### How to Test For Termites

Think you've got termites? They can exist in a house unsuspected for long periods. But, according to the editors of CHANGING TIMES, there are three ways to find out if they've infested your dwelling.

1. You can tell whether a beam or a sill is infested by tapping it with a hammer and listening for a hollow sound or by probing it with an ice pick or knife blade.

2. You can search the house, particularly in crawl spaces, around foundations and at utility service entrances, for the telltale tubes, a quarter to a half inch wide, that they build.

3. You can be on the watch for the swarms and wing droppings that may occur soon.

Sometimes homeowners see swarming insects but are not sure whether they are seeing termites or flying ants. If the insects have pinched waists and transparent wings, the front set being much larger than the back set, they are really ants.
