An old time custom that has been practically ridiculed out of existence is in urgent need of revival. That is the making of resolutions for the new year. Individually and collectively we Americans could gain much by charting our personal and national courses according to standards of common sense and morality and then resolving to follow the line with sincere effort.

Despite jests about the breaking of more resolutions than habits, we have to admit that improvement must come from planning and determination. It can't come from following the way of least resistance. So, our only hope of doing better is to put our minds and wills to it.

In saying this the column has no intention of hornoring in on private lives. It does not presume to list habits that should be dropped and others that should be acquired.

But it does think that a few other suggestions are in order, especially those relating to our public responsibility.

First of all, how about more awareness of our duties of citizenship? The coming year is an election year, which calls on us again to select the persons best qualified to hold public office. Implied in this duty is the two fold assignment to make the best selection and to vote accordingly.

None of us needs to be informed that critical days are ahead. Socialism, bureaucracy, inflation, deficit spending, one-worldism, softness toward the red menace, and alarming breakdown of morality are some of the important problems that should be considered seriously in setting up principles to guide our thinking in public matters, and measuring each candidate's fitness for the office he seeks. It is time, high time, for us as individuals to assume our proper responsibility in this matter and do what we can toward making our government the best we can for ourselves and posterity.

Being informed, of course, is only half the duty. We also have to vote our conviction. In our state this means that we must first qualify ourselves to vote by paying poll taxes. Then we have to go to the polls on every election day.

The pitiful turnout here on our December 16 election indicates that we have lots of room for improvement in this respect. Some of us may be inclined to excuse ourselves by pointing to equally bad turn-outs in other places. But at the same time we have to admit that we did fail in a duty.

There are lots of other resolutions which could be recommended as good for the general welfare of all in this area. For instance, to give increased support to our hospital drive; to help along with projects that provide more employment and better living to the community; to encourage and set an example for safer driving practices; to help in establishing the best possible standards of law and order in the community.

This column heartily encourages all of them and any other good ones that anyone feels inclined to adopt. However it makes a special appeal for only the one, to make 1962 the best ever in Muenster's voting record.

How about it? Isn't that a worthy and reasonable mark to shoot for? Can anyone think of a greater service to his own future and that of his children than exercising his right all the way in establishing good government? Let's resolve then to pay poll taxes, to be informed on issues and candidates, and to vote conscientiously.

### William Seyler 70, Dies Suddenly Of Heart Attack

A Christmas day reunion that brought much happiness to the William Seyler family of Valley View ended suddenly in sadness at 9:15 p.m. when Mr. Seyler died instantly of a heart attack. He was 70. Death came at his home while he and his wife were surrounded by their children and grandchildren, guests for the holidays.

A native of Muenster and among the first children born here after the colony was settled, William Seyler was born Jan. 4, 1891, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Seyler. He was married to Miss Anna Kreitz here on August 12, 1919, and they lived at Fort Worth and Justin before moving to Valley View 15 years ago.

Funeral services were held here in Sacred Heart Church Wednesday morning at ten o'clock and burial was in Sacred Heart Cemetery, Father Anthony Gajda, pastor of St. John's Church, Valley View, officiated and Nick Miller Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements. Rosary was recited in the Miller Chapel Tuesday at 4 and at 8:15 p.m.

Bearers were nephews: Joe Fette, John Mosman, Arthur Hellman, Harry Otto, J. A. Klemm and Pat Hennigan. Mr. Seyler was a veteran of World War I and a member of St. John's Parish. He was active in farming and dairying until his recent retirement.

Surviving are his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Mark Martich of Dallas; three sons, Albert Seyler in the U.S. Air Force stationed at Goldsboro, N. C.; Clarence Seyler of Justin and Conrad Seyler of Valley View; nine grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Joe Otto of Muenster, Mrs. Lena Bernauer of Gainesville and Mrs. Frank Bone of Albuquerque; and one brother, John Seyler of Colorado.

### Local Rainfall Of 30.91 Inches Is Close to Normal

With only four days remaining, the year's rainfall for this community stands almost exactly at the normal figure of the preceding ten years. The total as of Thursday morning was 30.91 inches. The average annual total is 30.99.

By separate months the totals also were fairly close to average. Exceptions were March with 5.23, the wettest of the decade, followed by April's .26, the driest. Two other months got close to the record, July had .34 and September 4.92. Dryest and wettest respectively for those months was .32 and 4.94 inches.

### Electric Service Failure Believed Caused by Rifle

A rifle shot is believed to be the cause of a power failure which left several hundred families in the north part of the county without electric service for about an hour on Christmas afternoon.

Manager Mike Sloan of Cooke County Electric Co-operative explains that a broken insulator permitted wires to short out and a faulty local multi-breaker failed to kick out the current. So the multi-breaker on the main line was hit by the overload. Hundreds were inconvenienced by trouble that should have affected a few dozen.

There has been no report as to what broke the insulator and caused all the trouble. But the co-op's service men are convinced that a rifle shot is the most likely explanation.

