Notable Progress Marks'47 Program

In Elm-Red Soil Work

"Soil Conservation Service personnel, assisting the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District, made outstanding progress in applying the most badly needed conservation practices in 1947", according to J.W. Hess of Muendistrict supervisors. "A total of 27,639 acres was planted to soil improving crops and 5,587 acres of land was seeded to adapted grasses and legumes during the acreages exceed the total established for these two conservation practices prior to 1947. "Soil improving crops add

needed plant food and organic matter to the soil, and are a big help in reducing soil and water losses", the official added. Legume cover crops recommended and used in the District include vetch and Austrian winter peas for winter, and hubam, madrid, bi-annual sweet clover, crotalaria and cowpeas for summer. "The major portion of pasture seeding and sodding work was done on areas to receive terrace run-off

water", Mr. Hess pointed out. "The lack of sod grass on which to empty terrace water accounts for the small amount of terraces constructed in 1947", Frank Moore, district conservationist with headquarters at Gainesville, explained. "Land , seeded and sodded to grass on district co-operators' farms will provide protection for 456 miles of terraces

when established", he added. Mr. Hess reports that 1184 landowners in the district have a conservation plan for their farms through the "planning assistance" of Soil Conservation Service employees. Three hunred and forty-three (343) of this number were planned in 1947. Other new conservation practices established in the district in 1947. are as follows: Contour tillage. 10,642 acres: Grop Residue Management, 28,278 acres; strip cropping, 202 acres; farms and ranch ponds, 19; terraces, 174 miles; and diversions, 68,013 feet. During the five days, February 16 through 20, every Cooke county resident over 15 years of age will have an opportunity to discover whether he, or she, is infected with the tuberculosis germ.

An announcement made on January 29 by the Cooke county Tuberculosis Association discloses that during the five day period state association mobile Xthe ray unit will be in Gainesville at the Fair Park Community Center Building to give free chest X-rays. All person over 15 are invited and urged to have their pictures made.

To meet legal regulations the association must require all minors to show written authorizations the X-rays made.

Children under 15 may also be X-rayed but only on a written request from a family doctor. Clinic-StoreChanges is intended to eliminate needless expense. However, any child who
