Dinner Meeting Set to Organize Men's Civic Club

A program that deserves widespread local support is the current effort to establish a men's civic organization working for the welfare of Muenster and its surrounding area. Without such a group it is impossible for our community on any other to acquire the coordination and enthusiasm needed for worth while accomplishment.

We realize of course that much can be done for the public welfare through the isolated efforts of individuals. The person who establishes a service or business does something toward the welfare of his area. But some projects are too big for individuals to handle. Others are overlooked because everybody's business is nobody's business. Those are the projects which require the unity of purpose and the cooperation that are possible only through organization.

A convenient example is before us at this very time. Most of us would like to see some expression of community pride in our Christmas decorating program. Perhaps a contest to inspire special efforts. Perhaps a coordinated plan to emphasize a certain theme of the Christmas story. Perhaps some sort of community display. But nothing is being done about it because there is no organized civic group to take charge.

Indications now are that a far more important project looms as a community need. Since the death of Doctor Myrick a few public spirited citizens have assumed the task of seeking a doctor to succeed him. And they are finding that no one so far has shown an interest in settling in a town that has no hospital. It's beginning to seem that Muenster will not have a resident doctor unless it has a hospital.

Here's a circumstance that challenges us to get going on an idea that most of us have favored all along. We have been convinced that Muenster could benefit wonderfully from a well equipped and well staffed local hospital. But we did nothing about it because we were getting by on the limited service of one overworked man who had inadequate facilities for his serious cases. Now even that limited service is no longer available.

Necessity prompts us to give serious thought to this matter. Apparently we will not get to settle for half-way measures. The sign is that we will have to go all the way or continue being the medical orphans we are today. We are faced with providing a hospital, after which we can get a staff of doctors . . . in other words, more complete medical service than ever before, or none at all.

Plainly a project like this is not one for individuals to take on. It requires lots of work and enthusiasm. It can be undertaken only by a group of men working together for community welfare and striving for community wide support.

This isn't saying that Thursday night's organizational meeting will launch a hospital project, nor any other specific project. But it is intended to form a civic group willing and able to tackle such projects . . . a group with the civic spirit and pride to plan and work for a better Muenster. Anyone willing to help toward that cause will be warmly welcomed.

Very likely to be contested in the state's courts is that provision of the new insurance law stating that a person's insurance rate can be penalized for his traffic violations during the past three years.

The law has a double purpose. To encourage safe driving by giving a reduced rate to persons with a good driving record and also to shift the greater insurance burden on the persons who are causing the insurance losses. From that standpoint the law seems both fair and practical.

But in assessing penalties to violations committed before the law was passed it appears to be in conflict with old time standards of justice . . . that a person cannot be charged with violating a law before it was passed. For instance, if a law is passed tomorrow setting a speed limit of 30 miles per hour on a certain street, a driver cannot be charged with exceeding (Continued on page 8)

A civic organization to function somewhat like a chamber of commerce is the objective of a dinner meeting to be held Thursday night in Rohmer's Restaurant.

2 Package Stores Begin Operation, 2 More Due Soon

Two more new business firms, both liquor stores, were established here during the past week. This gives Muenster three package stores in operation and two more due to start soon.

C.J. Kaiser and Tony Koessler are co-owners of K Cut Rate Liquors, which was opened last Friday at the corner of Highway 82 and Hickory.

Loxley Cochran of Gainesville is owner of the City Liquor Store at 223 North Main, the location formerly occupied by Wiese Jewelry. He too opened his business last Friday.

Carl Walterscheid is the old timer in the local liquor trade. His 82 Liquors, one location east of the Magnolia Station on Highway 82, has been open since the last week of October.

Alvin "Red" Loerwald of Lindsay seems to be next in line to get established. He has the former Ace Cafe building on the Highway, remodeled and ready for stocking as soon as he receives his license.

A new building now under construction at the east city limit, north of the highway, should be ready for occupancy about the first of the year. J. B. Wilde is building it for eventual use as a used car office in connection with a Chevrolet Agency headquarters building on the adjoining location. Until the larger building is finished it will be leased as a package store. So far no one has applied for a license to operate it.

About forty candidates, including five from Muenster, will be admitted to the Knights of Columbus next Sunday at an initiation to be hosted by the Gainesville council. It will be a joint initiation for Districts 6 and 47, which used to be combined in one district. Councils represented are Muenster, Gainesville and Denton in District 47 and Denson, Sherman and Pilot Point in District 6.

