may not realize that their earnings are at a level which will now permit them to get some payments.

Some others may be under the impression that if they earn more than \$1200 in a year, they cannot collect any social security benefits. This is not so, he said.

Another thing many people don't realize is that regardless of their annual earnings, a social security beneficiary can be paid his benefits for any month he does not earn more than \$100 in wages nor work in self-employment.

The social security district manager suggested that working people 65 or over who have not yet applied for their social security benefits write or phone his office to get a
