Today, as for several years past, they are sharing their abundance with the descendants of those who remained in the old country.



Soil Conservation Group Leaders Try

More cooperators and more cooperation by the cooperators was the principal objective discussed by Brushy Elm group leaders Monday night when they noted that the area is falling behind schedule in its program.

According to a report submitted by Robert Mitchell, director of the Muenster work unit of the Soil Conservation Service, only a small percentage of the goal set for July 1, 1949, is now complete.

The Brushy Elm area has 104 land owners of whom 73 are signed as cooperators. On the land under agreement the work schedule is 38 per cent complete, however even that figure is misleading because it represents achievement over five years and not since the program was adopted last July 1. A similar situation prevails in the Dry Elm-Squirrel Creek and the Big Elm areas, Mitchell stated.

Aside from direct benefits to be derived by cooperating farmers, the Brushy Elm group leaders are interested in additional benefits in the event of a federally spon-sored program for building retention reservoirs. According to proposals, such reservoirs, if and when they are built, will be located in areas when farmers have shown their interest in conservation by completing at least 50 per cent of their work program. The leaders are interested in qualifying to receive the benefit of improvements in their

The retention reservoirs are intended to hold both water and silt and are to be placed in creeks, brances or gullies as the need requires.

Group leaders are even more concerned with the definite and immediate benefits of soil saving and greater productivity. The sooner the work is done the more soil the farmer will save and the sooner he will reap greater pro-

Estimating benefits in terms of money, the leaders valued a completed program as worth more than a half million dollars annually to the community. They based their figures on an official extensive survey which compared adjoining lands and reported a yield of nine dollars more per acre on conserved and improved soil. Some of those comparisons are already possible in this community, the men agreed.

Another inducement for accelerated action is the fact that the three watersheds of the community have top priority on the local work unit's service at this time. More can be accomplished now because the help is here.



College Station, -. A little time and trouble now, plus some rotenone, can put Texas cattle and dairymen on the road to saving \$5 million.

How? By spraying for cattle

Statistics show that forty-two percent of all Texas cattle are grubby. Grubby cattle are discounted on the market at about one cent a pound. The total loss to Texans in the cattle and dairy business in terms of milk, meat and leather each comes close to five million dollars.

Most farms and ranches cause their own trouble with grubs, Extension entomologists for Texas A. and M. College point out. Heel flies are the parents of grubs, and the flies seldom migrate over half a mile. So treatment for grubs in the fall and winter will con-






