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## THE FOREIGN AID PROGRAM

When the foreign aid program was first started nobody ever dreamed it would become a permanent drain on our taxpayers. As first conceived it was designed to help war-stricken nations get back on their feet, but when this objective was accomplished it didn't take long for the thousands of officials and employees engaged in administering the program to find a compelling new reason to keep the program going full blast.

Now foreign aid is being sold to the people on the grounds it is essential to our own security as a practical and economical means of keeping allied and friendly nations from falling under the domination of Soviet Russia.

But, in many cases, our foreign aid program is neither practical nor economical. As the Senate subcommittee reported, millions of dollars have been thrown away in Viet Nam alone on slipshod programs that have been hastily and inadequately planned and on

"ostentatious" housing for American officials and workers.

If Viet Nam were an isolated instance of mismanagement and waste it might be excused. But it isn't an isolated case. It represents the same kind of careless disregard for American tax dollars that has been displayed all over the world by the foreign aid administrators and it is ridiculous for President Eisenhower or anybody else to take the attitude this fantastic waste of our tax money cannot be sharply curtailed or stopped without imperiling our own security.

This is bosh and nonsense. After spending over \$70 billions on this foreign aid program, we should have learned by now that throwing our money around is not a very practical or intelligent way to win friends and influence people overseas, and we think it is high time that Congress did start to cast a more critical eye on the whole concept behind this wasteful program.

## PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

Maybe because this an election year, but during the past few months we have been getting a host of mail from many sources, and among these are several letters from folks who feel we should do away with private ownership and instead have the government run everything—utilities, industry, commerce. They point to the numerous successful cooperative enterprises, they say, "Why not run everything on that basis?"

On the face of it, this may sound like a good idea. No one firm or individual would get rich at the expense of others. We'd all have a share in everything. But, when the chips are really down, which is the more efficient, private enterprise or public ownership?

It's true, that on a small scale, public ownership has been proved successful in many instances. However, how about it on a large scale?

Maybe we can learn something by looking to our neighbors to the north who have the world's largest example of both public and private enterprises working side by side, both in the same field, performing the same services. We refer, of course, to the Canadian railroads. About half of the railroads there are operated by the Canadian National, a government-owned company. The other half is owned and operated by the Canadian Pacific, a privately owned concern whose shares can be bought on a stock exchange.

Since both these companies operate about the same mileage of track, often the two parallel each other, the business

they do is about evenly divided. Yet, when it comes to the business of showing a profit or loss, the two are as different as black is from red. To wit, over the 18-year period, 1941 through 1958, the Canadian Pacific consistently showed a year-end profit, paying its shareholders \$368 million in dividends, as well as paying the government \$340 million in income taxes. On the other hand, the government-owned Canadian National paid no taxes and suffered a financial loss of \$563 million. Are the Canadians proud of their big white elephant, the Canadian National? Far from it. In fact, they'd like for someone to take it off their hands, only nobody seems to want it. What is more, they have so much money tied up in it, they can't afford to even give it away.

We cite this case as an example of how a government does in business. We doubt very much that we could do any better than the Canadians, and so we maintain that government should stay out of business. Somebody else can do it, and he'll at least help pay taxes. It may sound cruel, but where business is concerned, the old rule applies, "Fish or cut bait." And, from where we sit, it looks like the government can't fish.

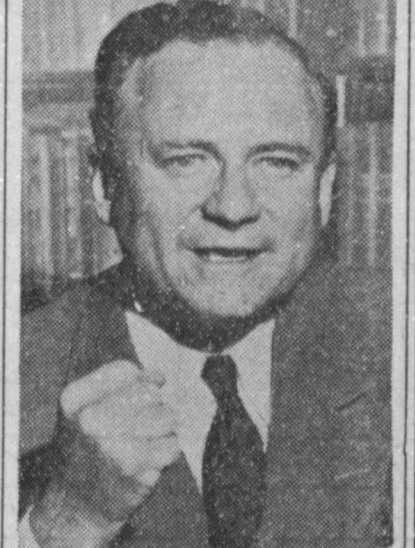
In finals Saturday night they beat Pilot Point National Bank two straight games by scores of 15-12 and 15-8.
