Cheese Volume At FMA Plant Reaches New Peak In 1947

Production at the Muenster Cheese Factory soared to a new high during 1947, reaching a grand total of 1,750,000 pounds compared with 1,360,000 pounds during the preceding year. It was a plant increase of 28 percent, but it does not represent a corresponding increase in community or membership milk production.

Reporting at a general membership meeting of the Farmers day, Jan. 8, Rudy Hellman, plant manager, stated that, increased membership milk production accounts for only about 20,000 of the plant's cheese increase. The balance of he increase resulted from non-member deliveries. Twenty one percent of the past year's receipts came from surplus at Wichita Falls, Decatur, Duncan, Okla., and non-member producers of this area.

A further break-down of the analysis indicated a sharp de-For European Babies cline in the immediate community's production. About 50 new members joined the organization boosting the total present membership to 375. The combined production of all of them slightly more than offsets the decrease in the old members' production. According to Hellman the figures indicate a serious trend which, if not checked, may result in a



The aforegoing shows that the cards definitely are "stacked" against both individual enterprisers and corporations. Disaster lies ahead if we let our Federal Government continue to spend our money in peace time at any thing like the psesest rate.

The larger incomes and estates already have been substantially 'redistributed". The day is not far hence when the "rich" and those of moderate incomes, will not be able to bear the tax burden. There soon will be no rich or moderately wealthy. All incentives to risk taking and the production of more wealth and income are being removed. Our standard of fiving will be reduced to the level of those countries of the old world, which we are now trying to support and revivify at our further expense.

I am not one poor unfortunates in the high income brackets, I definitely have a selfish interest in advocating that taxes on high incomes be greatly reduced. I have no desire to live in a slave state, and that is exactly the goal to which the United States is heading if a halt is not made to reckless, extravagant Federal Government spending.

At this session of Congress, another tax reduction bill will be introduced and passed. Let's hope that the President, in the time that will have elapsed since his veto of the last tax relief bill, will have gained the wisdom to O.K. this one.



The lo- died a year later in agony. cation was selected because of the large number of oil seepages there. Edwin L. Drake, a retired railroad conductor, was hired by a company to sink a well. He started drilling in June, 1859, and on August 27 of that year he struck oil at 691/2 feet.

Drake's shallow well started the modern oil industry. A turbulent era began, similar to the California gold rush a few years earlier, as men flocked to Titusville. Within a few months hundreds of wooden drilling derricks dotted the region.

In those days petroleum was used mainly to make "lamp oil" lubricating oil, harness oil, axle grease and medicinal preparations. The gasoline unavoidably produced in distilling operations was regarded as a nuisance and generally was dumped into creeks or rivers, where it created a fire





AUSTIN. - Five vicious killers are at large in Texas. Each year they cause the death of thousands of Texans and inflict pain and sickness on thousands more.

Public Enemy No. 1 of this group is heart disease, which accounted for 14,076 deaths in Texas in 1946. Year in and year out is stands forth as the state's and nation's No. 1 killer.

The term, "heart disease," denotes all types of heart ailments. It is usually considered a disease of old age, but this is not necessarily true.

TEXAS HAD 195,000 BIRTHS AND 61,000 **DEATHS DURING 1947**

Austin, Texas -. It is estimated that during 1947 there were 195, 000 live birth and 61,000 deaths in Texas. The number of births in 1947 far exceeded the former record of 180,000 in 1946. The excess of births over deaths last year gave Texas a natural increase in population of 134,000 people, according to Dr. Geo. W Cox, State Health Officer.

Practically all of the increase in the mortality during the first nine months of 1947 may be attributed to the steadily mounting toll of death levied against the population by heart disease, cancer and apoplexy.

Considerable satisfaction should come to those engaged in public health work in knowing that during the first three quarters of 1947 th lowest death rates ever recorded in Texas were reached for the following diseases: typhoid fever, diarrhea, and dysentery scarlet fever, diphtheria, measles poliomyelitis, tuberculosis, malaria syphilis, pellagra, and typhus fev-

IF FIRE BREAKS OUT **PULL SWITCHES FIRST**

The first impulse, when fire breaks out in the home, is to pour on water. But that is not always the wisest move.

