

"Then direct your efforts to eliminating all fly breeding places such as open garbage pails, open privie and other filth that offers the fly proper warmth, moisture and food. "Tain't so, says Murray Cox, farm editor for Station WFAA. That report about DDT being bad for milk and not to be used on dairy cattle is strictly a false alarm and should be ignored by everyone who has taken it ser-


