Man stands today on the threshold of the space age with man-made satellites because Elmer A. Sperry, the American inventor born 100 years ago, put the gyroscope to work!

He took what was thought machines and missiles in space and under the sea.

1860, at the dawn of another exciting age - that of electricity. He spanned these two ages and contributed to both, ranked as second only to Edison for his work and his inventive genius.

The gyroscope came relatively late in Dr. Sperry's life. He was continually busy with a flow of inventions - arc lights, dynamos, electric locomotives, mining machines, trolley cars, storage batteries. From a tricycle built to travel on railroad tracks that he built when he was a boy to a rail flaw detector, developed shortly before his death, his life was occupied with new problems to be solved, Altogether, Dr. Sperry registered almost 500 patents.

In 1910, when Dr. Sperry turned his full attention to the mysterious workings of a child's spinning toy, the gyroscope, he forged the key to the future. That year he formed the Sperry Gyroscope Co. and a year later saw his ship's gryo-compass perform successfully on the U.S.S. Delaware. Unaffected by the teel of the ship, and free from variation, this compass became in demand all over the

He next arranged the gryocompass to control the steering engine so it became a robot helmsman, more sensitive than a human and less subject to error. During the First World War, Dr. Sperry developed a gun fire control system for the Navy which was installed on the entire fleet. Shortly afterward, he launched the first "guided missile", con-
