MUENSTER ENTERPRISE

As expected, President Kennedy is bending over backward in his effort to avoid charges of showing favoritism to members of his religion. Despite the widespread belief that children of private and parochial schools are entitled to share in the benefits of public assistance to education, he insists that such help would violate the principle of separation of church and state.

His attitude is basically unfair and unconstitutional in that it discriminates against the right of parents to educate children in schools of their choosing. The handicap he advocates either prevents or discourages many parents from exercising that choice. And it imposes a hardship on many others who exercise the right in spite of difficulty.

In the more general view of aid to education the President's attitude is understandable. It is assumed that the aid, both state and federal, goes to the institution, therefore that help to parochial students would go to build and improve schools owned by the Catholic Church.

But that need not be the method of operation. And in the case of Texas public schools it is not the method. Assistance to schools of this state is clearly identified for the purpose of teaching the children. None of it can be used to finance the school plant, which is regarded as Court of Honor, the community responsibility. In other words the students, In other words the students, not the institutions actually receive the help. Practically speaking this means that parents are the real beneficiaries, because they would have to pay the bills if the state did not send their share of the cost to the school of their

Of course, it is obvious that our situation in Texas is one sided. Aid is sent to the school of a parent's choice only if plying the discrimination.