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist for Texas A and M College, says that when fire is in or around electrical equipment, Water or other fire extinguishers should never be used until the electric current is cut off at the switch.

For that reason, she suggests that every member or the family know how to "throw" or "pull" the main switch to deaden the wiring system in case of a fire emergency.

After the electricity is turned off, the fire can be treated by the proper extinguisher.

Death Takes 40% Heavier Toll In Night Accidents

The chances that a traffic accident will be fatal are 40% greater after dark than in daylight, according to analysis of 261,304 accidents completed by the safety lighting bureau's office. The study, which emphasizes the need of adequate light for traffic safety, covers all accidents, both urban and rural, occurring in 14 states during a 12-month period. The number of fatal accidents after dark averages 40.1 per cent greater than daylight despite 21 per cent average fewer total accidents.

THE BUGS ARS BUSY; BETTER CHECK GRAIN BINS, USDA ADVISES

Entomologists of the USDA's Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine recently sampled untreated bins of wheat in a midwestern state and found a heavy infestation of stored grain. If all wheat is farm storage is infested at the same rate, the scientists report, the loss of grain will have direct effect on the gra'n conservation program.

Grain stored in southern states is always more heavily infested and damaged by insects than grain stored in northern states because of the moisture and temperature factors,, entomogists of Texas A & M College point out. The insects develop more rapidly and do more damage to grain with a moisture content above \$ percent, while a daily temperature of 70 deg. or more encourages their development.

The entomologists resommend a mixture of three parts of ethylene dichloride to one part carbon tetrachloride as the fumigant for killing insect pests in stored grain. It won't burn or explode, but is is a poison gas and care must be taken not to inhale its fumes. The grain must be stored in tight cribs or bins, and a garden-type sprayer is best for making the application. Spray the

USE OF MEAT STOCK IS SIGN OF GOOD COOK

Are you a good cook? Mary tinson says "Yes, if you cook Stinson says "Yes, if you cook with stock." Writing in McCall's for January, she tells how to make the stock and use it:

"Meat stock is the liquid the really good cook makes from beef bones, chicken feet and vegetables and uses in place of water to enrich all dishes such as stews, gravies, pot roasts, meat pies, etc.

"How to make meat stock: Put beef bones and chicken feet skinned into a heavy ketttle. Pour on 4 quarts of cold water. Add an onion, carrot, sprig of parsley, celery tops (if you have them.) Cover tightly, Bring to a boil slowly. When it bubbles, add 1/2 cup cold water. Do this a couple of times to bring scum to surface which you skim off, thoroughly, and throw away. Then turn heat down low and let stock simmer, covered, at least 3 or 4 hours.

"Remove bones immediately because stock allowed to cool with the bones in it will turn sour. Strain stock into pint and quart jars and store in the refrigerator The fat that comes to the surface will seal it and help to preserve the stock for many days.

"If you do not use up your stock within a week, reheat it to the boiling point to keep it from going sour. Always heat stock to boiling point before using it no matter what the dish you are making."

liquid thoroughly and evenly over the grain at the rate of 6 to 8 gallons for a thousand bushels. A commercial mixture of carbon disulphide-carbon tetrachloride is also effective.

It's a good idea, the entomologists say, to check stored grain on a monthly basis. If insect infestation and damage is found, fumigate promptly.



LIMITED AMOUNT OF PHOSPHATE AVAILABLE ON AAA SUBSIDY DEAL

Farmers have another opportunity now to secure superphos-phate fertilizer through the 1948 AAA program at \$11.70 per ton, but they'll have to buy soon.

Meinrad Hesse of the H & H Feed Store this week announced an arrangement with H.B. Newberry of the county AAA office whereby farmers can save \$18.80 per ton by securing a purchase order from the AAA office and ordering through the H & H Store. The limit per farmer is 5,-000 pounds.

Hesse quoted Newberry as stating that the available supply of the fertilizer is limited this year and late orders probably will not be filled. Accordingly he set January 24 as the date for placorder will be for only the amount fertilizer to carry in stock.

Procedure for buying the fertilizer is to secure a purchase munity in general. order from the AAA office at and submit it to the H & H Feed Store - no other concern in the county is handling the phosphate this year. The purchase order is equivalent to \$18.80 per ton toward payment for the phosphate and the farmers pays the remaining \$11.70


