So far so good. On those two issues at least most Texans are willing to concede that the GOP has the better side. There's a lot of truth in the claim that a vote for the Dixiecrat ticket is wasted, but it's also true that the average Southern Democrat will need strong inducement to change his traditional voting habit . . . and the most attractive inducement to him is a better civil rights policy than his old party has.

As far as yours truly is concerned no political development could be more pleasing than that one. Since the GOP is the probable winner its civil rights policy is likely to be the one proposed. Naturally, we'll all be happier if it's the right kind of policy.

In addition there's a good chance that such a policy will swing this-state into the Republican column and finally rescue us from the status of political stepchildren. Heretofore we've been ignored by Republicans and abused by Democrats simply because our votes have been in the bag anyway. Both parties will be more respectful in the future if they discover that Texans can vote two ways.

Appropos that picketing deal currently under way in Gainesville, here' a little story hot off the grapevine which might suggest a solution to the dilemma confronting quite a number of people who seem somewhat weary of being drawn into someone else's fuss.

The incident took place in another state. Theatre employes went on strike and picketed all shows in the town. Many people were genuinely sympathetic and respected the picket line. Some others especially merchants, became sympathetic later when they discovered that going to a show had a definite and depressing effect on their business. Regardless of personal convictions or convenience, they found it expedient to drive some 30 miles to the next town whenever they wished to see a show.

The strike went on and on. People got tired of being reminded that the nearest approved show was miles away. But finally a group of merchants, including all grocers in the town, decided



The investigations into the 'Red-menace" were started more inal Un-American Activities Committee of which Rep. Martin Dies, a Texas Demorcrat, was chairman. As far back as 1940 the National Small Business Men's Association, in an issue of its bulletin to members, published a list of more than 500 communists. or fellow travelers, who were then on the payroll of the Federal Government. This list showed the name and address of the individual, the department in which he or she was employed and the amount of the annual salary of everyone on the list.

Originally the Dies Committee was a special committee and did not have certain rights and powers which a regular standing committee has. This was changed at the first session of the 79th Congress. The House in this Congress had 242 Democrats and 190 Republicans. On January 3, 1945, Rep. John E. Rankin, Democrat from Mississippi, offered a resolution to give the Un-American Activities Committee the status of a regular standing House committee. The logical conclusion is that Mr. Truman is in favor of the spy ring and wants subversive persons on the payroll of the Government. It certainly is a sad commentary on our ability to govern ourselves when a high public official has reason to believe that he can get more voters to support him by going along - temporarily at least — with a movement designed to overthrow our republican form of government.

#### REMEDY FOR THE MEAT SITUATION

The meat situation has been the subject of more loose and uninformed talk than practically anything else, ranging from than ten years ago by the orig- unfounded charges that big profits are the cause of high prices to political demands for a reimposition of price controls, which would discourage production and channel most of the available meat supply into black markets.

In the light of that, a statement recently issued by the American Meat Institute deserve wide reading. "The real remedy for the meat situation," it said "is the production, as promptly as nature and other conditions will permit, of adequate numbers of meat animals." It then went on to make a series of specific suggestions for achieving this goal.

First, farmers should be couraged to breed sows for late fall and early winter farrowing. Second, producers should be urged to use the new corn crop to feed spring pigs to reasonably heavy weights. Third, breeding herds should be rebuilt with younger stocks, and older, poorer producing cows should be marketed. Fourth, the slaughter of calves should be reduced. Fifth producers must be assured of a continued relative strong demand for meat. Sixth, livestock conservation should be pushed.

This is a long range program and it is based upon the sound principle that the country must have more meat - and that high meat prices are in large part the result of heavy demand in the face of a limited supply.
