The best news Texans have heard in a long, long time is Governor Jester's announcement Tuesday that he had signed the Agriculture Class anti closed shop law. In his words this law guarantees a man's right to work. We have every reason to believe that the law will accomplish just what its sponsors claim for it and end the ridiculous situation whereby labor bosses were able to call strikes whether or not the workers themselves were, agreeable. Since a man no longer needs a union card to hold a job he can go on working as long as he and the employer get along.

Union officials will not admit it, of course, but this is really the goal working people have been looking for. It gives them both freedom and collective power freedom to break union ties if they do not agree with union leaders, collective power of the union in dealing with an unjust employer.

The most attractive feature of all is the very strong probability that employer and union relations will improve to the extent that strikes will become far less frequent. Union leaders will become more reasonable in their demands because they have to be certain of pleasing their members. At the same time employers now have an incentive for trying to win the good will of their workers. When both factions strive to please the working man the result cannot be anything but good.

By comparison with this condition the old closed shop is actual slavery --- the man with the whip being the union boss. The union card, which was a man's passport to his job, was subject to cancellation any time a worker declined to submit to the leader's autocratic whim. At the same time the worker's helplessness was matched by his employer's inability to help him.

But watch now. Things are going to be different and Texas will get back to the traditional American spirit of individual freedom and right. Once again men can do their own thinking and deciding as they did through that glorious century and a half when they developed into the greatest nation on earth.

#### Washington **News** Letter By Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D.C., April 4 -The House is in virtual recess from now until Wednesday since many members wished to return home for Easter.

Among bills passed in the House this week was the so-called First Deficiency Appropriation Bill. 

#### **EXPERTS RECOMMEND GREEN PASTURES FOR** MORE POULTRY PROFIT

Green pastures for poultry? Yes, says Ted Martin, poultry husbandman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. While chickens and turkeys are not ordinarily put in a class with grazing animals, explains Martin, test have shown that when they get the chance, poulry will get as much as 20 per cent of their feed requirement from green feed. Since feed can generally be produced more economically in the form of pasture than in any other way, cutting down feed costs is reason enough to provide pasture for poultry. But Martin says there are other advantages to be had from grow-

All poultrymen agree that there is no question about the value of Vitamin A in the feed of all classes of poultry, Martin says, and fresh green feed is probably the most dependable and economical source of Vitamin A. Barley, oats, sudan grass, and similar crops can be grown for year-round grazing in nearly all parts of Texas. These pastures will need mowing often however, to keep the plants from becoming hard and woody.

There is a precaution to take in grazing poultry, too. Martin explains that too much green feed in the ration of laying hens may cause discolored yolks and watery whites in eggs. But if the birds are started gradually on the green feed, and offered more each day, no harm will result. Martin says poultrymen may begin by turning birds on pasture for 30 minutes to an hour before roosting time, and lengthen the period each day until they stay on pasture all af-

#### Early Diagnosis Urged As Most Effective Way To Check Cancer Spread

The cancer death rate could be greatly reduced merely by facing facts and applying exsisting knowledge of the dreaded disease, Dr. William F. Mengert declared.

Dr. Mengert, a staff member of Southwestern Medical College and Parkland Hospital, made his observation in connection with National Cancer Month, which will extend through April in accordance with an act of Congress.

The importance of early diagnosis in cancer cannot be overemphasized — more than threefourths of all cancer is curable in the early stages, he said. It is a local disease at first, but as time passes it spreads and be comes progressively dangerous, and will inevitably cause death if

"We see very few early cancers at Parkland," he said. "And when a patient waits until he's dying of cancer, medical science frankly can't do much about it." the dange
