96 Per Cent Vote Members of the Third Order of St. Francis of Sacred Heart OKs Legal Sale of Alcoholic Drinks

Citizens of Muenster in their special local option election last Saturday voted almost unanimously to allow the legalized sale of alcoholic beverages in the city

Their vote of 352-14 represents not only the most one-sided decision ever polled in a local city election but also the largest turnout in the city's history. Up to now the record number of votes was that of the 1953 race for mayor, in which the total reached

The election ends a drought which has existed here ever since Cooke County voted dry by a majority of only 2 votes in 1936. Muenster polled a large wet majority at that time and again in 1939 in an unsuccessful attempt to end prohibition in the

Up to now the condition in Muenster was controlled by the vote of the county. Now, in accordance with the state supreme court's new interpretation of an old law, the city is permitted for the first time to determine its own condition. Only residents vote in the election.

As this paper goes to press serving the last legal technicality wet. Law requires that results must be canvassed and certified by the commissioners 5 days after duction the company will accept the election. After that, if the election is found in order, the new status becomes effective in 30 days.

County Judge Shelby Fletcher said that the Liquor Control Board interprets the law as requiring the 30 day waiting period but county officials do not agree. He explained that the time is allowed for an area to get rid of intoxicants after voting itself from wet to dry but does not specify a time limit when voting from dry to wet.

Actually, he added, that detail makes no difference because of the delay involved in starting a business. Other requirements will probably take up 30 days or more.

A person wishing to sell must first apply to the county clerk for a license. Then his application must be published twice in the local paper. That's so the public can be advised of the person location and business concerned, and object if there is reason for doing so. The application is investigated by city and county authorities and the Liquor Control Board before the license is finally issued. In addition there is the delay of preparing a location and stocking it with merch-
