#### PHILADELPHIA STORY and COPPER




Left—Christ Church in Philadelphia has a copper roof that is over 200 years old.

Philadelphia - the cradle of American Liberty — is where the first Continental Congress met in 1774, where the Declaration of Independence was written and proclaimed in 1776, where the Federal Constitution was framed in 1787 and where George Washington was elected the first President of the United States in 1789. Philadelphia was also the first capital of the nation.

When the Declaration of Independence was celebrated the fa-mous bronze Liberty Bell in In-dependence Hall, illustrated above, was joined by the eight bronze bells of old Christ Church in ringing out paeans of joy.
This historic church, shown above, was completed in 1744

and numbered among its worshippers Washington, Franklin and Lafayette. Covering Christ Church is the oldest copper roof in America — a roof that was three decades old when the Declaration of Independence was acclaimed. This copper roof is in excellent condition today after two centuries of service.

This year, as in 1789, a President of the United States will be selected in Philadelphia. The major political parties are holding their national conventions in the huge Municipal Auditorium in the Quaker City. Of special interest is the fact that this vast amphitheatre is also protected with a theatre is also protected with a copper roof. Over 100,000 pounds of sheet copper were used to re-roof the structure this Spring.

#### PILOT JUST WHISTLES AND NEW INVENTION LIGHTS UP AIRPORT

A pilot, flying the inky black-ness of a night thunderstorm near Midland, picked up his micthe distance, runway lights stabbed the dark as if by magic.

Sounds fantastic, but a young Dallas engineer's invention has made it a practical operation.

Mallory's invention is not bothered by static or lightning or radio transmission. It will turn the lights on only with that high pitched whistle. Pilots' sectional maps show all



#### TEXAS IS HARD HIT BY CURRENT DECLINE IN MILK PRODUCTION

Reduction of dairy cows on farms has reached the point where the country's milk supply is seriously endangered, J. C. Davison, Jr. of Texas Dairy Products Assocation, Fort Worth, Texas, said today. And Texas is harder hit than most states. A great deal of milk will have to be shipped into Texas by next

"Milk cow numbers are down for the fourth successive year," he said. "There are several reasons for this, among them the grain shortages of recent years due to great export demand by the government, and the price that cull cows have brought in the beef market. But I believe that forward looking dairymen, in reviewing the trend of our rapid population increases with resulting higher potential milk demand, will expand their herds to take advantage of expanding markets and the security in farm operations that have always resulted from dairying."

Milk cow numbers have dropped from over 27,000,000 in 1945 to 25,165,000 now, he said, and the decline has come while demand for milk and dairy products has grown at the most rapid rate in the country's history. Not only are cow numbers down, but heifers kept for replacement are down proportionately with

"Here in Texas the number of of this year was 1,200,000 compared with 1,400,000 at the start petent to render. of 1947. In only six states are the numbers of cows greater than a year ago and in no case is the increase in production suficient to meet the milk on the basis of population increases. Butter production is off 43 per cent and cheese production is off 46 per cent as compared with the same period last year in Texas.

"For instance, during, February of this year the percapita production per day of milk in the country was 1.83 pounds, the lowest figure since 1938. That is not enough milk to meet nutritional needs of our people."

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT NAMES HEART DISEASE AS NUMBER 1 KILLER

AUSTIN, TEXAS .- Heart disease continued in the top spot as the number one killer of Texans, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

Mortality rate figures show an increase of 255 deaths from the April, 1946 figure of 1,099, as compared to the April, 1948 total of 1,354. This represents an increase of more than 18.5% for the comparative period.

"So-called functional heart disease is usually traceable to nervousness, infections from other parts of the body such as teeth and tonsils, a disturbed function of the thyroid gland, and to influenza," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said. "And the excessive use of tobacco, coffee, tea, or other heavy stimulant is often a contributing



When it comes to handling bulls, every week is National Farm Safety Week at the Curtiss Candy Company farms in northern

While all good safety practices are encouraged during National Farm Safety Week from July 25 to 31, special emphasis is placed upon the careful handling of bulls which still represent one of the greatest hazards in farm operations.
