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## ADVERTISING — TRULY WONDERFUL

We grow quite weary at times at the constant harping of the so-called "liberals," egg-heads and left-wingers against advertising.

At the present time they are hollering to high heaven about the fix which has come to light in some of the tele-

vision quiz programs. This, according to them, condemns advertising in toto. Because advertisers, sponsoring these programs, either wittingly or unwittingly, have violated the rules of sound, ethical advertising, that in the opinion of the "liberals" makes all advertising bad and every advertiser a crook. All are condemned for the sins of a few.

Without a doubt our enormous productivity, our great employment record, our high standards of living can be traced directly to the free climate which has permitted advertising. Advertising is the least costly and the most honest and direct means of bringing about universal distribution. What a wonderful thing it truly is."

## HEROS OF THE 50TH STATE

Americans have long been proud of the designation of their country as the "melting pot". Yet it took the global holocaust of World War II to make it completely that, to recognize and to honor the devotion of American born citizens of Japanese origin.

This is the theme of "Some Americans from Hawaii", from James A. Michener's newest book, "Hawaii" appearing in the December Reader's Digest. It is the story of one of a shipment of 1850 Japanese peasants brought to Hawaii in 1902 to work the sugar plantations, of Kamejiro Sakagawa's toil and suffering, his pride and courage, his triumphs and bitter reverses — and the proud American family he reared. But it is also the story of Col. Mark Whipple, a West Pointer who made soldiers instead of internees out of patriotic, young Hawaiian-born Japanese-Americans, who lead his all-Japanese "Purple Heart Battalion" to immortality at Montecassino and died with them in the bloody rescue of the Texan "Lost Battalion" trapped by the Germans in a Vosges mountain pocket.

"In 1946, during the victory parade down Kapiolani Boulevard in Honolulu," writes Mr. Michener, "Shigeo Sakagawa marched behind the flag bearers, his slanted eyes appraising this community in which they had not previously been welcome. But when he heard the thundering applause and saw from the corner of his eye his bent mother and his stocky, honest father, Americans at last, waving little American flags, he felt that the struggle had been a good one. . . . 'This is my town,' he thought as he marched. 'This is my country.'"

This is a story that needed to be written — and needs to be read by all Americans.

## NEW VISTA IN SURGERY

In our book, the heroes of the day are those anonymous doctors out in California who succeeded in putting back on the leg of a young foundry worker after it had been chewed off by a crane. The company doctor applied a tourniquet to the stump and sent the worker to Eden Hospital in Castro Valley, Calif. The lower leg was attached by a two inch strip of skin. An orthopedic surgeon looked at the victim and decided, he says, on the "spur of the moment" to attempt to save the leg. He called a vascular surgeon who agreed to help. The operation, which involved shortening the leg by two inches to compensate for the damaged tissue, was begun three-and-a-half hours after the accident.

ever, let's take the middle course, assuming that the tax will be neither below nor above the 20 cents on 10 per cent valuations.

Next let's see where the tax will come from. Of the \$40 million assessed by the county about \$21 million are charged against oil and utilities. Which means that they would pay about \$42,000 of the total tax, leaving about \$38,000 for individuals and business firms to pay. It has been said that this amounts to about \$1.60 for each of the county's 23,000 residents. That figure is misleading in that the 23,000 includes many children and other non-taxpayers. It would be more proper to estimate the average taxpayer's share at about four times that figure.

An objection to the proposal is that Gainesville set up the college program, and the county is asked now to take it over after having had no voice in the development so far. That would appear to be a valid gripe except that the assets offered are considerably larger than the liabilities. The institution's value as of now consists of \$335,000 in building, furnishings and real estate, \$200,000 in the Mary Josephine Cox scholarship endowment, and \$40,000 of sur-

plus scholarships on hand. This adds to about \$575,000 of assets. Outstanding bonds in the amount of \$290,000 make up the only liability. Roughly this comparison leans about 2 to 1 in the county's favor. Before leaving this subject a word of explanation on the endowment fund is in order. Mary Josephine Cox willed a farm to Gainesville College on condition that the revenue therefrom be spent on scholarships for deserving students of the county attending the college. Since then oil production has increased the value to an estimated \$200,000, with a current monthly income of about \$2,300. This endowment remains with the college.

As regards the operating expense of the college, it can be pointed out that next year's budget is estimated at \$90,000 for instruction and administration and \$16,000 for debt retirement. Revenue is estimated at \$57,700 from the state and \$40,000 from tuitions. At this rate the college would have to draw only about \$8,000 from its tax sources. Even at half the proposed tax it would have ample funds for gradual expansion of faculty and facilities.

Considering both sides of the proposal, it seems that important benefits are possible at a cost of less than \$10 a year to the average taxpayer. Voters will have to decide whether they are worth that price.
