#### STATE CANCER DEATH RATE INCREASES 18 PERCENT IN 5 YEARS

AUSTIN, TEXAS.—An increase of more than 18 per cent in Texas cancer deaths during the five years between 1943 and 1947 has been announced by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Texas mortality tables compiled by the Texas State Department of Health show 1943 cancer deaths at 5,557, as compared to 6,770 for 1947.

"The greater part of this tremendous increase in cancer deaths is attributable to needless delay in seeking treatment, once a person has reason to suspect he has a cancerous growth," Cox said. He added his belief that advertising of patent medicines and so-called cancer quacks puts dangerous and misleading information before the public, thereby adding to the cancer mortality rate. This is because people are lulled by such propaganda and do not receive proper diagnosis and treatment until too late.

Dr. Cox said that almost two thirds of all cancer cases rely on surgery to remove the cancerous tissue, while the other third may respond to X-ray or radium treatment.

"These three methods are the only means by which the disease can be treated," he said. "Self-medication, serums, colored lights, pastes, and diets are absolutely useless."

The Health Officer pointed out that the greatest defense against cancer is an early diagnosis and competent treatment by a reputable physician. He urged special attention to any unnatural bleeding from any body opening, lumps in the breast, and skin sores which fail to heal normally.

#### DOS AND DON'TS FOR KEEPING FEET HAPPY

Here are a few rules to help keep your feet happy:

Stand up with your full weight on your feet when you're being fitted.

Have both feet measured and select shoes to fit the larger foot.

Measure your arch. Even if the length and width of a shoe are all right for you, the shoe may not fit your particular arch.

If you wear open heels, make sure that your foot is not extending over the back of the shoe.

Lie down with your feet above your head at least once a day, particularly after a hard day of shopping or housecleaning.

Wear hose at least a half inch longer than your foot.

Sit as much as possible while doing household chores.

Increase blood circulation in your feet by plunging them alternately in hot and cold baths.

Don't wear out old shoes as house slippers. The stretched, misshapen shoes will never rest your feet, only harm them.

Don't switch suddenly from spike heels to flat shoes. Your tendons can't take it.

Don't wear the same pair of shoes every day if you can afford not to.

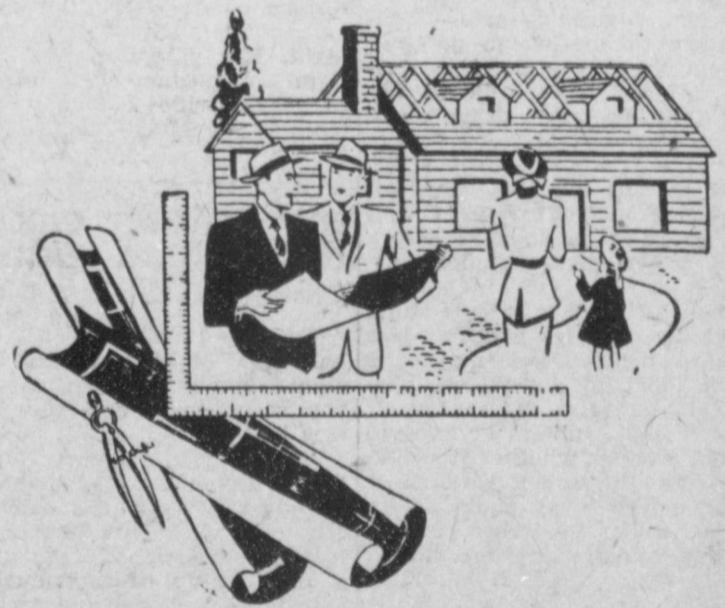

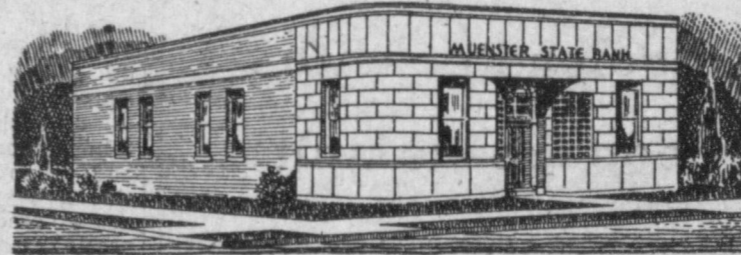

Take Bert Childers, for example. Bert is up at four in the morning, to get the milking finished—and

