Disabled Worker Can Get Help from Social Security

If your wages had stopped and your family needed money, would you disregard a source of income that might be "yours for the asking"? This may ing lead then piled on 3 more two hits. sound like a riduculous question, but that is exactly what many families are doing, according to Gus Jones, manager of the Sherman Social Security District Office.

Many disabled workers and their families are not receiving social security disability benefit payments because an application has not been filed by the disabled worker or someone on his behalf. If you are totally disabled and have worked under social security for at least five years of the ten year period ending when you were disabled, you should apply for benefits, Jones said.

If a disabled worker's claim is applied, his wife and dependent child under 18 may also get checks. A disabled son or daughter over 18 may be eligible for benefits on his or her parent's account if his or her disability began before age 18 and is so severe that he or she is unable to do a substantial job for pay.

The present law provides that disability applications filed on or before June 30, 1962, will be effective as of the date the disability began, no matter how far back that date might be. Applications filed after June 30, 1962, can be effective for only 18 months prior to the date of filing. For workers who became disabaied prior to 1961 it is important to file a claim before the June 30 deadline, otherwise they stand a chance of losing all rights to present and future cash benefits for themselves and their families.

Moldboard Helped By Plastic Cover

Ever have trouble with soil sticking to your plows? U. S Department of Agriculture agricultural engineers have found an answer to this problem.

In tests conducted at Auburn, Alabama, moldboard plows covered with sheet plastic did an excellent job of shedding soil Two plastics, Teflon and H. D. polyethylene, were effective in turning sticky, difficult-to-plow clay soil.

The plow covered with Teflon required 23 percent less pulling power than a conventional steel moldboard plow. The USDA engineers say this is the first time the Davidson clay used in the test has been satisfactorily plowed with a moldboard since the tillage machinery laboratory began using this soil for tests nearly 25 years ago.

The engineers estimate a 14-inch moldboord plow covered with Teflon will turn about 30 more acres of highly abrasive, sticky soil than will a similar plow covered with H. D. polyethlyene. USDA engineers are presently

working with coverings for moldboard plows only, but they believe plastic coverings may eventually prove useful on any farm implement that comes in contact with the soil. This research is continuing.

The plow coverings are not yet commercially available. Manufacturers will have to determine, on the basis of potential demand, whether production of these items is economically feasible.
