The entire unit was built on contract by J. P. Flusche for the owner, David Black. Its pounds, is built of 4, 5, and 6 inch angle iron and it rests on cement blocks extending

10 feet down to rock. The 12,600 gallon tank is made of 1/4 inch steel and plastic lined to prevent rust indefinitely. Its top is 19 feet above the tower. An extra heavy crane with high boom was moved in from Iowa Park

Water for the tank is supplied by a 900 gallon per hour submersible pump drawing from the Trinity sand.