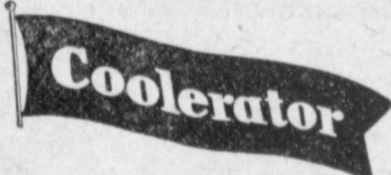
ploughing or harvesting, depending on the season, until sundown. In the evening he finally relaxes with the missus over a moderate glass of beer.

## The American Way

### THE RIGHT TO BARK

The story goes that the pedigreed Russian wolfhound, recently arrived in England, met the British bull dog. After canine greetings had been exchanged, the wolfhound stood back and searchingly scrutinized the bull dog. He exclaimed, "My, but you're thin! I've never seen you looking quite so badly!"

"You'd be thin, too, if you'd been living in England the past few years," replied the bull dog. "We Britishers have had to tighten our belts. We have an 'austerity' program, donchaknow. Even we, formerly happy dogs, are now leading a 'man's life'. In fact, we dogs are now in the 'man house,' but, I say, old chap, you look bully. Never saw you looking better."

"I'm okay, that is, physically. Mr. Stalin sees to it that we members of the Royal Household are well fed. Nothing is too good for us," said the wolfhound.

"Then, in heaven's name, why did you ever leave Russia to come to England where we barely exist on a near starvation diet?"

"Well, you see, I still like to be able to bark once in a while. Smart dog, that Russian wolfhound. He knows that even a full stomach can be purchased at too high a price — the loss of freedom to bark, or to resolve it into human language, loss of freedom to speak one's mind without fear of imprisonment or death.

And in his conversation with the British bull dog, the wolfhound might well have added a few words of warning, to wit: "And if you Britishers keep on with your Socialistic nonsense, you'll not only have to tighten your belts still further, you'll lose your right to bark."

"We never miss the water until the well runs dry," is an old adage to which a lot of people in America should give heed today. Little do they realize that with every hand-out they take from the Federal government, their freedom of speech — their right to criticize, to grumble or complain is being abridged. You just can't kick the hand that feeds you, you've got to lick it — that's as true in America as it is in Russia.

Currently, we have a tousled-haired son of Iowa, gallivanting up and down and across the country, "barking" his head off — criticizing just about everything America has done, is doing and proposes to do. And bad as this is, as he looks through his rose-colored glasses, he loudly proclaims that just about everything is right in Red Russia.

Henry Wallace loves to "bark". He gets an awful lot of people out to hear him as he "barks at the moon," who pay a heap of money to listen to him tear America and her cherished institutions apart, the while he sings a song of praise for Russia and all her works.

One is inclined to wonder just how loudly this man, who aspires to be President of this great capitalistic country, would be allowed to "bark" if the things which he espouses, ever came to pass here. Can you imagine what

would happen to Henry if he took the stump in Russia to criticize Stalin as he has condemned President Truman — to deprecate everything Russian and to praise everything American? You do not have to be the seventh son of a seventh son to arrive at the answer to that question. He would make one speech; it is doubtful if he would be allowed even to finish that one. And that would be the end of Henry Wallace.

As for me, I'm going to string along with the wolfhound. I want to be able to "bark" whenever the urge to do so strikes me. And I sincerely believe that the vast majority of my fellow Americans feel exactly as I do about it. They want to keep THE RIGHT TO BARK.

