## Henscheid and Hesse Buy Furbach Site for New H & H Feed Store

Another new building for Muenster was assured this week when Albert Henscheid and Meinrad Hesse announced their intention to build a new home for their H & H Feed Store on the former Furbach property adjoining Ben Seyler's new building.

A deal for the location, begun about two weeks ago was completed late last week.

Clearing away the old building and construction on the new one will begin after harvest.

## BEES TAKE OVER JOB OF POLLINATING LOCAL LEGUME CROPS

With 150 bee hives already placed and as many more due to arrive in the near future, four legume crops of the community now need only the weather to yield a bumper seed harvest.

Al Hess has all the hives that have been set out to date and three other farmers are expecting theirs any day, according to Robert Mitchell of the soil conservation work unit. E.E. Salge of Weslaco owns the bees.

The arrangement, now being used here for the first time, is a two way bargain. The crop owner is assured of thorough pollination and a better yield, the bee owner gets the honey.

Vetch, according to Mitchell, is one of the crops depending almost entirely on insects for pollination.

## GRAIN BRIGHTER AFTER .93 INCH RAIN SUNDAY

Crops of the community were brighter this week as a result of the .93 inch rain that fell slowly from midnight to 6 a.m. Sunday.

The first moisture of any consequence in several weeks, it brought welcome relief but fell far short of the grain's requirement.

Farm conservation plans were recently completed on Trubenbach and Hellman, Ben Fleitman, J.T. Biffle, Jr., Ralph Davidson, John Fleitman, B.C. Rosson, and Ike Fulton farms in the Myra group. A.A. Young, Hood conservation group, made a plan with the assistance of the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District.

New cooperators are establishing outlets immediately to have a suitable water disposal system for new terraces to be constructed.

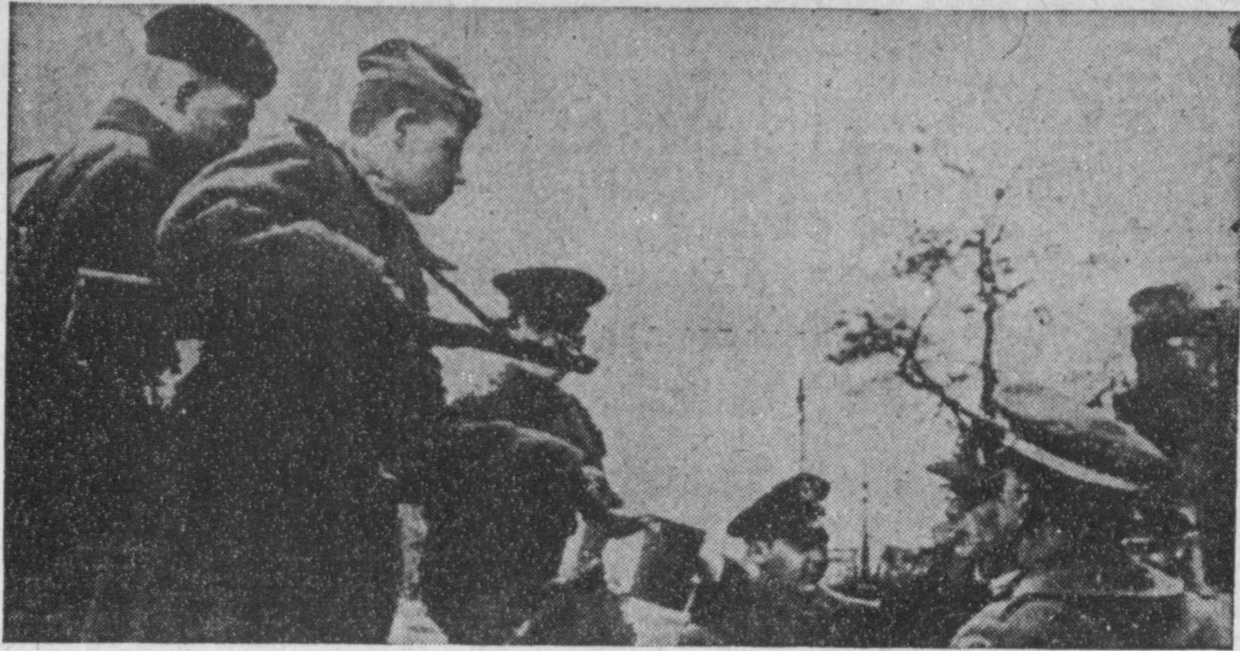
V.W. and C.C. Redman, Saint Jo conservation group, have a vetch story. V.W. Redman states, "We turned 150 cows on a 12 acre patch of vetch Monday April 12th, and the 150 head stayed on the vetch until Friday, April 23rd. Last year this 12 acre patch made 300 pounds of seed per acre or 3600 pounds of vetch seed." V.W. and C.C. Redman report that their Madrid clover sowed October 1st. did not winter kill. They attribute the hardness of their Madrid clover to early Fall planting date.

