Second Decision On College Issue Goes to Voters

For the second time in less Cooke County will have an election to decide for or against the creation of County Junior College District when he fell while running to take administration of the present Gainesville College.

Issues to be voted on are identical to those presented in the election of December 19, which rejected the proposal by a close vote. The first issue is on creating the district and authorizing a tax to support it. Another is voting on a board of regents for its administration. The third is on authorizing a tax of 20 cents on \$100 of county assessed valuation. last issue is limited to taxpayers. On all issues voting eligibility is limited to those who have paid their 1959 poll

In presenting their proposal to the public the College Development Committee in recent weeks has attempted to clarify certain problems. The first is a possibility that retax structure and set valuations higher than those now used for county tax purposes thereby raising actual taxes but remaining within the 20 cent rate. Especially insolent was the effort of communists, both here and in foreign lands, to meddle in our course of justice.

A shocking study of contrasts is revealed by comparing the Chessman affair with the case of the aged American bishop recently sentenced by Red China to 20 years in prison. In view of the man's age that sentence amounted practically to a death sentence. But the world heard not a word of protest from the phony bleeding hearts who clamored for clemency for Chessman . . . who apparently saw no injustice in communism's treatment of this saintly man, but howled their heads off in defense of a beast who was fairly tried and found guilty of heinous crimes.

That's the nature of communism, and it makes us wonder all over again how our high officials can tolerate it and still think they are meeting their obligation to decent people.

It was the red propaganda mill, seeking to discredit America's standard of justice, which started and intensified the big noise in Chessman's behalf. Unfortunately too many unthinking people here and abroad were suckered into joining the cause.