### Week's Donation Adds \$3,200 to the Hospital Fund

The cash fund of the Muenster Memorial Hospital took a nice jump during the past week, due principally to the Veterans of Foreign War donation from proceeds of their benefit picnic on Thanksgiving day. After clearing all bills of that event the post gave its check for \$2,000.

Other donations of the past week amounted to about \$1,200. J. M. Weinzapfel, president of the hospital authority, points out that persons who wish to have credit for their donations on this year's income tax return will have to make payments this week. He also said that receipts must be stepped up a great deal if payment is to be made at the expected time of completion, about January 1, 1963.

### Savings Interest And Dividend Pay Is Bank's Biggest

Stockholders of Muenster State Bank again received their annual dividends in time for Christmas, and the checks were the biggest ever. The payment this year was the first after last year's 100 per cent stock dividend. The rate was 5 per cent on total capital stock of \$100,000, last year it was 8 per cent on a capital of \$50,000.

Another handsome payment made by the bank is its interest on savings accounts. The amount paid for the past six months was \$20,658.41. At the end of June the payment was \$19,137.11, so the interest payments for the year amount to \$39,795.52. During 1960 total interest on savings came to about \$36,000.

That increase results from an increase of almost \$300,000 in the savings account during the year. Deposits grew from \$1,320,692 on Jan. 1 to \$1,615,152 on December 27.

At the same time demand deposits remained almost even. During the year that figure has grown from \$1,893,998 to \$1,898,583, a gain of less than \$5,000.

Total deposits here now on time and demand accounts are \$3,513,735.48.

### Methods Change In Handling Mail Of Cheaper Rates

Washington — The Post Office Department announced changes in handling of second, third and fourth class mail.

Beginning Jan. 10, the department will no longer notify without cost senders of this mail of an addressee's new address and will not allow mailers to pledge payment of forwarding postage. Third-class mail deemed of no obvious value will not be forwarded, and undeliverable pieces of no obvious value will be destroyed when return has not been requested.

Generally, second-class mail consists of publications, third-class mail of advertising circulars, and fourth-class mail primarily of parcel post.

The department added that mailers may get undeliverable pieces of third and fourth class mail returned by indicating "return requested" below the return address. Pieces returned will be marked to show the new address or reason for non-delivery if the new address is not known. A minimum charge of eight cents will be collected for each piece returned. More may be charged for heavier pieces.

The fee for notifying publishers of undeliverable second-class matter will be increased from 5 cents to 10 cents, the department noted. In addition, when an undeliverable second class publication marked "return requested" is returned, a minimum of 10 cents will be charged.

## EROSION OF PRINCIPLE

Editor Jenkin Lloyd Jones of the Tulsa (Okla.) Tribune, addressing editors at the Inland Press Association convention, discussed American decadence in general and concluded: "You have typewriters, presses and a huge audience. How about raising hell?" Here is his partial comment on just one of our current sins:

"Relief is gradually becoming an honorable career in America. It is a pretty fair life if you have neither conscience nor pride. . . . The state will give a mother a bonus for her illegitimate children, and if she neglects them sufficiently she can save enough out of her ADC payments to keep herself and boy friend in wine and gin. Nothing is your fault. And when the city fathers of a harassed community like Newburgh

suggest that able-bodied welfare clients might sweep the streets the 'liberal' editorialists arise as one man and denounce them for their medieval cruelty.

"I don't know how long Americans can stand this erosion of principle." Neither do we.

## SIGNS OF THE TIMES

Egyptian pharaohs and Roman emperors were fond of putting up statues of themselves and erecting plaques telling what great guys they were and how much they had done for the people.

Many things have changed in the past couple of thousand years, but bureaucrats still plaster the countryside with signs suggesting that their generosity is responsible for today's modern highways, bridges and other public works.

The truth is, of course, that America's millions of taxpayers deserve the credit.

Mendel Rivers is blowing the whistle on such bureaucratic brainwashing attempts. He has advised his state's chief highway commissioner to tear down roadside signs which proclaim that the new interstate highways are financed 90 percent by the federal government.

"That's not charity from bureaucrats," says Congressman Rivers. "That money is allocated to the states under a law passed by Congress. Tear down those signs and if they give you any trouble, come see us."

In other words, the South Carolina Congressman is making the point that taxpayers' dollars, shelled out at every gasoline pump in the country, are paying for the interstate highways. The money is simply routed through Washington, D. C., and not enough of it ever gets back home again.

## FREE ENTERPRISE PRODUCES ABUNDANCE

The Iron Curtain countries have long been plagued with food shortages. Bare subsistence diets are the rule rather than the exception. Meat is a rarity. The pitifully small quantities of it that the average family obtains is of poor quality and is extortionately priced.

The regimented citizens of these "Workers' Paradises" will, it is safe to say, never be allowed to read an item that appeared in a recent issue of the Michigan Farmer. It pointed out that this year Americans will consume an average of 85 pounds of beef, 64.5 pounds of pork, 6.1 pounds of veal, and 4.4 pounds of lamb, along with an abundance of dairy and poultry products.