Arrangements have been made by the H & H Feed Store and the program is conducted by representatives of the Sherwin Williams Company, manufacturers of Weed-No-More.

According to Meinrad Hesse a movie, will show the recommended uses and application methods for chemical weed killers. After the movie a technician will answer questions on the subject.

## Special Pow-Wow to Boost Formation of Civic Welfare Group

The revival of some sort of community welfare organization is the intended purpose of a special meeting to be held next Tuesday night, May 4, in the parish hall.

Starting with a luncheon in the hall's lunch room, it will be featured by an open discussion on ways and means to work together for the commercial, agricultural and general civic welfare of the community. The idea originated with a small group of business men who sent invitations to representative farmers and business men of the area. Responses already received point to an encouraging attendance.

The meeting is the first attempt to organize an active men's civic group here since a chamber of commerce ceased to function in the early thirties. A ladies' group, the Civic League and Garden Club, has been active for about ten years during which time it has sponsored cemetery improvements, flower shows, and many other worth while community projects while inspiring widespread interest in home beautification activities. Organizers of Tuesday's get-together have hopes of forming an organization that will equal and possibly surpass the ladies in interest and effort.

## DINOSAUR SHADE TREE, ALMOST EXTINCT, MAY THRIVE ON TEXAS SOIL

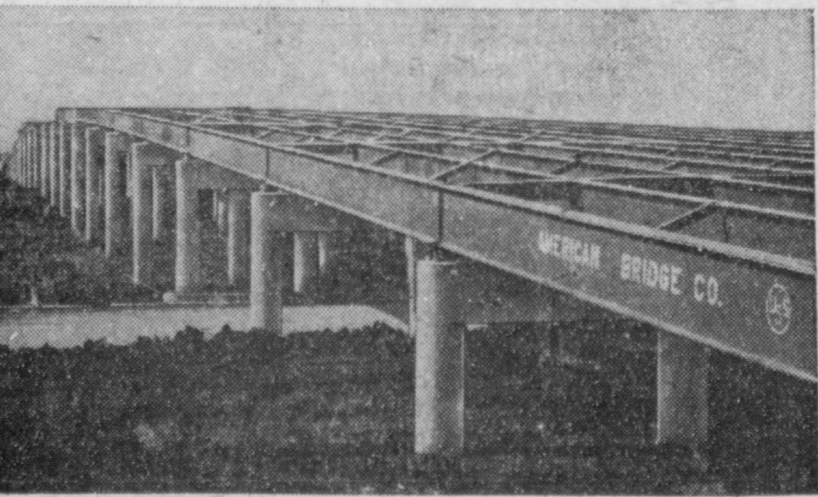
The A & M College Texas Forest Service recently received from the Harvard arboretum a small quantity of seed from a tree species, which, until a year ago, botanists believed had disappeared from the face of the earth millions of years ago. The seeds are from the Metasequoia, and Silviculturist, Chief D.A. Anderson, of the Texas Forest Service, plans to find out whether they'll grow in the state.

The Metasequoia, scientists believed, disappeared from the earth about the time of the dinosaur and other giant reptiles. Then in February, 1946, H. H. Hu, a Chinese forester, discovered the species were growing in a 100-mile area of the Szechuan and Hopen provinces. Harvard joined in an expedition which confirmed the discovery, and this year obtained some of the seed, which are being distributed to recognized silviculturists for experimental planting in this nation and Europe.

The Metasequoia, a coniferous species, is a "cousin" to the giant sequoias growing on the slopes of the Sierras in California. Its history can be traced back into antiquity, along with the ancient ginkgo tree. Today there are only a little over 1,000 trees of this species left — almost on the verge of extinction.

Whether the seed received by the Texas Forest Service will prosper and grow Metasequoias here, only time will tell. However, the Chinese area where the trees were found is in about the same latitude as Texas. The tree grows more than 100 feet high, bears cones and sheds its leaves in winter.

The 50-mile expressway, termed among highway builders as "the highway of tomorrow," will be the ultimate in new highway construction in Texas, a state already famed for its fine highway system.

