Hottest Election in City History Favors Hoffman for Mayor

John J. Hoffman, superintendent of the Muenster Independent School, became Muenster's new mayor Tuesday in the hottest municipal election of the city's history. By a count of 109 to 90 he defeated J. M. Weinzapfel, candidate for re-election.

In the same election Dick Cain returned to the city council with a decision of 116 to 81 over Joe Knabe and Urban Endres and Rudy Hellman coasted in without opposition.

Within ten days the race de-veloped from one of the coldest to the hottest of the city's record. For several weeks before the legal deadline to qualify for a place on the official ballot not one of the candidates had announced. Every one of the six placed his name on the ticket after noon of the last day. Even then the race was run more by supporters than by the candidates themselves. Friends got out and herded in the votes while Hoffman and Weinzapfel both let the election take its course.

Only one other contest aroused a comparable interest here. That was the 1937 race between Mayor M. J. Endres and Ben Seyler in which Endres was reelected 99 to 43.

As a result of Tuesday's vote the next city council will be divided 50-50 between old and new members. Ben Seyler and John Wieler will serve the second year of their terms and Dick Cain continues in office. Of those replaced J. A. Fisher has had the longest continuous service. He en-tered office in 1935, Weinzapfel and Andy Hofbauer have served since 1943.