Then it adds that the average worker needs only 20 minutes of working time to earn enough to pay for a pound of meat — as against 35 minutes some 30 years ago. Putting it another way, the retail price of meat has increased less than 10 per cent in the last 10 years, as against a whopping 37 per cent increase in average hourly earnings.

The American meat industry, in all its ramifications — producer, packer, retailer — is a competitive, free enterprise operation. It is ruled by the natural law of supply and demand — not by the fiat of

dictators. The results speak for themselves — plentiful supplies.

According to an analyst connected with the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey, revenue collected from the American people by federal, state and local governments increased a staggering \$20 billion in a single year. The total was \$154 billion in 1960, as against \$134 billion in 1959.

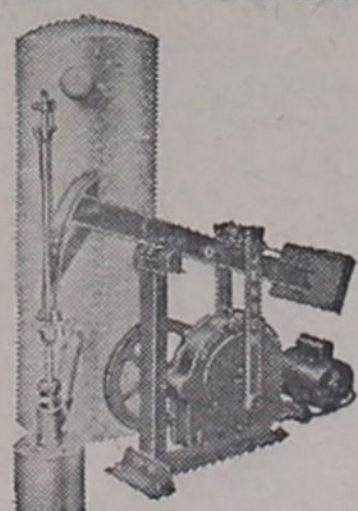

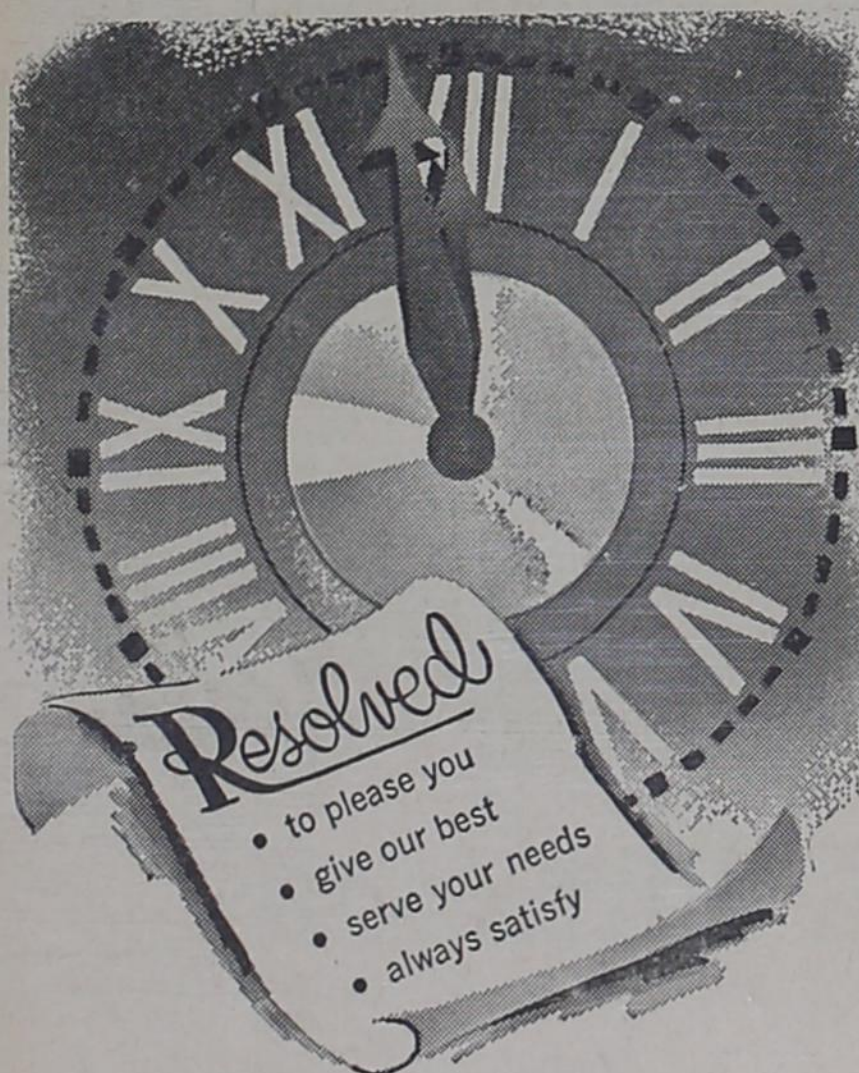

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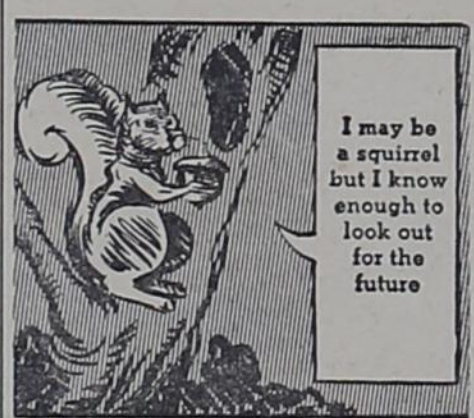