Election Dec. 31 To Decide Fate of Clear Creek Dams

Taxpayers voters of the Clear Creek Watershed will go to the polls on December 31 to decide on a proposed 10 cent tax for the maintenance of flood control structures and other operating expenses.

The election was ordered last Saturday at a meeting of Clear Creek Watershed Authority directors in the Muenster State Bank.

As pointed out by President J. M. Weinzapfel this election is the key event which will decide whether projects sponsored by the Clear Creek Watershed Authority can be carried to completion. According to present policy, Soil Conservation Service will not begin construction on a flood control reservoir until the area concerned has provided a fund for its future maintenance. This means that some 52 reservoirs now planned depend on the election of Dec. 31. If voters approve they will remove the last obstacle now holding back the program, which is estimated at about \$4.5 million.

Weinzapfel said that a similar election may soon become necessary on the Elm Creek Watershed in order to complete its program. When SCS started building reservoirs on that watershed it made no requirement for a maintenance fund. After building 27 SCS now requires that a fund must be provided before the remaining 10 still on plans can be built.

The Clear Creek Watershed election will be held in six voting boxes: at Rosston, Era, Hardy, Dye Mound Bolivar and Blue Mound.

To vote a person must be a qualified voter for the year 1959 and must also be a taxpayer.

MHS Cagers Drop Two Games at Era

Muenster High's basketball teams opened their season Tuesday night with a double loss at Era, the girls by a score of 39-35 and the boys 40-25.

In the curtain raiser Muenster girls started slow and trailed 17-11 at the half then gained 3 in each of the next two periods for a 33-33 tie at the end of the regular time. Each team scored 2 in the first overtime. During the next overtime Era got a field goal and Muenster fouled in a frantic effort to catch up, and Era added 2 foul shots in the closing seconds. Fisher led MHS scorers with 20, Hellman made 8 and Dern 7. Era's Smith took honors for the game with 27.

The boys' game was close for three quarters, then Era got hot and ran away with it. In the first period Era led 8-5 and at intermission it led 17-16. In the third Muenster edged ahead briefly but Era regained the lead 24-22 at the end of the period. Then the one-sided final period in which the home team poured in 16 while Muenster got only 3.

Scorers for Muenster were Harris 11, Joe Hellman 5, McElreath 4, Doug Hellman 3 and Mark Hellman 2. Lewis and Wilson made 15 and 14 for Era.

MHS will host Era Friday and play in the Callisburg tournament next week.

Election Set December 31 On Lindsay Incorporation

Whether or not Lindsay will become an incorporated town depends on an election to be held there on December 31.

The election was set by the County Commissioners Court last Monday in response to a petition presented by a Lindsay group. Twenty five persons had signed the petition, five more than the minimum required by law to qualify for the election.

Persons eligible to vote are those whose poll tax receipt qualifies them to vote this year and who have been residents of the area to be incorporated for the past six months or longer. That area includes 640 acres with a

population of 253 . . . the minimum legal requirement is 200 . . . extending from a line 600 feet north of Highway 82 to Elm creek south of town and also a mile west of a line extending south from Walter Nortman's east property line. That takes in the property on both sides of the highway for a mile west of the Gainesville golf course and all the area for a mile south of that portion of the highway.

If the election carries it will authorize Lindsay to proceed with the other legal details of incorporation. Besides applying for a charter from the State Secretary it will elect a town council and a marshal. The person receiving the most votes in the council election will become mayor and will be so commissioned by the county judge.

After incorporating as a town Lindsay can by action of its council and without another election, incorporate as a city.

The purpose of the election is to authorize establishment of a governing body empowered to function in behalf of the town's interests. It will be able to improve streets and water and sewer facilities and to collect taxes for support of the public program. It will also become a legal entity immune from annexation by some other city or town.

It will also qualify to hold a local option election on legalizing the sale of alcoholic beverages as provided in a recent decision of the Texas Supreme Court.

SH Nips Lindsay In Double Header

The Tigers and Tigerettes of Sacred Heart High made a clean sweep of their series with Lindsay as they took both games of a double header on the local court Tuesday night. Other wins in a two game program with Lindsay had been chalked up some 10 days before.

Both of Tuesday's tussles were comparatively easy for the local teams. Sacred Heart girls led off with a win of 31-15 and the boys followed with a win of 38-25.