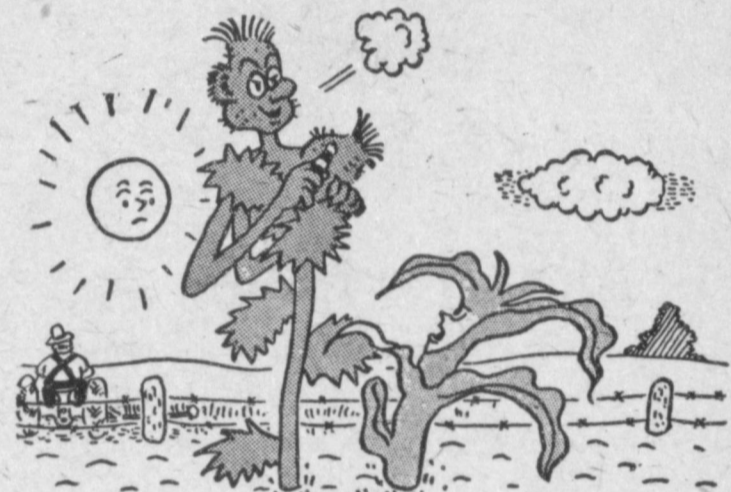

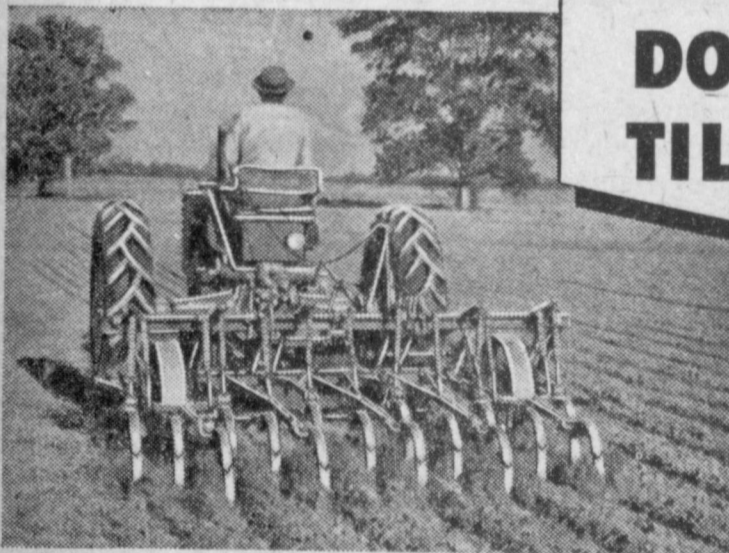

**TURKEYS, AND FOLKS WHO RAISE THEM, ARE THE 'CRAZIEST THINGS'**

CHICAGO.—Turkeys are about the craziest things anywhere.

At least that is the glib assertion of Al M. Biebel of East St. Louis, president of the Illinois Turkey Growers Association.

First thing that happens, said Biebel, is that the young turkeys yield to an inbred desire to roost in the brooder. As there are no roosting facilities, they roost on top of one another with lethal results to the bottom rows.

As the birds grow older, Biebel reported, a tom turkey is appointed sentinel of the flock. His sounded alarm can stampede his entire crew and they often fly en masse against barns and kill themselves.

An airplane, the 37th or 50th person to walk by a pen, or just a fancy is likely to start this procedure, Biebel said.

There were 42,000,000 turkeys raised in the United States in 1946 Biebel reported, and in 1947 there was an 18 percent shortage. He said this shortage will run as high as 20 to 25 percent this year.

It costs about \$7.50 to get a top class turkey to market, Biebel said, and the birds bring \$9 to \$11 wholesale and \$11 to \$15 retail. The turkeys weigh from 15 to 25 pounds each and eat 80 to 120 pounds of food before they are introduced to an ax.

Diseases claim 10 percent before they are 12 weeks old. And, Biebel asserted, if they are determined to have an epidemic the grower loses them all.

