural interests and of small towns. One of his proposals Corpus Christi they visited Mr. irrigation.

Roberts is active in Naval Reserve activities and will make his formal announcement after he returns from a cruise with the Navy in February.

Roberts has also been active in teacher and school legislation and was selected at the end of his first legislative session as the senator who contributed most to

the vocational teaching program. During the 55th legislative session Senator Roberts was one of the busiest members of the senate. In addition to being chairman of the military and veterans affairs committee, he was also vice chairman of the powerful water and conservation committee, vice chairman of the state departments and institutions committee, member of the finance committee and one of the five senators appointed to the finance sub-committee and to the conference committee which passed on all state appropriations, and he also served on

several minor committees. Roberts was a strong advocate of lobby control measures. He believes that no person should be allowed to practice before state agencies while a member of the legislature. He has been extremely critical of some lawyer legislators who accept large retainer fees from firms having problems with the state.