After a 4-4 tie in the first quarter Sacred Heart girls had two strong periods for leads of 13-8 at intermission and 26-10 at the third quarter. In the final period they held their margin while coasting to a win of 31-15. Joyce Hacker was the big Tigerette scorer with 19 and Delores Hess led the visitors with 6.

Sacred Heart boys barely nudged ahead 6-5 in the opening quarter and spurred to a 20-8 lead at half time. In the third period the Knights gained a little for a score of 29-20 but the Tigers took over again in the last and ended with a 38-25 lead. Len Haverkamp and Wimmer hit 14 each for the Tigers and R. Haverkamp made 11 for Lindsay.

Next for Sacred Heart will be a series with Nocona, here Thursday night and there next Tuesday.

Lindsay will be in the Callisburg tournament next week, then will play Gainesville Junior High Dec. 14 and 17 and Valley View Dec. 22.

YARDSTICK OF NATIONAL WELL-BEING

There's a great deal of controversy over Russia's economic and scientific achievements. But one thing is sure — the Soviet leaders are masters of propaganda. The Russian people are deluged day and night with words designed to make them believe that communism does more for the masses than any other system. And Russian visitors to this

country, from Khrushchev down the line, take every conceivable opportunity to try to "sell" Russia's progress and superiority.

Well, no one can blame them for that — it's their job as dedicated communists. But when we get down to facts, the picture takes on a very different hue.

There's only one way to judge the material well-being

of a people — and that is by the yardstick of how much the average man's income will buy in the market place. With one month's wages, an American can buy 6½ suits and 24 pairs of shoes. With one month's wages, on the other hand, a Russian can buy half of a suit and a single pair of shoes. The situation is comparable in the case of most other consumer goods beyond the bare-necessity level.

In Russia, the government produces practically everything and practically everything is sold in government stores. Government decides all questions — what shall be produced and sold, of what quality, at what price. There is no competition.

In America, on the other hand, there's competition every inch of the way from the source of raw materials to the finished goods offered at retail. The producer or retailer who is able to offer the widest choice and best quality at least cost gets the trade. And that's one of the main reasons by the American worker, with his month's pay, can buy so many suits and shoes if he so desires — and the Soviet worker so few.

Mass merchandising methods, pioneered in the United States, give customers super services in foods and all manner of personal and home necessities not enjoyed elsewhere.

"Youth could well take for its creed today the Oath of Citizenship which the Youth of Athens took upon arriving at their majority.

"To bring no disgrace to this city by a dishonest act; to fight for the ideals and sacred things alone and with many; to desert no faltering comrade; to revere and obey the city laws; to incite respect and reverence in those above us who are prone to annul or set them at naught. To strive unceasingly to quicken the public sense of civic duty. To transmit this city no less but more beautiful that it was transmitted to us."

This law comes very close to presenting a similar situation. A penalty provided by law on or after January 1 is charged against a violation that happened before that date, actually as long as three years before. Will it be declared unconstitutional? Let's see.

To our way of thinking the penalty provided by this law should apply only to violations after January 1. As regards the insurance rate every

driver should be allowed to start with a clean record. Since, however, the undervalued credit to bad drivers would be unfair to insurance companies the new schedule of credits and penalties on rates should not become effective until a specified future date. There are complications about clearing the difficulty of course, but the provision still seems to be unconstitutional.

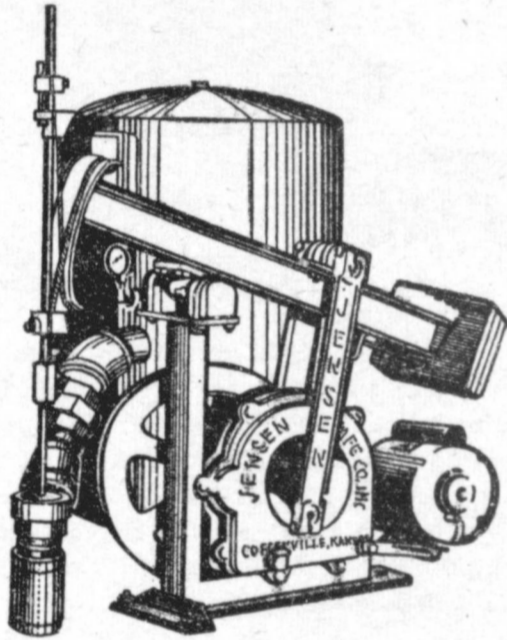