Other evidences of turkey daffiness, said Biebel, are:

1. The female does all the courting and sometimes has to pursue a male for hours.
2. Many young turkeys forget to eat and, as a result, starve to death. To overcome this absent-mindedness, colored marbles are placed in the food to jog turkey memory.

Yes, sir, Biebel said, turkeys are about the craziest things anywhere.

"Except," he added morosely, "maybe the people who try to raise them."

**PROPER PRECAUTIONS CAN PREVENT ATTACK OF ATHLETE'S FOOT**

AUSTIN.—"Few, if any, people have escaped the inconvenience and the annoyance of athlete's foot. It is said to be the third most common skin disease of the summer, and contrary to popular opinion, the fifth most prevalent disorder in the winter."

So says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, in a recent press release. Dr. Cox explains that athlete's foot is due to a small, mold-like growth or fungus which thrives on moist, warm parts of the body such as the feet.

In suggesting some effective measures to be taken to prevent initial cases and avoid recurrent attacks of the disease, Dr. Cox emphasized drying carefully between the toes; use of a mild alcoholic solution on these areas after drying; liberal applications of talcum powder in the socks and the shoes; and wearing socks that are absorbent but not coarse.

"Ill fitting shoes are often the source of athlete's foot, Dr. Cox warns. "Shoes that rub and chafe should be corrected or discarded."



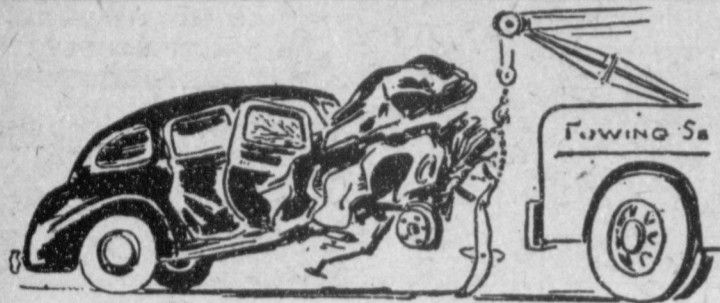

Bacteria, earthworms, and other beneficial living organisms in the soil cannot make plant food available from minerals in the soil unless decayed plant material is present for these living organisms of the soil to feed on. Fire in a pasture or cultivated field destroys plant food, decreases water penetration, decreases water storage, increases water runoff, accelerates erosion, kills beneficial earthworms and bacteria, it is pointed out.

J. C. Porter, District Conservationist at Jacksboro, Texas, took soil temperatures on the E. C. Richards ranch at Jacksboro last summer when the air temperature was 108 degrees F. The soil temperature on burned buffalo grass pasture was 130 degrees F. and on excellent little bluestem pasture the soil temperature was 89 degrees F. The soil temperatures on burned and unburned pasture varied 41 degrees F. High soil temperatures cause rapid evaporation of moisture. R. S. Mitchell, Work Unit Conservationist, states "anyone who makes a practice of burning regularly is a destroyer of our God-given natural resource, the soil."

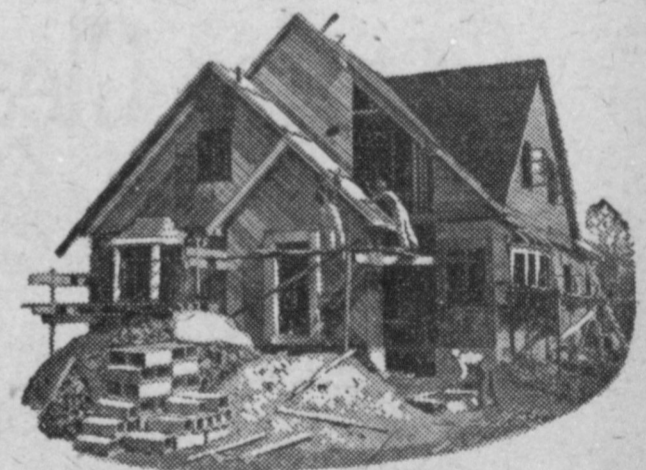