Opportunity is knocking on Muenster's door. By the time this column reaches its readers many of them will have received invitations to attend a special community get-together at the parish hall next Tuesday night to consider ways and means of improving the civic, agricultural and commercial welfare of the community. In short, it's Muenster's chance to organize and work systematically for whatever we need to make this a better place to live and make a living.

Seldom a day passes but what someone mentions one or more of the things that are wrong with Muenster. We ought to do this, we ought to have that, we ought to correct something else. But unfortunately our interest usually does not pass the talking stage. It's everybody's business, therefore nobody's business.

Tuesday night's meeting is an opportunity to change that situation. It will form an organization whose job is to do something about community welfare and our problems will become somebody's business. That still isn't a guarantee that things will get done, but it's ever so much better than our present complete lack of system. At least it's a starting point, and it can lead to many worth while achievements if we'll back up our community pride, which is already quite adequate, with well organized effort.

By all means let's give it a try. Let's form a group that will regard community welfare as its responsibility, one that will take a lively interest in present welfare and keep planning for a better future. The idea has interesting and gratifying possibilities.

From what has already been said about aims and methods we could refer to the proposed organization as a chamber of commerce. But let's consider it as something more. The term as usually understood applies principally to business interests. It would be nicer if the name suggested a broader scope including beauty, health, recreation, education and any other factors that contribute to better living.

Nobody likes to admit mistakes. Not even a president. That's a possible reason why President Truman is so insistent about blocking the efforts of congress to check over the FBI loyalty report on Dr. Edward U. Condon of the Department of Commerce. He would be rather embarrassed if one of his key men were exposed as an easy source of information for foreign spies.

But he will be more embarrassed if an investigation in spite of his objections should reveal that Dr. Condon does not measure up to our loyalty standards. By his action President Truman bestows a very special personal endorsement on a suspect. He's sticking his neck out a long way. If he's proved wrong the second mistake will be more painful to admit than the first.

It's hard to savvy what reasoning process could have prompted the president's course. Under similar circumstances most people would eagerly cooperate in the investigation. They'd want the suspected man openly cleared or convicted and remove any cloud of suspicion that might hang over the department. What Truman did only intensified the suspicion.

Millions of people are wondering more than ever what's been going on in the Commerce Department. They're wondering also why the White House is so reluctant to let people know what's been going on.

Something else that's hard to understand is the president's statement that national security demands that government agencies must keep secret files on investigations of employes' loyalty. Most of us feel the other way about it. We think that national security will be more secure if all loyalty files are subject to congressional investigation. A double check is always safer.

What the president apparently implies is that the investigation may reveal other facts which cannot safely be known by congressmen. And again most of us feel the other way about it. We believe that congressional committees can match any of the department in judgment and discretion.

If that is what he meant we're still confused, because his state- (Continued on Page 10)

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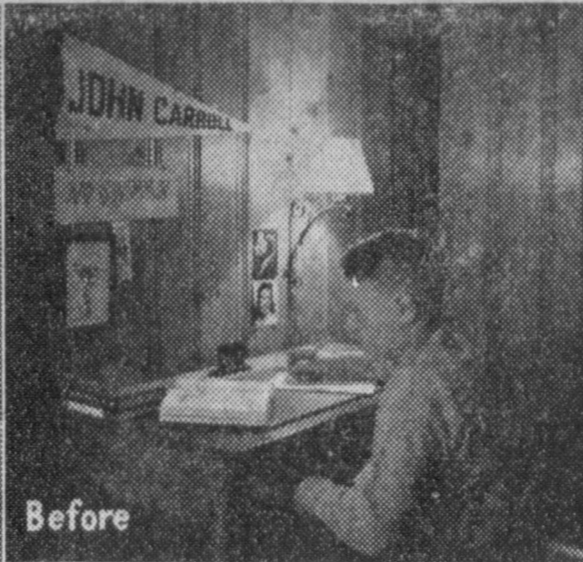

## The American Way

### BELIEVING PERSONALITIES

Several months ago I recommended to the readers of this column that they listen in on the "Coffee With Congress" radio program which is broadcast each Saturday over the National Broadcasting Company's network. If you haven't as yet given yourself the pleasure of tuning in on this most interesting and informative program, let me again urge you to do so.

Most of us, unfortunately, do not know too much about the 531 men and women we send to Congress. This radio program takes you into the Congressman's home; lets you meet him and the members of his family. It is so intimate one can almost smell the coffee the participants are drinking while the program is in progress.

