

An effort to deprive Republican party members of Texas of their vote in local and state politics was apparent in a publicity release sent out last week by the Democrats of Texas, the ultra liberal faction of the Democratic organization in this

The article complains that "far too long the Republicans have exercised control of the Texas electorate by unrestrained infiltration into Democratic councils and elections." The remedy for this situation, as proposed by DOT, is to keep out of the Democratic primaries all who intend to vote Republican in the general election.

All of which is nothing less than an attempt to enforce that controversial pledge which appears on the primary ballot. In effect that pledge says that a person cannot participate in county and state government unless he agress to support the party's nominee in the general

The unfairness of this demand is evident to anyone who considers the importance of the primary in Texas. Actually it is the general election of state and local officers. Almost invariably it decides who will hold office for the next term. To rule that a person cannot vote in the contest is to deprive him of his most sacred right as a citizen.

Regardless of all the DOT's pleas for party loyalty, the simple fact remains that the average individual feels he has a right to vote as he pleases. Democrat or Republican, he is a citizen first of all and, since the primary will determine the final winner, he is entitled to a part in it.





'Hot' Netting Wire Contact Kills Son Of Rufus Bezners

Tragedy struck the home of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Bezner at Lindsay Tuesday morning when their 7 year old son, Jeffrey, was electrocuted as he came in contact with chicken netting at poultry house on his father's

According to a report by Fred Lynn, TP&L manager, the netting was energized by a faulty electrical outlet inside the building. Wet ground caused by the previous day's rain is conceded to have intensified the hazard of the hot wire.

The child apparently was in contact with the netting for several minutes before Albert Hoelker cleared him with a sweep-ing lunge of his hand. Hoelker and Bomar Woods then rushed him to Gainesville Sanitarium. He died shortly after arrival at the hospital.

Other Crops Fine As Shower Follows Good Grain Harvest

Farmers of this area continue to get their best breaks in many a year. A dandy shower Monday afternoon, measuring 1.44 inches, came just in time to revive row crops, alfalfa and pasture but caused little if any damage to the season's exceptionally good grain crop.

The rain was badly needed, and this vicinity could have used considerably more than it received. During the 30 preceding days rainfall here amounted to only 1.63 inches and huge cracks had formed in the land. As a result of the shower the

local farm picture is generally regarded as good. Grass is doing well, alfalfa is set for another cutting and corn seems assured for at least a silage crop. Whether there will be more grass and alfalfa and a matured corn crop depends upon weather of the next few weeks.

As regards grain crops, only 10 to 20 percent is still in the field and the damage to that, if any, remains to be seen. Some loss may have been sustained as grain was beaten down by the wind and driving rain, however it's generally believed that most of it can be picked up. With clear weather prevailing again, it seems that loss of time will not be a problem.

Even if such trouble should develop the crop can be marked up as a dandy. Wheat yields of
