





Bees alone took 52 lives when victims were allergic to their poisons. Best defense against insect

and snake bites is to be watchful. Tramping through woods with thick undergrowth can be asking for trouble. Around the home, look care-

fully in tall bushes and vines

before trimming to make sure there are no insect nests. When exposed to snake-ridden areas, carry a snake-bite kit. If bitten, be still to keep circulation at minimum rate while applying snake-bite procedures or waiting for help. The victim should seek medical aid from a physician as soon as possible.

Six Traffic Signs Are Life Savers

That's what the nation's traffic signs are, J. O. Musick, General Manager of The Texas Safety Association said today.

"Traffic Signs," he said, speaking in behalf of the National Safety Council's Signs of Life program, "Are designed to protect human life. It is essential motorists know the Signs of Life by sight and obey them without fail."

"Traffic signs represent the xpert thinking of traffic enrineers and safety officials. The signs are designed for your protection."

He urged motorists to learn these six signs by shape so they can recognize them on sight:

1. Octagon . . . red with white lettering. Means come to a full stop and make sure the way is clear before proceeding. This is a revision of the older stop sign painted yellow with black lettering. But the meaning remains the same. 2. Triangle . . . yellow with black lettering reading "Yield Right of Way." Signifies slow down or stop at intersection






fit from the revisions.

Included in the changes, which the President called "financially sound and socially responsible," are provisions: 1. Increasing the minimum benefit to \$40.

2. Increasing widows' benefit by 10 percent.

3. Lowering the amount of work-credits to become eligible for benefits.

4. Making old-age benefits available to men at age 62. The House Committee on Ways and Means, reporting on the amendments to the security law, had said, "The provision of benefits at age 62 for men will help to alleviate the hardships faced by that group of men who, because of ill health, technological unemployment or other reasons,

working until they reach 65.' That Committee estimated that 560,000 persons would get benefits under this change during the next 12 months. It is estimated also that one and a half million widows will get the increase in the widows benefit and that more than 2 million persons would be affected by the increased mini-

mum benefit. Those persons eligible for the increases will receive them in their checks early next month, Gus Jones, manager of the Sherman office of the Social Security Administration, said today.