A few weeks ago Congressman Harold C. Hagen of Minnesota held the spotlight on the "Coffee With Congress" program. As is customary, toward the end of the half-hour the N.B.C. interviewer, Bill Heron, asked Congressman Hagen what he foresaw for the future of America and of the world. His reply

carried such an inspirational message that I quote it:

"What about the future of America and the future of the world? My hopes, and I am sure your hopes too, were very high that day in August 1945, when we learned peace had come. But now, turmoil, distress, and uncertainty, are everywhere. Man and his leaders do not seem to have found the way toward peace in this world. But there is a way.

"In college I studied a lot of history and I recall that the men and women who founded this country pointed that way. They laid a foundation which teaches that man is a free individual and can, with the help of God, work out his own destiny.

"So, deeply rooted in American traditions is the basic idea of the sacredness of human personality and the sovereignty of God.

"I believe that today Americans must go out, both at home and abroad, to inspire faith in bosoms where it has died, to help stricken people to their feet, to fight against disease, ignorance and poverty everywhere.

"My deep conviction is that the future of the world is in the hands of believers and 'believing' personalities.

"For myself, I build my confidence for the future, as George Washington and Abraham Lincoln did, upon a faith in a God, who governs His world in the

principle of what we sow, we reap. Therefore, I am trying to put into this world more than I take out.

"If I can join with millions of other resolute Americans in this purpose, a peaceful America and world as well, will be our priceless possession and a heritage for our children and future generations."

When Congressman Hagen said "I am trying to put into this world more than I take out," he was not just giving lip service to a beautiful philosophy of life. His constituents in the Ninth Minnesota District have testified in no uncertain manner that they have an abiding faith in their Washington representative.

In turning to the Congressional Directory, I find that Harold C. Hagen of Crookston, Minnesota, was elected to the 78th Congress in 1942; was reelected to the 79th Congress in 1944 by the largest majority and by the largest vote ever given a winning candidate in the history of the district; and also reelected to the 80th Congress in 1946, setting still another new record for the largest majority ever given a winning candidate in the district, the margin of victory being 21,820 votes.

The foregoing would seem to prove that Congressman Hagen is one of those "believing personalities" about whom he speaks; to whom America can confidently look for leadership to bring peace to his troubled world.

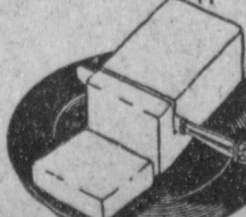

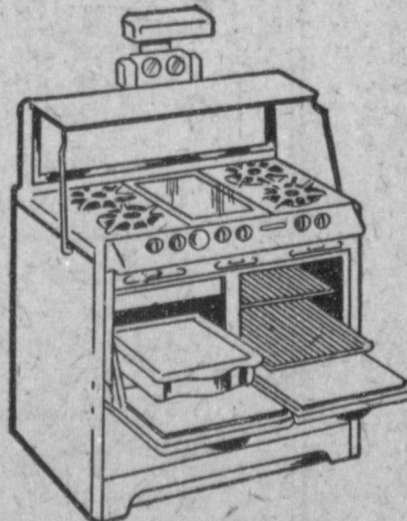

**WHY 45 CENT BEEF CAN SELL FOR 42**

The furor and worry over high prices has produced some serious misconceptions. One of them is that inflation is very largely the result of excessive profits. Exorbitant prices may have been charged in isolated cases, but that is not the practice of American industry as a whole. The businesses which produce, process and sell the great mass of consumer goods generally work on very modest margins.

An interesting example of that is reported by the meat packing industry, based on an analysis of figures issued by the Department of Agriculture. Last year, good live steers brought

an average price of about 26 cents a pound in the Chicago stockyards. Such steers yield about 58 per cent beef, while 42 per cent of the animal is waste and by-products. This means the cost of the dressed beef was around 45 cents a pound. Yet the packers sold that beef, in New York, for an average price of 42 cents a pound, after paying all expenses of preparation, chilling, refrigerated transportation, delivery to retailers, and other costs. Commercial and utility grades of beef sold at wholesale for less.

Selling beef apparently below cost is not a work of magic. The difference was made up by maximum utilization of such by-products as trimmings, hides, glands, fat, etc. The value of these by-products is always credited to the beef itself, thus making it possible to pay more for cattle than is obtained for the meat. The meat packers operate on a profit margin of only a fraction of a cent per pound.

