

COST OF LIVING WAGE

FORMULA UNSOUND

Tying wage rates to a cost of living index, in my judgment, is about as economically unsound as it is possible for anything to

Wages, the cost of labor that is, is the most important item in the price the consumer pays for almost any product. In most cases the cost of labor, from the time the raw material comes out of the ground all the way through until the finished product reaches the consumer, amounts to more than all of the other items. of cost put together.

Since labor is such an important item in the cost of production, it must necessarily follow that as wages are increased, prices must also be increased. As prices are increased the cost of living goes up, which in turn calls for another increase in wages, So tying wages to the cost of living sets up a never ending, self feeding, inflationary spiral. How long a thing of this sort can go on before it crashes of its own top-heavyweight is anybody's guess, but crash it will, and when it does all of us, not just the employees covered by this type of agreement, will be adversely affected.

There is only one way to defeat this vicious wage-price cycle. There is only one economically

cost of living is lowered. An impartial survey made a while back covering one hundred two plants in a six state midwest area showed the following results for the first three months' operation of incentive pay plans adopted by these companies: An average increase in production of 28.7 percent; an average increase in workers' earning, with no increase in the number of hours worked, of 18 percent; and an average decrease of 11 percent in the labor cost per unit of pro-

Here's a formula which always will work whenever and whereever it is given a fair chance, and the beauty of it is that under it every one benefits. The wage earners benefit by getting more money for the same number of hours of work, the employer benefits through a lower cost of production, and the consuming public - that's all of us — benefits by the decrease in prices which the lower cost of production makes possible. The government (I expect it should be included as it is a tremendously large factor in everything most Americans had more money total tax revenue increases on a larger volume of business. Lower prices which bring more goods and services within the purchasing range of more and more people always expands the volume of business.

I recommend the incentive pay formula as being worthy of the very careful consideration of company, large, medium every sized or small. Under the cost of living formula the company, in effect, says to its employees, "We hope you will increase your productivity per man hour, but whether you do or not, a months hence your wages be increased or decreased depending on the cost of living index." That kills or at least puts a serious damper on incentive. What's the point in working harder if even though you produce more your wages may be reduced because the cost of living has gone down?

Under the incentive pay formula the company says to its employees, "Increase your productivity and you'll make more money; it's entirely up to you.' Naturally, human nature being

TAKE CARE OF EGGS WHEN WEATHER'S HOT

Egg quality takes a terrific beating during hot weather unless poultrymen are on the job to maintain the bloom in their product, says a county agent.

Good hens eating well balanced feed produce high quality eggs, but if they are allowed to remain in a hot nest for a lengthy period of time they deteriorate rapidly. In hot weather eggs should be gathered three to five times daily and put into a cooler immediately. If kept at a temperature below 68 degrees fahrenheit and marketed at least

2 tablespoons mustard seed 1 teaspoon turmeric

1/2 tablespoon celery seed 1 piece horseradish

Soak cucumbers and onions (separately) 5 to 10 hours in brine made by dissolving one-half cup of salt in one-half gallon cool water. Drain well. Add onion, 21/2 cups vinegar, and 21/2 cups water to the cucumbers. Simmer about 15 minutes. Do not cook until soft. Drain. Discard liquid in which scalded. Make sirup by boiling the sugar and spices with three cups vinegar and one cup water for five minutes. Pack welldrained cucumbers and onions in hot Ball Jars. Cover with boiling sirup and seal.

DRAFT REGULATIONS INCLUDE PROVISIONS FOR JOB GUARANTEE

WASHINGTON.- Men going into the armed services under the new draft law will be entitled to return to civilian jobs atter their military service.

Their job guarantees will be similar to those of the World War II draft act. If the draftee leaves a permanent job in private industry or the federal government, he must apply to go back to the job within 90 days after completing his miltary duty.

A private employer will be required to return the man to his old job, or a similar one, withloss of seniority "unless the employer's circumstances have so changed as to make it impossible or unreasonable to do so.'

The law says the man must be restored to his former job if he is still qualified to handle it. If he is not qualified because of a disability suffered in service, he must be given a job of similar pay and status.

He can not be discharged with out cause for a year after returning to work.
