After two months of the state sales tax we still hear lots of customer gripes about digging up that extra two per cent. But their beefing is feeble compared with that of the business men. Making out their first report and remittance convinced them who is really stuck with the new law. Keeping separate accounts was a big nusiance to begin with. Then came the added burden of getting all required figures in report form, with separate totals of taxable and tax free sales. Lots of them spent hours on the job. It's understandable that many big companies claim they need additional help to take care of the extra work. Besides, there's more red tape on tax exemption certificates. But this is only the beginning of newly created work and expense. Reports have to be processed in Austin. That requires addition of thousands of paper fumblers to the state payroll. The provision which was intended to add substantially to state revenue has also added substantially to state expense.