**SEEDS MAY LISTEN IF THEY'RE COAXED WITH SILENT SOUND**

Will our southern pines grow faster from seed treated by "silent" sound? The A & M College Texas Forest Service intends to find the answer through an experimental planting of treated seed of the slash and longleaf pine species.

Scientists have been doing considerable research of late with "silent" sound, sound which has such a high vibration rate that it is beyond the range of human hearing. Few people can hear sounds which vibrate faster than 16,000 times a second, but some generators are now turning out ultra-sound with a vibration rate as high as 12,000,000 a second — far beyond reach of the human ear.

According to research reports, potatoes treated with ultrasonic waves flowered a week earlier than normally with a 40 to 50 percent increase in yield. Peas sprouted earlier and in some cases tripled their crop yield.

**FAILURE TO HEAD OFF DIPHTHERIA IS BOTH AMAZING AND TRAGIC**

Austin, Texas — It is a tragedy that Texas parents continue to allow their babies to suffer and die from that painful and killing disease diphtheria. This is the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who says "It is up to the parents. If they protect their children with immunization, they need not have diphtheria."

Dr. Cox said that it is amazing that this disease should be allowed to take its toll of young lives when it can be entirely stamped out by proper immunization. Yet in the past week, 33 cases were reported in this state.

"Babies should be immunized by the age of eight or nine months," Dr. Cox advised. Authorities on the care of infants recommend a first dose by the age of eight or nine months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second dose is usually given later."

To maintain immunity, Dr. Cox said that a reinforcing dose of toxoid is advised when a child is old enough to enter school if a Schick test reveals the need of one. Children who have never been immunized certainly should

be protected without any further delay, the State Health Officer declared, and added that it is the responsibility of the parents to save the lives of their children.

**FREIGHT CARS**

The nation, literally, lives out of the freight cars of the railroads, according to Eric Tainter, news editor of Radio Station KCKN, Kansas City, Mo. "Much of the food we eat, the clothing we wear, the fuel we burn, the materials from which houses are built, the furnishings of these homes, the books, magazines and newspapers we read, and the numerous tools and materials which we use in every day are drawn from widely scattered places, sometimes hundreds or thousands of miles distant, and the bulk of these things come to us by rail. When we trace these articles back to their original sources, we find that railway transportation played an important part, too, in assembling the raw or processed materials from which they were manufactured."

### NATION'S NUMBER 1 DISEASE SPREADER IS ORDINARY HOUSEFLY

Austin, Texas — The ordinary housefly is an enemy to health, and is one of the agents most commonly responsible for the spread of disease throughout the nation, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Typhoid fever, dysentery, and many other intestinal diseases can often be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

Speaking in this connection, Dr. Cox advised: "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray flies will not endanger the health of your family. Keep flies away from food, drink and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of flies. Infection from this source can be picked up by flies and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or buried. Eliminate all breeding places for flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling diseases and preventing unnecessary illness."

Dr. Cox said that the State Health Department would furnish upon request a pamphlet outlining safe and practical methods recommended for use in fly control.

### QUICK REFUELING IN THE AIR WILL EXTEND SUPERFORT'S RANGE

Washington — B-29 bombers aiming at far-distant targets can refuel in the air within a few minutes, it was reported Sunday, under a new high-speed method developed by the United States Air Force.

This range-stretching technique for the big war planes was hinted at by Air Secretary Stewart Symington recently before the Senate armed services committee. He said B-29's utilizing the "most modern development" of the old airborne refueling system could, for example, bomb any part of Russia

from bases in Alaska or Labrador. He made no further explanation, but said bombing units would have the new equipment by the first of next year.

Using only standard equipment, B-29's now fly as much as 4,600 miles. The refueling method can stretch this range vastly, depending upon what point in flight the refueling can be done.

### "New Look" Carried Too Far Says Style Creator

New York — The man who created the "new look" for women says other dress designers are carrying the thing "too far."

Christian Dior, the Paris designer credited with starting the "new look" fashion, said on his arrival from France he was not in favor of dresses that hang to the ground "for general wear."

A reporter asked Dior if short skirts would make a comeback. He threw up his hands and said: "I hope not, ever!"

Either our president thinks he's bigger than congress or he's concerned about other things that might be exposed in the Dr. Condon investigation. Whatever the reason, it doesn't fit in this country. Thank goodness this democracy does not seem disposed to put up with the situation. Congress still has the power to do something about it, and from present indications is also determined to use it. We'd like to see Dr. Condon cleared of all suspicion . . . but openly and not by hush-hush methods.
