

Christmas is traditionally the time for gifts. If Our Lord does not answer your prayer just exactly to your request, then you must trust Him to know what is best for your eternal welfare. Physical health and soundness are wonderful gifts, and not to be reckoned lightly. One may and should pray for them. But sometimes it is necessary for one's spiritual health that there be a certain amount of physical illness and suffering. After all, Our Lord Himself said: "If anyone will come after me, let him take up his cross and follow me." Christ Himself set the example of patient suffering, even in the circumstances of His birth. And Mary and oseph suffered too, from the filth and the rudeness and the cold which they had to put up with at Bethlehem. But they accepted the fact that in the mysterious designs of God's providence, these sufferings were permitted as part of the price for the world's redemption.

If, then, it is your lot to suffer poor health or disability, by all-means pray for relief. But let it always be with the submission of your will to His Who knows best: "O God, you know what is best for me. I want above all to save my soul and help save other souls. If this cross is necessary for that end, I ask ONLY patience and strength to bear it well."

If you offer this kind of gift to the Christ Child at Christmas, you may be sure, that some special gift of Grace will be delivered by a good angel to the door of your heart this Christmas. And it is this kind of gift coming from heaven that alone can make your Christmas truly a happy one.

What then are some of the ways to increase moisture intake and prevent runoff water from eroding away valuable topsoil? A good cover, either living or dead, is necessary to cushion the beating raindrops. This cover is especially important during seasons of heaviest rainfall.

The soil should be in good crumbly condition so as to allow it to soak up the water. The organic matter level In DHIA Production should be maintained to prevent puddling and crusting of the soil surface, therefore encouraging more water intake. This can be accomplished by went to Peter Prescher's growing either legumes or high residue crops and returning the residues to the soil.

Deep rooted legumes such as alfalfa, sweetclover or guar should be grown, in rotation with other crops to help open up tight and compacted subsoils. It is very important to remember that just one cultivation on wet ground will pack the soil and destroy the work of several years of deep rooted legumes. These compacted layers in the soil slows both crop root and moisture penetration. It is sometimes necessary to use both deep plowing and the use of deep rooted top individual milk producer legumes and grasses to help open up badly compacted

If the soil is saturated or if the soil can't coak up the water fast enough, runoff occurs. The steeper the slope of the land the more treatment must be given to prevent erosion. Good Crops, New Industry, Wet Vote, Doctor's Death Dominate 1959 Headlines

1959 has been an eventful year at Muenster, including continued city and community progress, but also a set-back in medical facilities and service.

The biggest shock of the year was the sudden death of Dr. T. S. Myrick. After years of caring for its physical ailments and of leading in its civic affairs, he left the community with a feeling of helplessness. Efforts to find a successor have been futile so far. Meanwhile people are gradually becoming adjusted to their loss.

There were other losses, too. The usual number of cherished friends, including old timers whose record of service is gratefully remembered, have passed on. Meanwhile new friends moved in, more children were born. Muenster continued to grow and prosper.

Crops were good though not exceptional. A drought through the early months retarded oats but allowed wheat to come through with a fine yield. A steady beef market also brought welcome income to the farmers.

Those conditions along with increased oil production from water flooding gave the community a good income, as reflected by an increase of about 25 per cent in local bank deposits.

Other factors were a growth in business volume, resulting partly from the new dress factory and sale of alcoholic beverages. Muenster voted itself wet after the State Supreme Court ruled that a wet precinct or city is legally permissible in a dry county.

A loss that was felt sentimentally more than economically is the suspension of passenger train service through the city. Katy discontinued its passenger train leaving Muenster without that service for the first time in its history.

Municipal progress is noted in the purchase of a fire truck, establishing a city library, and continued curb and pavement work. Six blocks of Hickory got the complete job and a project is started for as many blocks on Walnut. Besides, several blocks of other streets were improved.

While still a young man, the tide of popular opinion turned against Him . . . His friends ran away. One of them denied Him. He was turned over to His enemies. He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. His executioners gambled for the only piece of property He had on earth while He was dying -- and that was his coat. When He was dead He was taken down and laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.

Nineteen wide centuries have come and gone and today He is the centerpiece of the human race and the leader of the column of progress.

It is far within the mark when it is said that all the armies that ever marched, and all the navies that were ever built, and all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, put together have not affected the life of man upon this earth as powerfully as has that One solitary life.
